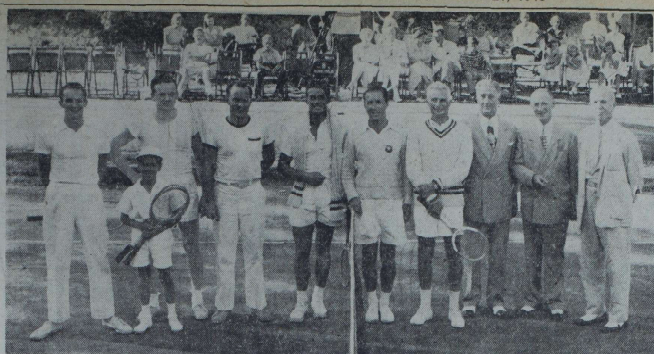


S Class Paced By Nepenthe After 26 Championship Races

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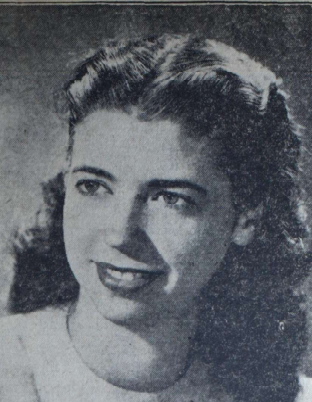

BREAK IN MAIN DISRUPTS SUBWAY

NEW YORK (AP)—Break in a 26-inch water main disrupted traffic on the upper West Side IRT subway yesterday, and flooded the basements of nearby buildings.

Normal service was restored at 9 P. M., nearly 12 hours after the main burst at Broadway and 86th Street.

Water poured into the subway and caused a section of sidewalk outside the 86th Street station to collapse.

After seven hours of repair work, train service was resumed on both express and local tracks. The 86th Street station was out of service, however, until a temporary wooden decking could be placed over the collapsed area.

The water main break was one of a series of subway and electric power failures in the city which started Thursday night.

Operation of the Consolidated Edison Company's water-side plant was reported normal again last night, and consumers of electricity in downtown Manhattan will not have to reduce usage.

Four-inch concrete cables in two generators in the powerhouse at 33rd Street and First Avenue burned out and caused a power shutdown Friday afternoon in the area from 14th Street to Walker Street and from the East River to the Hudson River. Subway service also was disrupted.

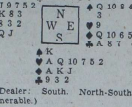

BARCLAY ON BRIDGE By Shepard Barclay "The Authority on Authorities"

MAKE HIM READ WRONG. MANY "A" contracts depend upon a word reading of the cards. This is so much more often through maneuvers of the declarer to fool the defense than through declarer tactics to mislead the defender. The reason is that a declarer often is afraid of the damage that might come from misreading his partner, whereas it does a declarer no harm to misread the dummy. But sometimes the pair on the defense manages to bamboozle the declarer through either a play or a bid or a combination of them.

After the spade 3 was won by the singleton K, South saw the necessity of winning a trick in the dummy so he could use the spade A for a club discard and then try the diamond finesse. His chance to do that apparently lay in the dummy's ♠ 10.

West or having that card be a singleton. So he laid down the hearts A and then led the 2. If West had played low, the 2 would have been put in West, however, it came in with the K and then led the club Q.

Right there came the crisis of the deal. If the dummy covered

with the K, the contract would have been made, since the A would win that and a club return would have put West in with the 2. But South decided that West probably had three clubs and East the A either as a singleton or in a doubleton. He therefore played from dummy, hoping the A would have to play the next time. When the J was now led, he ducked again to dummy, trusting that the A would play. When it did he was overjoyed.

But his pleasure was short-lived. East had played the A voluntarily, not compulsively, as South learned when the 8 was then returned. West ruffing for the setting trick.

Note that the defense caused South to read East as more likely to be short in clubs than West, since East's first bid of spades had shown length there. Also note that the defenders had several chances for mistakes—by playing low on the second heart lead, by East letting the club J win or by East not returning the third club.

SAMOA CHILDREN FACE HARD TIMES

PAGO PAGO, American Samoa (AP)—American servicemen left hundreds of half-caste babies and a first class problem in American Samoa. These children are growing up in a land where they have little livelihood. The reason is that persons of less than three-fourths Samoan blood may not inherit or buy land, except for few freehold acres. This restriction bears heaviest now on the shoulders of the grown children of traders and navy men who married Samoan women before the war. But in a few years, unless it is remedied, the legitimate children of American fighting men will find substantial blocks in the path to economic betterment.

The problem will be discussed with a Congressional committee which plans to visit Samoa this year. Half-castes, Samoan-born and of Samoan blood, complain they practically are outcasts in their own land.

One trader solved the problem by giving his children excellent educations in Hawaii and mainland schools and universities—and kicked them out of Samoa, A. I.

BAT IN BEDROOM "NOT DANGEROUS"

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—A bat in the bedroom is nothing to get excited about, according to the Philadelphia Academy of Natural Science.

James A. Fowler, the academy's director of education, said yesterday he and other scientists have been somewhat worried of late about the public's attitude toward chiroptera—bats to you.

Fowler said he has noted in the last few weeks newspaper stories, telling of the dire results ensuing when bats wandered into houses, only to be batted about by misguided house-holders.

"Bats are strictly beneficial: far as we're concerned," said Fowler. "They rid the night skies of all sorts of obnoxious insects, such as flies and mosquitoes."

The big trouble with bats, said Fowler, is that they sleep in the daytime and start looking for something to eat about the time dusk sets in. Householders are turning out the light.

Once in a while a bat will wander into someone's home. Fowler added—but that is an easy situation to remedy. The only step necessary is to open a couple of windows and wait until the bat finds its way to freedom.

The whole bat situation will be cleared up—at least temporarily—come October, in the Fall all bats in good standing hibernate for the winter.

Mamaroneck District Up 83; Rye Neck 23 On Last Day

The total registration in Mamaroneck, Larchmont and Rye Neck schools showed an increase of more than 100 pupils over last year as the schools opened their doors today for the 1948-49 term.

In three of the four elementary schools of the Mamaroneck District increases were noted while the fourth remained the same. Fewer pupils were registered for Mamaroneck Junior High School than last year.

Both Murray Avenue and Chastworth Avenue Schools had an increase of 54 pupils making their total enrollment for the year 579 and 573, respectively, compared to 525 and 519 last year.

Superintendent T. James Aherm said this morning he expected the registration would probably increase another 70 within the next few days, as there are still some youngsters who have not registered or have not returned home from their summer vacations.

Berlin Attacks Move to Hamper Talks with Marshall

Secretary of State Says Reds Seek to Disrupt Government's Talks

WASHINGTON (AP)—Secretary Marshall said today Communist attacks on the Berlin City Government were largely intended to upset talks of the Big Four military governors on the crisis in the Soviet-occupied zone.

Marshall said that the efforts to disrupt these talks must be firmly resisted. He declined at a news conference to say that any resistance involving military force would be met.

Just before inviting newsmen, the secretary of state recalled from the military high command at the Pentagon a detailed account of the situation in Germany in the last 24 hours.

WASHINGTON (AP) — A Federal Grand Jury today indicted three former Army officers charged with dealing in \$500,000 worth of bonds once owned by Nazis that were peddled in a European black market. They were indicted specifically for violating the trading with the enemy act.

Federal officers said three of those indicted — Edward Ashton of Enfield, Conn., Gerald A. Rowland of Enfield, N. Y., and Seymour Lerner of Brooklyn — were officers in the Air Transport Command.

Indicted with them was Wendell M. Weston of Weston, Mass., who Federal officers also helped in disposing of many of the bonds.

U.S. Blocks Red Attempt to 'Berlin' Air Lift

Officials Reject Note Demanding Notice Of All Flights

BERLIN (AP) — American officials rejected curiously today a Russian attempt to restrict the air lift supplying blockaded Berlin.

The Russian move came half a day after bloody street fighting in the tense city in which anti-Communist Germans ripped down the Red flag from multiple dwellings. German and Soviet - controlled police fired into the air, killing a Russian. The Russian raised the hammer and sickle flag today over the gates.

Over the Russian sent a formal note to the American Air Force official said the safety rules are adequate and the intent of the Russians was obviously another one of their efforts to get control of the city.

The American reply was that the U. S. Air Force is adding by established four power flying rules and adequate information to the master copy furnished the Russians daily.

The new controversy over flying over the city was resolved in the first in about two months. Then the Russians also demanded full control over flights which cross their occupation zone. American pilots said there was no unusual air activity reported today in the corridors or over Allied sources voiced open concern that mounting incidents between Communist and anti-Communist Germans might tip the balance in favor of the Communists.

Four power negotiations now being held on the Berlin situation might break down completely.

Last night's street fighting between Berlin civilians and Russian troops, supported by Soviet tanks and armor, cost the life of one German soldier and injuries to at least 22 other Germans, police reports said.

COUNCIL DEFERS ANTENNAE ACTION

Desires More Information On Control Of Video Sets

Solution to the problem of controlling the installation of television antennas on multiple dwellings was temporarily delayed Wednesday night by the Town Council until more information can be obtained.

Councilman Edward A. Watson reported that Hartford Conn., has passed an ordinance on the installation of television antennas and recommended that the council study it before adopting its own code.

The proposal amendment was referred to Councilman Watson, who had televised engineers and representatives of the National Board of Fire Underwriters examine it and offer their advice. While they were in no position to give their approval to the amendment they found it in keeping with their accepted standards from a safety viewpoint.

The Board of Underwriters, he said, has received several inquiries for some form of control over installations and has appointed a sub-committee to study the problem.

Supervisor Owen A. Mandeville said he felt that the council should wait until something definite to go by before adopting the proposed amendment. He said that if the town adopts the ordinance it should confine installation to the master type aerial which is capable of handling up to eight sets.

Councilman Mann said he did not think that master should be required to install master antennae. He said the Police Department which is prohibiting the individual apartment master antenna.

The supervisor replied that he had received a letter from the Police Department.

UNION CONSIDERS COMPROMISE BID

Reduction in Demands To Be Submitted Today To AFL Drivers

NEW YORK (AP) — Striking truckers are to decide Wednesday whether to reduce their wage demands in a move to break a 10-day deadlock with employers.

The union membership meeting was called for this afternoon to consider the compromise formula, recommended by leaders of striking Local 807 of the AFL-International Brotherhood of Teamsters.

There were some indications, however, that the 10,000 New York City drivers and helpers might not approve the proposal, which calls for scaling down of wages by 10 to 15 percent.

Late yesterday about 700 members of the striking local, the city's largest, met in a vacant lot in Lower Manhattan and voted overwhelmingly to stick by the 25-cent demand.

This figure was fixed by the union members as they "took bottom" 10 days ago when they rejected an employer offer of a 1-cent hourly boost, and voted to walk off their jobs.

They were joined in the strike five days ago by 4,300 members of Local 478 in Newark, N. J., but about 1,000 of the New Jersey truckers were expected to return to work today after members last night ratified agreements with 16 independent trucking concerns.
