STAFF ENLARGED IN KINDERGARTEN

An unexpectedly large re-registration in the kindergartens of the District Warren and Barry Avenue schools drew an urgent request last night from Superintendent Alvin W. Hicks for two new teachers in each elementary school.

After a long and arduous day of available finances and the beginning of the school year, the request granted—one new teacher, Mr. Hicks reported that Barry Avenue had 35 youngsters re-registered in the morning session of the kindergarten and 25 in the afternoon as against 24 in each session last year. At Daniel Warren there are 28 in the morning and 36 in the afternoon as against 25 and 27, respectively last year.

Trustee Arthur A. Allen Jr. and William C. Fitts advised that a 100 per cent staff increase of two new teachers were out of the question. We have a group of 18 to 20 in the morning and the other in the afternoon, and Trustee Allen suggested that the kindergartners be split up to be 25 and the others transferred to Daniel Warren where the new teacher would be assigned."

The board moved the appointment of one new teacher and Dr. Hicks was authorized to apportion the children in the most efficient manner possible.

WASHINGTON, (AP) — The Western Big Three Foreign Ministers looked to Moscow today for the next move in the line post-war quarrel over Germany. A summit and heated reaction was forecast.

Diplomats expected Soviet Russia to respond in the Western powers plan to take West Germany into a defense partnership with it. A new barrage of protests based on the familiar propaganda theme that the West is rearming Germany in preparation for aggressive war on the Soviet bloc.

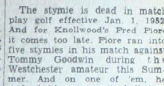

Later on, perhaps on the very next trick, you toss the lead to him again and this time he is obliged to do your bidding, as he has no alternative left.

Personal Therapy Motives Base First Book, Says Lucy Freeman

By JEAN SCOTT

"Writing my book on psychoanalysis was part of my therapy—my fears came to the surface more quickly in writing," Lucy Freeman, author of "Fights Against Fear," presented "New Book and former Westchester newsman" women told the approximately 100 persons attending yesterday's meeting of the Westchester Shore Section, National Council of Jewish Women at the home of Mrs. Miriam Friedman, 68 Victoria Boulevard.

"Another reason for the book was my desire to show the essence of psychoanalysis. I had been disturbed by notions viewed on the subject—that it was magic and would cause disaster. It is neither of these; it is the long, hard middle of the road to balance emotion and intellect," Mrs. Freeman said.

"Like Yourself"

Chief analysis is "really getting to like yourself" through feelings of security and faith in your own confidence. This has nothing to do with egotism in which, the author would reveal, you are not. Happiness, she noted, results rather in an inner-did you know yourself, not the victory of all persons.

Need for psychiatric aid depends upon the individual. If it is sought, find someone you like as a person and who is also approved by others qualified to help. Mrs. Freeman cautioned:

"A definition of mental health to which I subscribe is having the ability to put yourself in the other person's place," the speaker said.

"Part of emotional illness is the need for dramatic re-working; this need is based on fear. And the fears that are most crippling are those that are not or seemingly not based on facts."

Referring frequently to her personal experiences on which her best-selling book is founded, Mrs. Freeman reiterated that mental health is a balance between what you feel and what you think. To keep my feelings checked and think more was my problem, she said, but the opposite is true with some people.

"Analysis can be pictured as sowing up all over again—sowing the seeds of, particularly during childhood with its many fears and learning to understand the basis for these fears. With understanding and repeated effort, the seeds can be disallowed," Mrs. Freeman continued.

During the question period, which comprised the meeting of the program, Mrs. Freeman was asked why she had lacked confidence in herself when her work in the reporting field was an example of her ability to write. "There is no substitute for self-approval," Mrs. Freeman responded. "My work did not come, I was very satisfied with it, and I would not identify myself with it, but my work consisted of a fear that the many others that plagiarized me."
