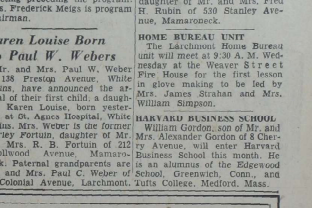

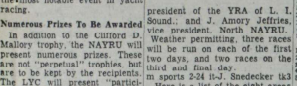

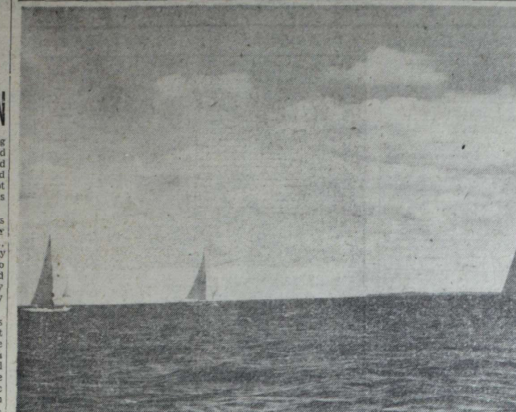

- 1. Win 30 games.
- 2. Pitch 400 innings.
- 3. Start every third day without a break.

Leads Both Leagues  
But with one more starting assignment to come before the season ends on Sunday, the Phillies rightshander is sure to:

- 1. Win 23 and possibly 24 games, as many or more than anybody else in either league.
- 2. Pitch more innings than any National Leaguer since Grover Cleveland Alexander in 1920, and more than anybody except Alexander in the league since 1907.
- 3. Start more games than any other pitcher in the league this season.

Roberts won his 23rd game last night, edging the New York Giants 2-1 on 10 hits, nine runs, his 40th start and his 33rd complete contest. For the 14th time in 18 seasons he didn't walk a man.

Despite a bleak month starting in early August Roberts' control record has been phenomenal. ### BOGARDUS ISSUES REPLY TO SUTTON

A Larchmont taxpayer today issued a detailed reply to an attempt to revive plans for the old Pelham-Port Chester Parkway route through Larchmont which was contained in an open letter mailed recently by Town GOP voters by Thomas B. Sutton, independent candidate for GOP nomination for supervisor.

Arthur G. Bogardus, 17 Overlook Terrace, Larchmont, took a dim view of Mr. Sutton's idea that the proposed New England Thruway will fund out according to present plans, practically eliminate the beautiful station park at the village railroad depot.

Mr. Sutton, in a two-page memorandum, said that since the current plans call for the station to be raised on "stilts" so that the highway can go under, the planned station would be a handsome open-air people.

Escalators Planned  
Mr. Bogardus, in answer, said that escalators are planned for the future.

Mr. Sutton also pointed out that the property "owned" by the county apparently has been re-enclosed and the new route under the railroad station proposed at an additional cost of \$100,000. This would practically eliminate the beautiful station park at the depot.

In his reply, Mr. Bogardus said: "It is a surprise to read in Mr. Sutton's letter that his primary objection to the proposed station is that it will be erected, so his best course is to have the New England Thruway built to the original route of the Pelham-Port Chester Highway."

"To us, three decades have passed since the original route was planned. A parkway with present curves, varying grades and for pleasure vehicles only, plus the traffic density and speed of that day, are a relic of specifications which today are completely obsolete."

"Traffic density has vastly increased since the original route was planned. The present drawing of the proposed New England Thruway, Mr. Bogardus said:

"Now it is a thoroughfare—six lanes wide with a separating island, without grades through Larchmont and with a straight line. Incidentally, referring to Mr. Sutton's letter, the present plan does not eliminate the park at the Larchmont Station. In fact the beautiful station park, as we know it, will be 're-created.'"

"Fortunately, the present plan has been based upon conditions of today, and the future, by a group of competent, professional engineers."

### SHORT CIRCUIT FIRE DAMAGES KITCHEN

A short circuit blaze in an electrical outlet in the kitchen of the home of Henry Holdings, 30 Chestnut Avenue, Larchmont, damaged a kitchen cabinet, window sill, wall and ceiling at 5:30 P. M. yesterday before it was brought under control by volunteers.

### Reduce Taxes, Armed Forces, A Glance Grim Choice Now Facing U. S. Backward

**By RAY TUCKER**  
WASHINGTON — The grim choice of promised and anticipated tax cuts or a dangerous reduction in military strength at home and overseas has been readied for the American people and Congress as a result of Treasury Secretary Humphrey's study of the nation's fiscal problems. A third alternative appears to be the imposition of the unpopular value tax at the manufacturers' level. Secretary Humphrey's recent speech only complicates the question. He favors a 10 per cent personal cut and abandonment of the excess-profits tax but he must make up for this \$5.5 billion loss of revenue somewhere, which would merely mean shifting the burden from one pocket to another, or he must skimp on armaments for ourselves or our Allies.

With President Eisenhower leading the chorus in "Operation C. & G. E.," top Administration spokesmen now stress the need of savings rather than the prospect of fatter pocketbooks and heavier profits. Treasury Secretary Humphrey warned that cautious policies must be pursued in public and private talks to 7,000 bankers at their recent convention. Defense Mobilizer Arthur S. Fleming and Defense Secretary Charles E. Wilson sang the same theme. Fortunately none other than former President Harry Truman and Adlai E. Stevenson may have taken Mr. Eisenhower off the political book with respect to his campaign pledges on cutting taxes and balancing the budget. At the Democrats' Chicago rally both jibed and jabbed at the Administration's seeming preference for the easier way—what is tax cuts as against a national defense buildup. Only one slight and remote possibility can conceivably spare Mr. Eisenhower and Mr. Humphrey from making what will be an ugly choice between new and the reconvening of Congress next January. That would be a satisfactory settlement with the Russians and China of all the world-wide conflicts responsible for the present costly rearmament race. Nobody looks for such a pleasant but impossible prospect.

**SIMPLE BUT SERIOUS**—There is nothing complicated or hard to understand about the Government's financial dilemma, as Mr. Humphrey has demonstrated with his banker friends. Every household has suffered from the problem of too many bills and not enough to pay them on time. It is expected that Federal revenue for the 1955 fiscal year will amount to about \$60 billion. That is the money which Uncle Sam will have in the till. If Congress insists on tax cuts totaling \$9 billion in personal, excise, corporation and excess profits lev-

It should be noted here that the Truman Administration fixed the dates when these post-Korean charges should expire.
