The matter of immediate urgency is of course, the Battle of the Pacific, in which the Allies are fighting at a disadvantage because of the nature of the Japanese show in the dark. Perhaps it is a good thing that Roosevelt and Churchill go down to come in Washington to see the situation.

The Yanks and Filipinos are reported to have fought the invading Japs to a standstill. The British are holding their own on the Malayan Peninsula above Singapore. Even gallant Hongkong is hanging on by its teeth in the face of tremendous odds.

Still, we cannot help but feel that the allied cause are in great danger. An unannounced defense pact is called upon to decide whether American reserves should be thrown to the support of the vital cause of Singapore with the risk of losing the Philippines temporarily. Then, too, the question of whether Russia shall join the Allies against Japan is likely to become a burning issue. All these problems must be solved and solved quickly.

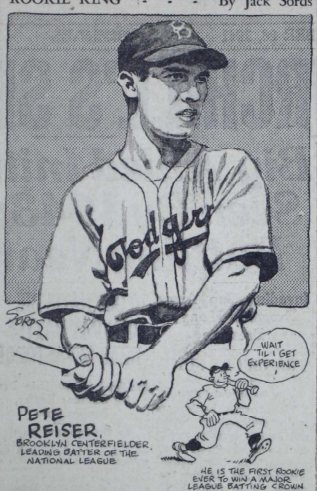

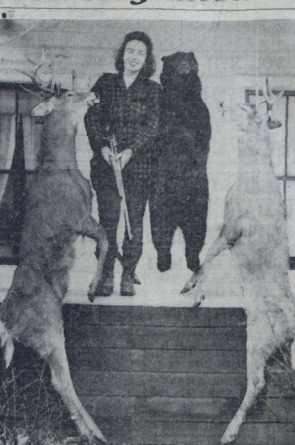

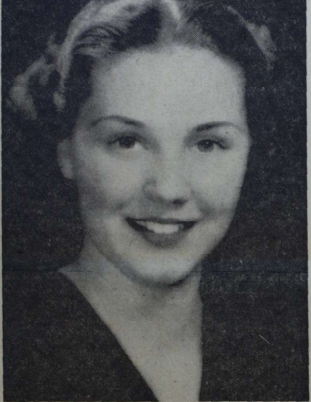

Leaders To Carry On Full Programs In 1942

Sports flourished in the Larchmont-Mamaroneck area during 1941 despite passage of the Selective Service Act and the President's declaration of a national emergency. Dedication of war came only late to affect competition in this area although several sports may feel the pinch in the days to come, notably football.

True, the draft claimed many of its district's most athletes, but their places in the ranks were filled, sometimes by competitors whose stars ascended higher than their predecessors.

THE PELHAM-FORT CHESTER PARKWAY PROBLEM

For more than a decade Westchester has owned about 90 per cent of the right-of-way required to build a parkway from the New York City line at Pelham to Port Chester. It would serve as a parallel route to the Boston Post Road, which is the most congested traffic route in the county...

From the local standpoint, the parkway would be most beneficial in taking off the Boston Post Road through traffic which now hampers local traffic, particularly local shopping. New Rochelle is the hardest hit in this respect and it is not surprising that the common council, civic organizations and taxpayer groups are urging that the county consider immediate construction plans.

The county is quite willing to build the parkway—provided it can raise the money in some other manner than through taxation of its property-owners. That method will definitely not be used, for the county administration is firm in policy that relief for through traffic is not a county obligation but falls rather on the state or federal governments or the motorists who comprise such traffic. Consequently, unless funds come from Albany or from Washington, the only recourse is to issue bonds which have a security the tolls to be collected, similar to the arrangement under which the Fleetwood Bridge on the Cross County Parkway and the recent improvements on the Hutchinson are being financed.

It is possible, although not probable at this time, that Washington may consider the proposed parkway of military value and be willing to contribute. If not, tolls are the only other answer. And the county might well announce which it is to be at an early date.

LAST WARNING

Remember that the new state law requiring motorists' financial responsibility in accidents becomes effective at midnight. The law does not make insurance compulsory specifically, but it does prevent any motorist from continuing to drive until he has shown financial ability to meet claims arising from his first accident and responsibility for future accidents.

In other words, as a dog is allowed one bite, a motorist is permitted one insurance-less accident; thereafter his troubles—and they will be real—start. So, it is far better to be prepared. If you aren't yet insured, look after it right away.

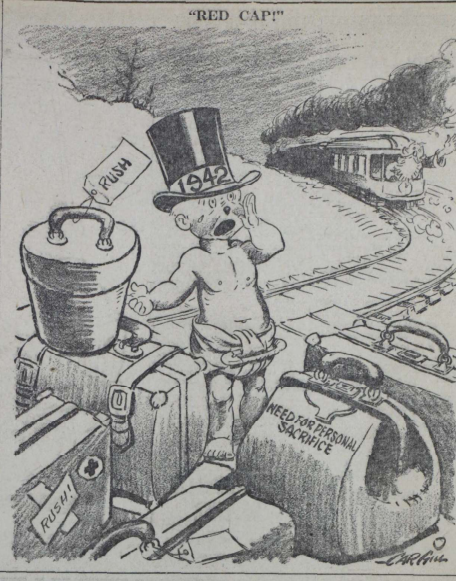
