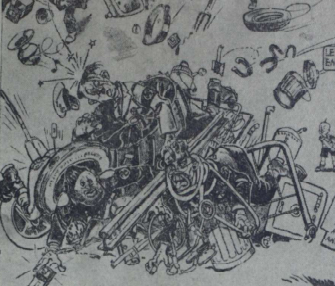

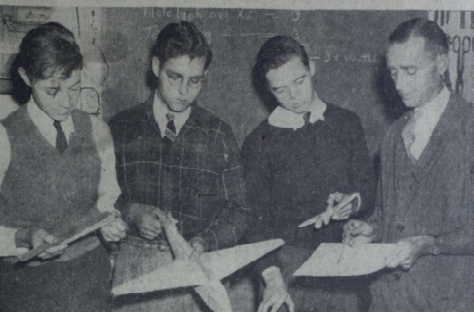

The town reported yesterday by Westchester newspapers yielded Mount Vernon 1640 tons, Mount Pleasant 1400 tons, New Rochelle 650 tons, Ossining, 200 tons, Yonkers, 200 tons, Port Chester, 100 tons, Larchmont & Town, 200 tons, Harrison, 100 tons, Tarrytown, 80 tons. Mamaroneck's per capita total is now 107 pounds.

The Larchmont Postal District has crossed the quarter-way mark with a per capita collection of nearly 25 pounds. It was revealed yesterday when that section reached the 200-ton total.

While air raid wardens and other civilian protection volunteers toured the Village most yards and comb the waterfront today in the final push of the national scrap drive, Street Department crews are busy collecting and unloading scrap at the 100-ton mark.

Larchmont's scrap collection amounted to three tons while the Town gathered up another five tons, bringing the postal average total up to 208 tons. The Village of Mamaroneck total, with no collection yesterday, remained at the 1900-ton mark.

Larchmont Village Engineer Arthur Richards said today that the Larchmont collection would remain until the end of the year in an effort to meet its separate quota successfully.

The 1943 general election held by voters of the county Tuesday, Westchester is entering upon the final phase of the most lethargic, most apathetic and almost entirely unexciting political campaign in the history of the county.

With practically no large rallies yet held by any of the three registered parties in the county and with the dull political campaign throughout the state, the disinterest is continued to this county alone.

Local candidates for governor, state senator and assemblyman are scheduled to appear before the voters on Monday evening, Oct. 26. Political leaders are already dispirited to a single night which will be held on the same day as the general election will be around much better than very early election on Nov. 2.

Local candidates for Congress, the State Senate and Assembly, have made a few speeches here and there but, as a mark of the times there was not a single large rally in the county since the political campaign this year, when in former years such were common from August to October inclusive, held one or more such affairs. And the absence of such rallies, as well as the fact that voters have stayed away in crowds from registration booths, has cut heavily, it is reported, into campaign funds this year.

When Mr. Dewey ran in 1938 against Governor Herbert H. Lehman Westchester gave him a majority vote beyond his own expectations. Washington naval quarters today forecast a giant battle between the United States and Japanese fleets in the Solomon Islands coincident with the bitter struggle for control of Guadalcanal air base, and Secretary of the Navy Knox declared: "There is no concealing there's a good, stiff, tough fight on."

While the Navy carefully guarded its first movements, Washington fleet sources said the likelihood of a sea engagement, possibly even greater than the Battle at Midway, is not so remote.

As the battle raged toward a showdown, bitter ground fighting developed between American Marines and Japanese troops, and the U. S. Army troops, and the encroaching New Japanese army.

Meanwhile, in other parts of the far-flung Pacific conflict Japanese forces have pushed the American and new Allied gains were made on New Guinea front.

RUSSIANS ADMIT FOURTH RETREAT

Germans Throwing Masses Of Reserves Into All-Out Offensive

By the Associated Press Red Army Headquarters acknowledged a fourth retreat in 60 hours in the 64-day-old siege of Stalingrad when the crisis reached an acute stage and the Germans asserted they had broken into "one of the last two nests of Soviet resistance" in the Volga metropolis.

A bulletin from Adolf Hitler's field headquarters said Nazi troops had overrun numerous Soviet positions in the Russian which cut off Soviet forces northwest of the city and left the Russians "face to face" with the German onslaught.

Soviet dispatches frankly conceded that Stalingrad was experiencing her darkest hours of the struggle, with the Germans throwing masses of reserves into an all-out offensive to take the city.

While the picture as a whole appeared gloomy, the German High Command said it believed the Russians were still offering "ambitious" resistance and that Soviet dispatches declared the Red Army withdrew were orderly, with no suggestion of panic.

Reds Open Attacks Against Foe's North Flank

RAINS SET IN

Adolf Hitler's latest week-end offensive against Stalingrad was reported stalling today as cold rain again drenched the cemetery streets, and Russian headquarters announced that the Red Army had held their lines unbroken for 48 hours.

It was the 58th day of siege, just five days short of equating the historic Russian stand in the nine-week siege of Odesa last year.

German Field Headquarters acknowledged that the Russians were launching powerful diversion attacks against the Nazi-guard north flank, above Stalingrad, but asserted they had been repulsed in heavy fighting.

For the second successive day the Germans stressed bad weather conditions along the battle line, declaring that rains were hampering operations in the Stalingrad zone and in the Caucasus.

SOLOMONS SEEN AS ESSENTIAL TO ALLIED LIFELINE

Guadalcanal Battle Climactic War Of Nerves, University Club Advised

The urgency for holding Guadalcanal is far greater than many people realize, for he who holds this island controls the lifeline between the United States, forces and Australia, declared Philip Cummings, noted world traveler and analyst of current events, last evening in an address delivered at the opening dinner meeting of the Mamaroneck University Club at the Orietta Beach Club.

Australia is the last true European strategic point in the entire Pacific area, Mr. Cummings said, and it is ship attacks which will air and ship attacks which will be launched without the very existence of the big English-speaking continent.

"Enemy air attacks on Meke were on a reduced scale," a British communiqué said. Gibraltar had an air-raid alarm during the night and Italian planes dropped bombs on nearby Spanish territory, but none fell on the great rock fortress itself.

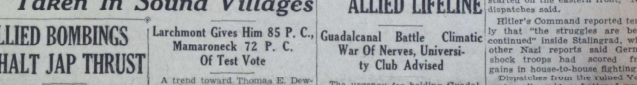

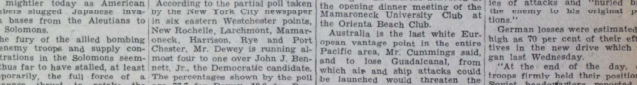

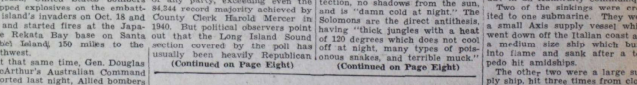
