Because I had a marked response to everything beautiful, conversely, I set out to be tough. And I was tough. I was a boy for the Glaxo, and no honor or distinction or success I may have earned in a lifetime could top the thrill of casual Hi-Ya-boy intimacy with such heroes as John McGraw, Christy Mathewson, Roger Bresnahan, Rube Marquard and Al Bridwell.

THAT AND ONE OTHER thing sticks out in childhood for sheer triumph. I was a New York City boy from start to finish, and I love New York like monkeys love peanuts. Up on 90th Street is a tree I planted when I was twelve years old. I don't think there's any other tree as beautiful as that one in all the world.

When I was ten I was reading the Bible, and I found that I had my own deal with God. I was back and kept it. The Bible lines which I took as personal guides are: Not slothful in business; fervent in spirit; serving the Lord; and the greatest of these is Charity. But this letter has always seemed too easy. There is so much healing, so many untold blessings, and such great returns in giving, that I often wonder where the spiritual benefit lies. It's practical as well as thrilling, and where is the nobility in that?

A Miracle
WELL, GOD and I had our understanding, and I steered clear of all religious matters beyond that. I saw so many kinds of religions and they all seem good, but I couldn't understand why it was furiously against me that church or that crew was it. I grew up of Jewish faith, and reverer those who truly practice it.

It was in France in World War I. A Lieutenant at the time, I was bivouacked in a little village outside of Verdun with 38 men cut off from supplies. The Germans were coming closer and closer; the situation was desperate.

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Neglect By Parents Breeds Crime, Says J. Edgar Hoover

The man who trapped the notorious killer, Dillinger—the most effective hunter of criminals in America, J. Edgar Hoover—puts the finger on the crime of parents against the welfare of their children.

HAVE CLOSELY followed criminal activity in the United States, particularly during the last 23 years. I have seen its results. I have come face to face with those who laugh at the law, who steal, rob, pillage and kill. I have fought against them in their attempts to slash away at our national character.

All during the war years major crime was on the upswing. It reached a 10-year peak in 1946. The fact that every 5.7 minutes of the day and night brings a crime of murder, manslaughter, rape or assault to kill is a challenge that should be answered by concerted action.

At the end of the war, age seventeen led all other age groups in arrest for serious crimes. We now have a generation of juvenile offenders who grew up and graduated into serious crimes of murder, robbery and assault. A general moral decadence in the United States is emphasized by the arrest in 1946 of 108,775 young people under twenty-one years of age for crimes serious enough to warrant fingerprinting.

How shall we explain this situation? What constructive action can we take to alleviate the problem?

Answer in the Home

THE ANSWER lies for the most part in the homes of the nation. Many of the cases coming to my attention reveal the shocking fact that parents are forgetting their God-given and patriotic obligations to the little ones. In a spirit of recklessness and abandonment they are neglecting the children entrusted to their care.

How can we blame youngsters who are ashamed of their mothers and feel that their fathers do not represent honorable names? The conduct of many parents today is directly attributable to the breakdown in youthful morals and character.

I recall one case where four boys, aged sixteen and seventeen, had broken together and perpetrated a series of housebreakings and thefts. Three of the boys were victims of broken homes. Their mother was lacking in the life of the fourth boy. The mother of one of the youngsters had been carrying on an illicit affair with a man in the absence of her husband. Her son knew this and definitely resented the immorality of his mother. He lost the incentive to maintain good conduct and a good reputation for himself.

In another case, a boy first came to the attention of the police when he was ten years of age. He had the questionable distinction of first testing his skill in larceny in his own home at the expense of his father. The boy's subsequent activities ranged from housebreaking to armed robbery. The youngster's parents unwittingly contributed to his delinquency by placing their employment and other interests foremost. As a result, the boy was neglected.

Too Much Selfishness

THE PATTERN of these cases is repeated over and over again. More and more children are being sacrificed upon the altar of selfishness.

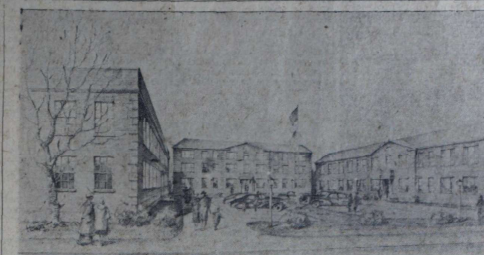

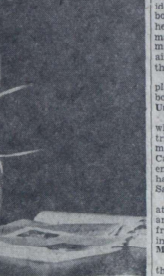

## New \$1 Million Shopping Center Created in White Plains

### Block Long Area Includes Parking Lots

A new shopping center has been created on outer Mamaroneck Avenue in White Plains during the past year at an estimated investment of close to a million dollars. It is hailed as a fine example of an integrated development, although developed in sections by different owners and architects. The block-long section extends from the Colonial Club Apartments, at the junction of Old Mamaroneck Road to Sapham Place. The stores are within a block of a highly concentrated apartment house colony on Old Mamaroneck Road. The stores draw patrons from a much wider area, partly because of what they have to offer in merchandise and service, and partly because of parking facilities. The First National Store and the A & P supermarkets both have parking areas and another parking space serves the stores which have been built into the lower level of the Colonial Club Apartments.

The White Plains Zoning Code requires parking facilities for all new commercial buildings and apartment houses based on floor space and on number of dwelling units. Laurence M. Loeb of White Plains was the architect for all but the two markets. He has established his own office in the Colonial Club development, which also houses real estate offices, a builder, jewelry store, cycle shop, electronics store, and an adjoining gas station.

Ed Lipman developed the rest of the area, starting with the First National Store, which anchors one of the two sections. The A & P is at the opposite end, at the Sapham Place corner, with entrances from both streets. The Lipman development houses, in addition to the two markets, a laundry, drug store, bakery, a cleaning establishment, hardware store, book and toy shop, poultry market and a liquor store, with an aquarium scheduled to occupy another unit.

The million-dollar investment figure includes land costs, building costs, grading, landscaping, parking lot development, equipment and inventories. Mr. Loeb has made a liberal but restrained use of glass brick and metal on the store exteriors. They are modernistic without being garish. In the next block, toward Bryant Avenue, is Mayor Edwin G. McCallahan's modernistic rug shop, and a new branch post office is being built.

### Yonkers Apts. Nearly Ready

The St. Francis Central Garden Apartments, a group of nine apartment buildings are now nearing completion at 1219 Central Park Avenue just south of Dutchess Road.

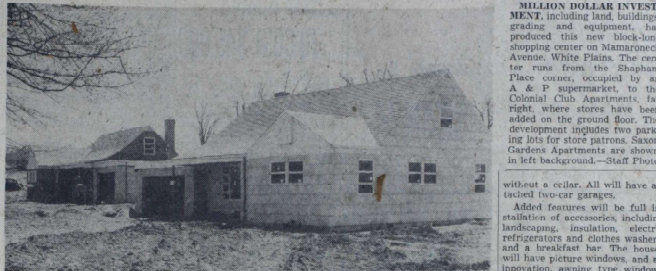

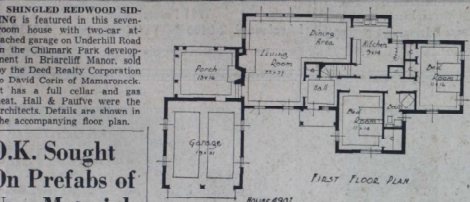

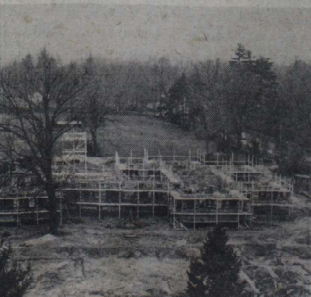
### Work Starts On \$100,000 Store Project

WASHINGTON (AP)—The possibility of further Soviet-American air clashes along the uneasy front of the cold war in Europe is being carefully studied by top officials here.

They are also deeply concerned, they were learned today, about the reasons why the Russians allegedly shot down a U. S. naval plane in the Baltic Sea area April 9. They have demanded that doubt there will get—Soviet assurances that no such thing will happen again.

The formal note declared that the United States Government had concluded that Soviet fighter planes were fired on an unarmed Navy Privateer over the Barents Sea and declared that it was a violation of international law.
