## Con Edison To Drop Gas Price In County

ALBANY (AP)—Four Dutchess County gas companies will reduce their rates for the balance of the year by about \$20.00.

The reduction, representing a refund due to consumers, was announced yesterday by the Public Service Commission. It is the first since last Jan. 1 for the Kings County Lighting Co. and the second in the same period for Consolidated Edison, the Brooking Borough Gas Co. and the Brooklyn Union Gas Co.

Consolidated Edison will cut rates for its 1,300,000 customers in Manhattan, Queens, the Bronx and Westchester by about \$122.00. The decrease in the latter area will be about 2-1/2 cents per cubic foot and 1-1/2 cents per high-heated natural gas.

The PSC said the decrease resulted from investigation of the Texas gas gathering tax, which was reduced by the State on July 15 to Dec. 31 last year. The new reduction brings the year's total decrease by the four companies to \$1,028,500, the PSC said.

WHITE PLAINS—Two white Plains firemen were killed Saturday night when a fire which raged in a three-story building at 11514 Main Street.

The body of Bernard J. Callahan Jr., thirty-nine, of 34 Merritt Avenue, was found on the third floor beneath a section of collapsed roof, beside an air shaft.

That of Salvatore Galasso, twenty-eight, of 285 Laborer Avenue, East White Plains, Harrison, was found floating in the water-filled basement at the bottom of the shaft.

A fire started in the basement, swept up through the air shaft and a dumb-waiter shaft, mushroomed across the first, second and third floors, and broke through the roof. The fire building was ablaze when firemen arrived about 11:30 P. M.

Fire Chief Edward J. MacDonnell ordered a second alarm when he arrived and later called a pumper to aid at the scene; MacDonnell estimated the damage at about \$50,000 subject to an inventory of furnishings and stock in the stores and shops on First Floor.

## SENATE'S ACTION SIGNALS LENGTHY MCCARTHY PROBE

Censure Move Consented To 6-Man Bipartisan Committee

WASHINGTON (AP) — A 75-12 vote of the Senate last night consigned to a special bipartisan committee a censure move aimed at Senator McCarthy and evidence signaled a lengthy new investigation of the Wisconsin Republican's conduct.

Senator Knowland of California, the GOP leader, predicted appointment by Vice President Nixon within 48 hours of a six-member inquiry committee charged with sitting nearly 50 overlapping charges against Mr. McCarthy, the Senate's controversial Red hunter.

McCarthy was graduated from New Rochelle High School in June 1933, and was inducted into service Jan. 11, six spent 16 weeks at Fort Dix undergoing basic training and was sent to the State of Washington and served in Korea. He is in the Reserve Company of the 14th Infantry Regiment.

Coyne Dismisses Bloomberg Suit Against Larchmont Village

A Village of Larchmont local law allowing trading of strips of park land for a parking lot was upheld yesterday in Supreme Court at White Plains.

Justice Frank H. Coyne dismissed the suit of Mr. and Mrs. Irving Bloomberg of Roseton Avenue, Larchmont, a lawsuit to upset the park lot swap. The village Board of Trustees on Nov. 15, 1963, approved the swap.

Justice Coyne said the Board had acted in good faith and was not guilty of any wrongdoing. He said the swap was a fair exchange of land and that the village Board had acted in good faith.

# U. S. GETS WORK TO HALT THREAT OF ATOM STRIKE

Taft-Hartley Injunction Whipped Out to Block Plant Walkouts

OAK RIDGE, Tenn. (AP)—Officials reported "business as usual" today at strike-threatened atomic plants here and at Paducah, Ky.

CIO production workers, who had threatened to strike today at the key atomic plants to enforce their demands for pay raises, backed down in the face of a Federal Court injunction issued last night. The plants produce uranium used in atomic and hydrogen bombs in this country.

Speakers for both sides said there were no disturbances as the dispute is worked out. It was that it was "business as usual."

The Taft-Hartley injunction was whipped out last night by U. S. District Judge Robert L. Taylor at Knoxville to block the strike of 4,500 workers. The move came just hours after President Eisenhower said the government could not permit a stoppage at the plants for fear of national security.

Ernest Pownall, president of the local, promised last night that the workers would be back on the job today as another chapter in the five-month-old walkout.

Injunctions issued at the plants here said that no picket lines were to be maintained during the hours and indications were that the injunction could be honored by the workers.

The injunction provides for a 30-day trial period in which the workers continue on the job and management is barred from holding a lockout while negotiations continue.

Economy High Slump Halts, Outlook Good, President Says

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Eisenhower declared today that a recent decline in the state of America's economic health had "come to a halt" by the middle of the year. He said that prospects for the future look good.

Making public an Administration study of economic conditions, the President said the "recent economic decline" has been "very small."

"The Eisenhower report has been better than any since before the Administration assumed responsibility."

"And since 1933 was a high belt year than 1934 is turning out to be, it follows that over-all performance of the American economy has been better than during any earlier time."

Mr. Eisenhower said 1932 was the best year before his regime took office.

The President said that unemployment is now greater than during the time of the Korean War.

But he said joblessness in recent months has shown some tendency to diminish and this is the eighth year that the unemployment rate has remained below 10 percent.

Among other such signs Mr. Eisenhower said are these: "Retail sales have been recently rising again. Business expenditures are continuing at high rate. New construction contracts are running well above the level of a year ago."

"Inventories have been reduced and are now in better adjustment to current sales. The level of business and consumer confidence in the economic future is high and improving."

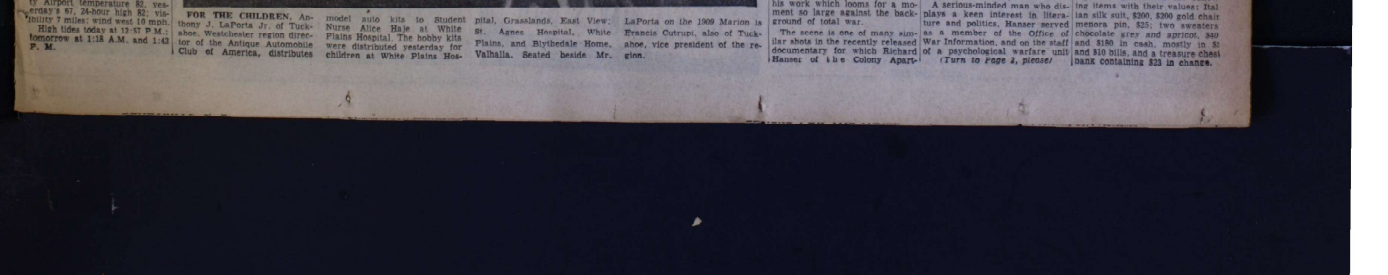

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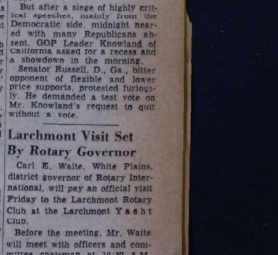

SENATE AND HOUSE TO ACT ON NEW VERSION OF MEASURE

WASHINGTON (AP)—Senate and House conferees came up with a compromise anti-Communist bill today by dropping a provision making new membership in the Communist Party punishable by fine and imprisonment.

# McCarthy Jury Seeks To Reach Verdict Today

## Edgy-Tempered Senators Set Showdown In Secret Session

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senatorial "jury" that probed the McCarthy-Army controversy planned a major effort today to break through barriers of discord and agree upon a verdict.

Edgy-tempered members of the Senate investigations subcommittee, which held 8 days of testimony about charges exchanged by Senator McCarthy and top Army officials, planned a showdown meeting today behind closed doors.

Chairman Mundt, R. S. D., said failure to agree would mean a lapse of weeks or months before the subcommittee's seven members could reconvene for another effort.

Proponents for agreement "are not good, but they're not hopeless," Mundt told a news conference last night.

Senator McClellan of Arkansas said he considers it is "practically agreed" to do so.

Some Senators, however, said privately they have been delaying their vote because of fears that the Congress would wind up, and some due to resentment against alleged efforts to "cover" the findings.

Meanwhile, chairman Watkins, D. N. J., of a special bipartisan committee that will hold a new hearing on the McCarthy case, scheduled a conference today with Mr. McCarthy's lawyer, Edward Brooke, to discuss procedural and other matters.

Mr. Watkins said he does not plan to convene a postponement from their scheduled Aug. 30 hearing date, but that he is not sure the rule of the Senate will be sufficient to handle the McCarthy case.

The special committee will look into charges leveled at Mr. McCarthy as possible grounds for censure at the Senate.

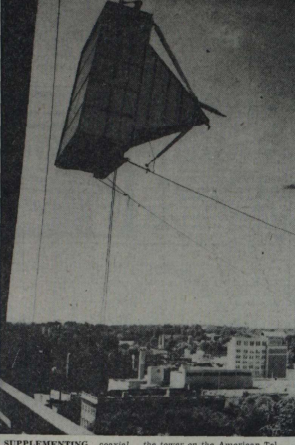

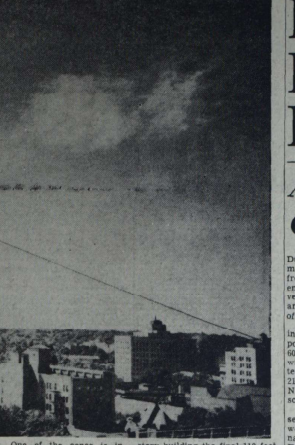

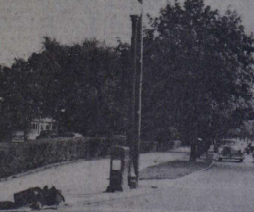

**French Notables See Dangers in Defense Proposal**

PARIS (AP)—Fourteen prominent Frenchmen, including premier, Edouard Herriot and Gen. Maxime Weygand, joined today in an appeal against French ratification of the European Defense Community treaty. The statement said that while they were against EDC, "we equally refuse a negative solution which would place Germany in a politically and morally difficult position."

They said that a number of other plans have been suggested in recent years which would "organize German participation in the political life of the West and in a system of European security which would not prevent France's defense and for liberty the inadmissible dangers which the European Defense Community presents."

It is not a question of reviving any examination of the program now under the participation of Germany in the Western security; the statement says it is a question of reacting in the negative to a treaty which might harm the future of the West than any other form of European organization."

Debate on the treaty issue is scheduled to start in the National assembly Saturday. Premier Pierre Mendes-France told parliament yesterday that his government would not support the treaty but that its defeat would be a serious political problem.

The treaty was signed by Germany, Belgium, the Netherlands and Luxembourg have ratified the treaty. France and Italy, the other two prospective partners, have not.

## NATIONALIST ISLE RAIDED BY REDS OFF CHINA COAST

### Hit-And-Run Attack Not Believed Prelude To Formosa Invasion

TOKYO (AP)—Communist China today announced a small-scale hit-and-run raid on Quemoy, a Nationalist-held offshore island, there was no indication that it was a prelude to the Reds' long-heralded threat of invasion of Formosa.

A Peiping radio broadcast said Communist soldiers made two landings on Quemoy Monday night, killing 11 Nationalist soldiers and capturing 100. The Reds took about 15 miles away.

Nationalist sources in Taipei said the raid was one of several staged by the Reds in recent weeks to build up momentum for an assault on Nationalist soldiers in the island.

U. S. officials in Washington last week would have the Reds' raid from a strategic point of view. They pointed out that the Reds' raid was a prelude to the Reds' long-heralded threat of invasion of Formosa.

The Nationalist amphibious force of 100 miles across the Formosa Strait, flanked by the U. S. 7th Fleet and an American-equipped force, is believed to be in readiness to strike at any time.

For several weeks Peiping has been broadcasting almost daily threats to "liberate" Formosa and wipe out the Nationalist regime of Chiang Kai-shek.

In advance of any invasion, the Reds would be expected to seize a chain of Nationalist-held offshore islands running from Quemoy north to the Tachien, some 300 miles northwest of Formosa.

However, U. S. military experts have discounted the possibility of a Red attack on Formosa, and have pointed out that there has been no large-scale Red troop buildup along the coast opposite the Nationalist island.

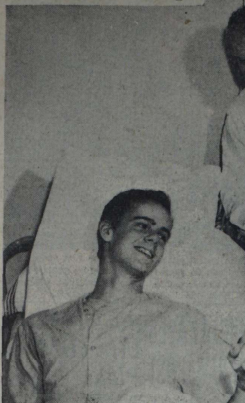

The deputies themselves, facing the showdown on EDC they had put off for 27 months, were in a turmoil of political intrigue that could end in the downfall of the two-month-old cabinet of Premier Pierre Mendes-France.

Mr. Coty returned to Paris on the urging of former Foreign Minister Georges Bidault, a champion of EDC and bitter foe of the present government. Mr. Bidault urged that a full discussion be held on the day's developments before anything final is done to reject EDC.

The Assembly of the French Republic, summoned by the President, is expected to meet on Sept. 1. France rejected the treaty in 1953. The treaty was envisaged under EDC. While this is a GOP foreign policy consultant during that campaign has led to a stable, continuous Assembly.

**MOVE TO REVISE TREATY DELAYS PARIS EDC VOTE**  
Opponents Seek To Bury Plan Without Further Debate

PARIS (AP)—The French National Assembly interrupted debate on the European army treaty today after one of its supporters insisted on an immediate call for new negotiations to change the treaty.

This move by the group in favor of the European Defense Community pact immediately brought a counter move by the opponents to shut off the debate and bury EDC without further talk.

The morning session of the Assembly lasted only about 45 minutes. It was devoted exclusively to the question of procedure. None of the approximately 60 copiers wanting to talk about the treaty itself had a chance to speak.

Under parliamentary rules, a decision on these motions must take precedence over the rest of the debate. A truce was reached yesterday and both supporters and adherents of EDC agreed to withdraw their opposing motions.

This morning, the pro-EDC group had a change of heart and the resolution of the EDC nations was renounced, so was the anti-EDC motion.

The Assembly's foreign affairs committee, by a vote of 20, decided to recommend that the treaty be adopted the afternoon that it adopted the resolution by EDC votes to put off debate indefinitely. This, in effect, would kill the treaty.

Opposing the treaty today yesterday, Premier Mendès-France maintained his one-fence attitude regarding the alliance with Italy, West Germany, Belgium, The Netherlands and Luxembourg. But he warned that West Germany cannot be denied sovereignty much longer.

**SHIVERS' VICTORY PLEASING TO IKE**  
Texas Governor Receives Record Return In Primary

SAN ANTONIO, Texas (AP)—An storm for Cpl. Charles J. Shivers' record return today in the Texas primary election was "highly pleasing" to the reaction of Texas Governor Allan Shivers—a conservative Democrat who supported Mr. Eisenhower in the 1952 Presidential election.

Stephen Mitchell, Democratic National Chairman, says he does not consider Mr. Shivers' victory a sign of anything as national trend or of anything about Mr. Eisenhower.

Mr. Shivers rode a record Texas primary vote Saturday to victory over Austin attorney Ralph Yarborough, backed by liberal Texas Democrats.

It was a runoff election in which Mr. Shivers with an unopposed 50,000 vote, defeated Yarborough, who had a second straight tie to unseat him.

The latest tabulation of the Texas Election Bureau, an unofficial vote-counting agency, showed Mr. Shivers had a lead of 52,400 votes—711,869 to 679,229. The total vote was estimated at 1,450,000.
