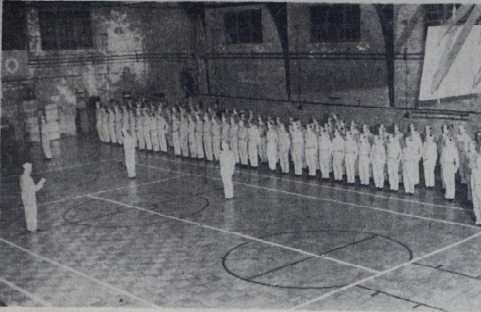

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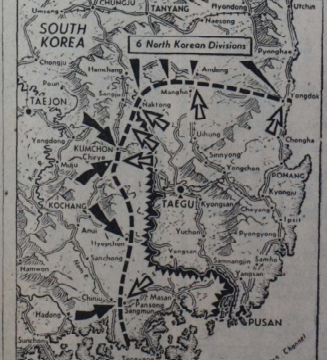

Mandatory Control Bill Junks As House Drafts New Proposal

WASHINGTON, (AP)—The House today junked its mandatory wage and price curbs bill and started over on the job of writing an economic control measure.

The mandatory wage-price bill, which the committee was automatically if living costs go 5 per cent above the level of June 15—was denounced yesterday by President Truman. He called it an invitation for a 5 per cent rise.

The House threw it out on a standing vote of 172 to 161 in which the measure was approved by name. The idea had been tentatively approved yesterday 159 to 107.

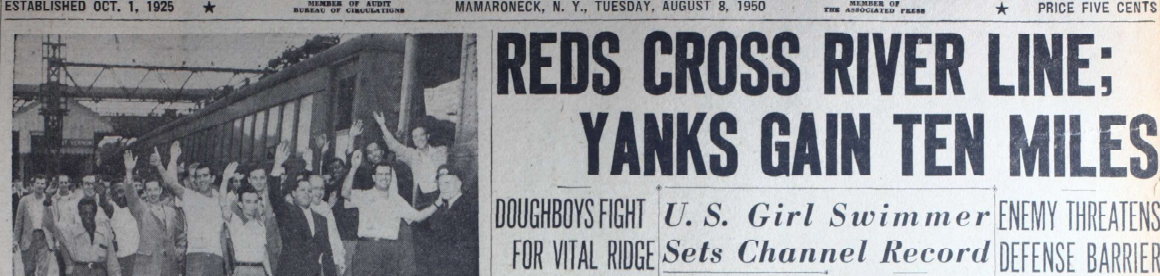

HUGE TAX BOOST PROPOSED BY TAFT

Sees Truman Plan 'Merely A Stop Gap' Before Heavier Levies

WASHINGTON (AP) - Senator Taft, Ohio, proposed today a \$12 billion to \$14 billion a year increase in taxes, to pay the Korean War and America's reconstruction program on a pay-as-you-go basis. This would boost the annual tax take to about \$50 billion, above the previous \$44 billion record raised last year to finance the war. The Treasury has estimated tax collection this year, current present rates, at \$22.6 billion.

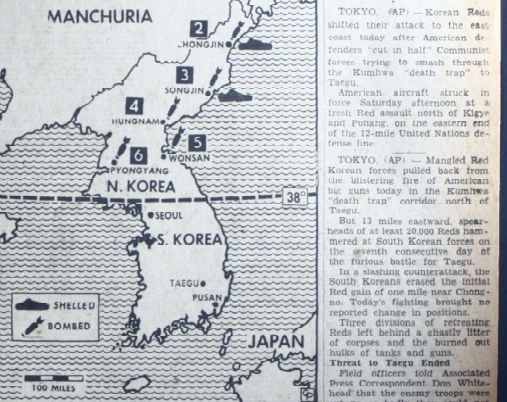

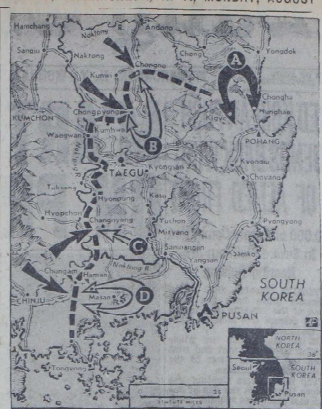
