WASHINGTON (AP) — Government stabilization chiefs look for the overall cost of living to hit another new high later this month.

"The ugly picture of rising prices is plain to anyone with a desire to see it," Price Stabilizer Ellis Arnall said.

His comment last night followed a Bureau of Labor Statistics report that food prices have climbed to a new record — up 1.2 per cent for the two-week period ending July 15 and almost 16 per cent above June 1950 when the Korean fighting began. Food makes up about 30 per cent of the average urban family's budget.

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Agriculture Officials Find Drought Is Worst In History

WASHINGTON (AP) — Agricultural Department officials today termed the drought in the South the worst in the nation's history since the serious economic disasters in the nation's history.

Department officials explored new steps to alleviate the plight of farmers and to save livestock herds.

The states of South Carolina, Massachusetts and Maine and more than twenty other states in the Northeast and Midwest were affected yesterday by the department's first order of drought disaster areas.

The disaster area designation, which qualifies farmers for Federal loans, now applies to eight states and large areas of Kansas and Missouri. The Tennessee Valley Authority, Kentucky, Mississippi and Tennessee are also included.

Assistant Secretary of Agriculture Ross Hutchings pledged the full support of the Federal government to the drought-stricken regions at an emergency nine-stage plan.

9-Week Strike At Rug Mills Is Ended; Employes OK Wage Hikes, Benefits

YONKERS — A nine-week strike, which company officials said cost some 4,000 workers \$5 million in wages, ended last night at the Alexander Smith Co. carpet mills.

The work stoppage was brought to an end by employee acceptance of wage increases ranging from 9 to 10 cents an hour plus improvements in hospital, vacation and sick leave provisions of the union-company contract.

The workers are members of the CIO Textile Workers Union. They approved the strike-ending company offer at a mass meeting.

Union officials said the new contract would increase pay for salaried workers by 10 cents an hour, piece workers and incentive workers are to receive an increase of 5 cents.

The current average pay for all classification of workers was given as \$1.61 an hour.

Production at the rug mills was stopped June 1 by a walkout of 100 workers who demanded wage increases of 25 cents an hour.

MONTECAL POLICE GLASH WITH MOBS

700 Break Out of Cell Blocks, Start 17 Fires; 12 Are Reported Injured

MONTREAL (AP) — Police today took a hard and angry day to quell a mob of hundreds of prisoners in Montreal's Bordeaux jail. It was the third disorder in the prison in three months, and like the others was in protest over food.

At least 12 prisoners were injured, two of them by gunfire. Emilie Drapeau chief of the Fire Department, which was called in to help assist the mob, was treated in a hospital for injuries he reportedly suffered when a prisoner struck him with an iron bar.

Police officials, still refusing to disclose details of what went on inside the prison, denied police reports of one of two mob victims had died. The police said they fired shots over the heads of the rioters.

An estimated 700 convicts broke out of their cell blocks early last night, set off fires, looted the prison, and then proceeded to flood the floors and then clashed with 200 police in a bloody battle in the main prison courtyard.

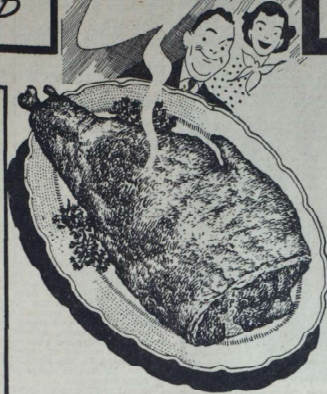

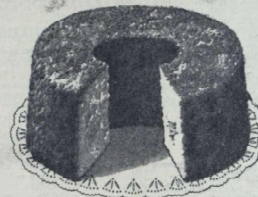

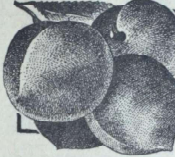

That ended the 54-day steel strike—with a price boost opposed by Mr. Arnall, Mr. Putnam and President Truman and a bill proposed by Mr. Arnall.

In the meantime, Jacob Savin, being set up by Mr. Arnall's agency, the Office of Price Stabilization, apparently assured that retail prices as a result of the steel, aluminum and copper price boosts recently granted.

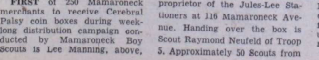
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Ministerial Student Dies In White Plains

WIKKE TO MAKE PLEA FOR MIDDLE ROAD

Will Also Attack Democrats In Speech Set For Steps Of Idaho Capitol
DENVER. (AP)—Dwight D. Eisenhower loaded his campaign gun today for a speech attacking the Democrats and calling on Americans to follow a middle ground course, "rejecting both the extreme left and right."

The Republican Presidential nominee flies from his Denver headquarters to Boise, Idaho, for a major address from the State Capitol steps. Ads are describing it as the general's first frank political speech since he became the party's standard bearer.

Mr. Eisenhower arranged to cooperate in his plea with the Republican Party in Boise with the aid of a fifth divorcee plan to increase Soviet industrial output 7 per cent by the end of 1953.

A decree of the party's Central Committee, published in all Moscow papers, said the party's top control body, its Politburo, would be replaced by a "presidium" which would have the function of the "committee" of the party's Central Committee between sessions.

The changes in party organization are provided in a new statute to be drawn up by the congress, congress would consist of two delegates for every 100 members of the party—one with a vote and one without an "advisory" vote.

Mr. de Greff said that it is a fact that there must be medical research with animals, including those with which the humane societies are mainly concerned.

"On this question," he said, "there can be no argument against intelligent people, just as it is obvious that research with animals."
