AMERICAN TROOPS CARRY CHRISTMAS TO OTHER LANDS

Even Chinese Reds Join Yuletide Festivities On Korea Front

NEW YORK (AP)—As American troops in war-ravaged Korea carry Christmas to the thoughts went out to the thousands of fighting men spending the day in troubled spots around the world—Korea, Germany, Austria, Japan and other lands threatened by war.

All these, however, will have their celebrations, too. There will be parties from home and special Christmas dinners. And American troops the world over are chipped in to buy toys and for needy children in lands they are not helping.

In a Christmas message to his 8th Army troops in war-ravaged Korea, Gen. MacArthur declared the Christmas star "falls burn to lead us in our pursuit of peace on earth and good will to all men."

The 8th Army chief echoed the sentiment of the "good cheer" of Western world when he told his troops that the most Christmas would find them in the homes and peace restored to Korea.

Gen. Van Fleet's words were echoed by his commander, Gen. Mark W. Clark, whose message to the United Nations troops said the faith expressed in the Christmas spirit "will bring us to our goal."

"Although the world has passed through many dark and critical times these past 2,000 years, it is our belief, however dark the hour may seem, that eventually the light of fellowship will show the way to peace on earth," Gen. Clark declared.

Pope Pius Denounces Social Mechanization

VATICAN CITY (AP)—Pope Pius XII, in his annual Christmas message to the world, bitterly assailed the cold mechanization of modern society today and claimed it is "depersonalizing" man. It was his 14th consecutive Christmas message.

The Pope especially directed his greetings today "to the poor, to the oppressed, to those who for whatever reason live in situation and whose life depends, as it were on the breath of life."

He called upon individuals and nations to continue the work Christ had begun and unshove a "flood of help" for the suffering millions.

Referring to the Christmas greetings of the College of Cardinals, the Roman Catholic pontiff's message to the Christian world was broadcast at 4 A. M. EST in Italian over the Vatican radio. The radio planned to repeat the speech at 45-minute intervals in translations into 23 other languages.

The modern world, said the Pope, faces two grave difficulties—a difficulty of economics and a difficulty of conscience.

The difficulty of conscience, he continued, is caused by a contempt of the Christian faith, which has led to the torture of men. This was interpreted as a clear reference to Communism and the persecution of the church (Turn to Page 10, please)

1952 BOWS OUT, MARKS END OF POLITICAL ERA

Two War Deaths, Mounting Traffic Fatalities Made Grim News

As 1952 stalks off into history tonight it takes with it the distinction of having closed a long political era—a generation of national administration by the Democrats. It also leaves a trail in Mamaroneck and Larchmont of minor change in municipal and school administrations, rising school taxes, a residential building boom, grim news from the war front and an alarming increase in traffic fatalities.

More than anything else 1952 was highlighted by a hot-box revolution against the present administration. With the election of Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower in a campaign featured by unprecedented public interest, Americans emphatically demonstrated their concern over Korea, inflation, unimproved world tensions, Communism and corruption in government.

These problems, which dragged through 1952 and gave every indication of dragging through eternally, seemed more important to a majority of Americans than prosperity and full employment, the arguments the Democrats used in asking for another four-year lease on the White House. Americans decided that 1952 was, after all, the time for a change.

Time for a Change

Mamaroneck and Larchmont continued record vote totals to the Eisenhower-Nixon landslide. By more than three to one, local residents favored the General over his Democratic adversary, Governor Adlai E. Stevenson of Illinois. Eisenhower's vote was exceeded only by the plurality given Senator Brewster.

STRIKE TO HALT LOCAL BUS LINE

Service to White Plains To Cease If Walkout Comes Tonight

Residents of Mamaroneck and Larchmont won't be able to travel to White Plains by bus if the New York bus strike comes off as threatened at 11:30 A. M. tomorrow.

The bus line between Mamaroneck and White Plains is owned by the Third Avenue Transit Company and Stuart Riedel, attorney for the company, this morning informed Village Manager William H. Johnson that service on the line would cease when the strike begins.

Suspension of service will affect shoppers, residents who are employed in White Plains, and if the strike should continue long enough high school students who use the line to get to Archbishop Stephen's High School.

The strike has been called by Michael J. Gull, president of the Transport Workers Union, CIO and will affect privately owned cars, 300,000 riders a day in Westchester, Manhattan, the Bronx and Queens.

The union demands a cut in working hours to 40 with no cut in wages and all efforts to avert the proposed strike have thus far proved unavailing.

The Fordham Transit Company, Inc., operating service into New York City, advised connections prepared to throw 15 additional buses into service.

The County Transportation Company will also be unaffected by the strike and will continue to operate service between New Rochelle and Stamford.

Subversives In No Threat To U.S., Dean Acheson Says

Secretary Tells Probe 'They Do Give Us A Black Eye'

WASHINGTON (AP)—Secretary of State Dean Acheson said today national security is not endangered by United Nations employment of Americans of questionable loyalty.

But Mr. Acheson told a House Judiciary subcommittee that the presence of "black people," as he called them, among U. S. employees does give the United States a "black eye."

There is no real threat to security, he said, because U. N. workers do not handle matters "concerned with our national defense."

The subcommittee is making a secret probe for Mr. Acheson to testify before the House Committee on the question of subversives on the United Nations staff in connection with digging into operations of the Justice or State Departments referred in a New York grand jury inquiry into subversive activities by U. S. employees.

An invitation was issued last week by Mr. Acheson to testify. The Secretary of State promptly "declined."

Mr. Acheson had hardly settled into the witness chair before the Congress members were sparring with him over his refusal to disclose the names of State Department employees who have handled investigation reports on U. S. citizens listed by the U. N.

The department has refused to give this information (1) to the New York Grand Jury; (2) to a Senate committee, and (3) to the House committee.

Mr. Acheson said he consulted.

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Truman said today the outlook for world peace is better now than it was a year ago.

He said no new plans for hastening the end of the Korean War has been submitted to him. But he added that obviously he could not talk about such a plan even if one existed, unless it was something to be put into operation immediately.

Mr. Truman avoided comment on two controversial issues—Gen. Douglas MacArthur's latest jab at him and the status of diplomat John Carter Vincent.

He had only a soft word to comment when asked about Gen. MacArthur's suggestion last week that the President was using the "bloody drama" of Korea "as a means of self-justification."

It was just an accident and not a shot at a bandit's helicopter. A patrol car's automatic shot gun used in an attempt to stop a car which was making a U-turn at the intersection of the Union Savings Bank to avert a threatened robbery.

Johnson estimates will cost about \$20 to fix.

The alarm resulted in a plume "up" given the bank by a woman who called the police. The other bandits failed to show their faces or to fire a helicopter and the anti-aircraft gunfire was a waste—fortunately.

Sgt. Passmore pointed out today that the bank is closed at 3:30 and if the holdup had taken place, the robbers would have had to batter down the heavy metal doors to get in.
