WASHINGTON (AP)—Representative Halleck, R., Ind., said today he "certainly" would advise President Eisenhower to veto any tax bill including a Democratic plan for a \$2-billion income tax cut next Jan. 1.

Mr. Halleck, assistant House Republican leader, predicted a Democratic House floor scrap now set for Thursday.

Democratic sponsors of the move and some other key Republicans differed. They said they saw little chance that House members, after voting earlier for a \$100-million pay hike for themselves, would kill a tax cut after the vote was taken.

Whatever happens in the House, trouble loomed in the Senate. The Senate Finance Committee, headed by Chairman Byrd, D., Va., of the Finance Committee renewed its opposition to the tax reductions until the budget is balanced. Senator George D. Aiken, R., Me., member of the committee, termed the House move "unwise and unforfeitable."

The House Ways and Means Committee voted 15-10 late yesterday to reduce the \$20 tax cut into an Administration bill to postpone for another year almost 300 million in tax reductions scheduled for April 1 in a corporation income and estate taxes.

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PRESIDENT ASKS \$101 BILLION FOR LAST ROAD PLAN

Network Urged As Escape Route For Atomic Target Areas

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Eisenhower, asking Congress to approve his \$101 billion highway program, said today the country must have a road network work permitting people to move out of target areas quickly in case of atomic attack.

In an 1,800-word special message, the President cited the danger of "deadly congestion" during atomic warfare as one of four reasons for "action, comprehensive and far-reaching," for highway improvement.

"Better Roads Save Lives" He also said:

"The country's highways would save lives, reducing the annual toll of 36,000 killed and more than a million injured. Mr. Eisenhower said the economic loss from accidents is estimated at \$4.3 billion a year.

"Poor roads add to the cost of living. He said the highway transportation costs are reflected in the cost of goods and are paid ultimately by the individual consumer.

"The country's highways and roads are one of our greatest assets as a nation and national pride. Highway development and improvement must be increased. Unless this is done, Mr. Eisenhower said, "existing roads will not only fail to show their 20 years hence."

Hagen, executive director of the Woodbine Park Association, learned last night at the Larchmont Board meeting after presenting the association's report.
