Building Slumps Here 2nd Successive Year

For the second successive year local building work is prospective in 1949 as applications for only \$1,955,835 worth of construction were received by building officials in the three municipalities compared with a total of \$3,773,794 in 1948.

The drop of more than \$800,000 was almost identical with the use reflected in a comparison of 1948 and 1947 figures and more on earlier predictions of a less building year.

The year 1950 promises more of the same, some of the leading local realtors contend. It is generally felt that the continued high costs of labor and materials will continue to discourage construction this year.

Decline in activity was reflected in all three communities. The Village of Mamaroneck, which in 1948 had 17,063 estimated cost of construction, alterations and additions had only \$738,807 last year. The total for the Village of Mamaroneck in 1948 was \$703,043 while in 1949 cost of construction was \$599,920 were applications for \$2,000,000 for 1948 to only \$220,000 for 1949.

1949 SET NEW COUNTY RECORD
15 Fatalities Recorded; Scarsdale College Boy Year's Last Victim

Infantile paralysis set a record in Westchester in 1949 for number of cases and deaths and in severity of affliction. Records of the Westchester chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis show 217 cases and 15 fatalities during the year.

The 217 cases topped the previous record set in 1948, when the total reached 210. In that year there were but three polio deaths. In 1948 there were 211 cases and three deaths. The total was 43 in 1947 and there were two deaths. There were 28 cases and four deaths in 1946, while in 1945 there was but one death in 93 cases. The disease reached a total of 187 cases in 1944 when there were four deaths.

More than 200 members and guests of the Larchmont Men's Club met last night at the club's Auditorium last night as Jack S. Seidman, member of the Hoover Commission government reorganization, blasted the Federal government as a "hodge podge of cross purposes and duplications that conducts the world's greatest and most vital business in ignorance of the basic managerial principles of authority and responsibility."

Every government function," Mr. Seidman declared, "is tied up in a mass of regulations that goes clear back to 1789. The government is without a system of bookkeeping," he said, "and with a payroll of more than 2,000,000 employees and a payroll of 250,000,000 dollars using the accounting system that Alexander Hamilton used in the days when there were 1,200 persons in the government employment."

Mr. Seidman pointed to various instances of waste and inefficiency turned up by the Hoover Commission on government re-organization.

"Just as examples," he said, "there are scores of agencies established to build government hospitals. As a result there are more hospitals than there are patients in this country. There are 250,000 star members of 150,000 patients in government hospitals in this country. The proposed cost of \$280,000,000 for another hospital is just a drop in the bucket of the government's expenditures. The Veterans' Administration takes four times as many days to settle a claim as does a private contractor. The Federal Bureau of Investigation takes five times the amount of time to process a case as does a private investigator."

He said that at the height of the 1949 epidemic, the National Foundation expended \$109,000 per day to provide aid for more than 40,000 polio cases in the country. Its funds are now virtually depleted, the Mayor declared.

60,000 in Six States Ignore Lewis and Return To Mines

2 Cops Shot, Suspect Killed As Gun Battle Ends Search

According to Mr. Larsen, the purpose of the dinner, at which Mr. Toy will take a leading part, is to give leaders in business, labor and other fields not directly connected with education a chance to discuss the vital problems and opportunities confronting the schools and to learn something about the Commission's program.

Organized to help the public realize the importance of the role of the schools in the nation, the commission will have prominent roles in the campaigns being conducted at St. John's Church, Larchmont, by the Rev. Francis J. H. Coffin, rector; St. Thomas Church, Mamaroneck, by the Rev. Arthur Keith, rector; All Saints Church, Harrison, by the Rev. George Keith, rector; and Christ Church, Rye, of which the Rev. Wendell Phillips is rector.

More than 1,000 men have volunteered to take special training in preparation for meetings with leaders in other groups of men in all parts of the country. The local marshals include Rev. C. M. Walton Jr. and W. S. Hamilton of St. John's; George Bales and Aubrey Crawford of St. Thomas's. This is believed to be the first time any comparable number of laymen has engaged in such an enterprise for the Church.

The Episcopal plans call for emphasis through January on the Church's work overseas. During February the campaign will stress ecclesiastical affairs in this country, and in March the subject will be "Know Your Church," supplying information about the Church itself.

Climax of the campaign will be March 12, when the Rt. Rev. Henry Knox Sherrill, presiding bishop, will address all Episcopal churches.

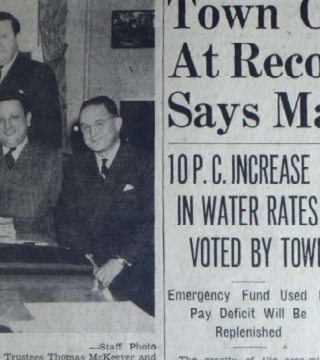

HISS IS LIKENED TO THE DEATH AS TRIAL YEARS END

Prosecutor Brnds Him A Benedict Arnold In Perjury Summation

NEW YORK, (AP)—A government prosecutor today likened Alger Hiss to Benedict Arnold, Brutus, the devil and Martin T. Manion, a federal jurist convicted of "obscure justice."

Speaking measuredly and in a deep voice, Assistant U. S. Attorney Thomas F. Murphy told a federal court jury in his summation Hiss should receive life on the basis of "the immutable decisions" in the case.

Hiss was in the State Department official, is on trial for the second time on charges of perjury. His first trial last September ended in a jury disagreement.

Murphy pointed to the piles of government exhibits which the government claims Hiss passed to Whittaker Chambers, admitted former courier for a Soviet spy ring.

Exhibits Unaltered "They don't depend on anybody's memory," Murphy said. "They have been here 11 years and no one has altered them."

Hiss was calm and collected, but appeared calm as Murphy addressed the jury. Both the defendant and his wife, dressed in gray, the same color they wore yesterday.

Murphy recalled to the jury the Biblical story of Moses returning from the mountain with the Ten Commandments and finding that his people had built a golden calf to worship.

The prosecutor said that when Moses asked the people if they had any doubts as to whether they denied it, but Moses saw the golden calf.

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U. S. THREATENS BULGARIA BREAK

DIPLOMATIC RELATIONS TO END UNLESS BULGARS RECALL DEMAND

WASHINGTON, (AP)—The United States threatened today to break diplomatic relations with Bulgaria unless the Communist country withdraws its demand for the recall of American Minister Robert H. Heath from Sofia.

An American note replying to the Bulgarian recall request was ordered delivered by the Bulgarian Government in Sofia. It was also demanded by Peter Vodyanov, ranking Bulgarian diplomat here.

The note demanded the demand for Heath's recall as simply the latest of a "series of intimidations and restrictions" which have made it virtually impossible for the U. S. diplomatic mission in Sofia to carry on its duties.

The American note added:

"In these circumstances, the Bulgarian Government withdraws its note of Jan. 19 and demonstrates its willingness to observe established international standards of conduct, the U. S. Government does not desire to maintain normal relations.

"The United States Government will continue to withdraw its diplomatic mission from Bulgaria and ask for the recall of the Bulgarian ambassador from the United States."

Those threatened actions of the American Government would constitute a break of diplomatic relations.

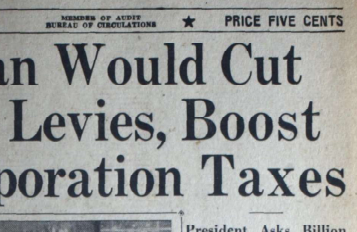

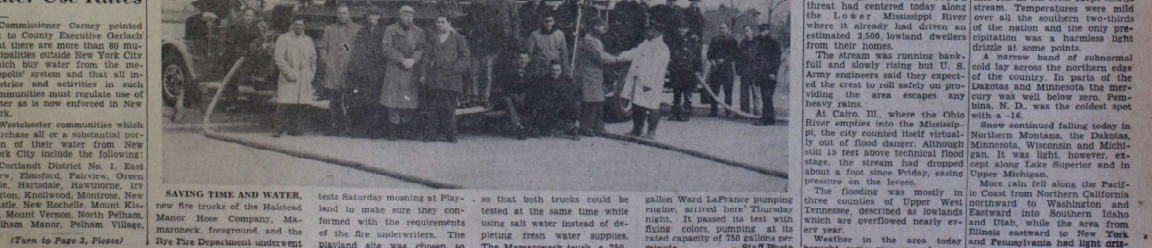

French Newspaper Features Larchmont-Abbeville Story

A story about Larchmont and its adopted French "sister" village, Abbeville, was featured in the Dec. 25-26 edition of the "La Voix du Nord," a newspaper serving the "Friendship Tree" sent to Larchmont residents.

The article, written by the Larchmont Mayor, Walter B. G. Washburn and Mamaroneck Supervisor Owen A. Mandeville, holds the "Friendship Tree" sent to France last Christmas by the Larchmont Chamber of Commerce.

G. P. Estrangin, the Larchmont New York correspondent, tells the story behind this tree, from the time last Spring when a group of Larchmonters came up with the idea of adopting a French village to Christmas time in 1949 when the "tree" was received in France.

The tree was received in France by the Larchmont Chamber of Commerce, Joseph Day, Supervisor Mandeville and Herbert Neslage, who formed a committee for the tree.

"For several weeks Larchmont has been the scene of feverish activity. Each day, after school, Boy Scouts made a collection of postal cards to be attached to the 'Friendship Tree' sent to France by air in order that it should be there in time for Christmas. The very young, who could hardly write, scribbled their names, age and address in clubs, school papers, church and hospital personnel, rich and poor alike, all participated in this touching symbolic gesture in the hope that it would open new paths of friendship and establish more intimate relations between the citizens of these communities on opposite sides of the Atlantic."

"It was last Spring that a group of Larchmonters had the idea of adopting a French village. Their choice fell naturally on Abbeville, whose population, size and importance all correspond closely to those of their own city. The lack, however, was more difficult than appeared at the first. The majority of the inhabitants of Larchmont do not speak French."

CHAMBER STUDIES N. Y. RELIEF BILL

Directors Urged to Protest Proposal to Reduce State Support

The Board of Directors of the Mamaroneck Chamber of Commerce should register a vigorous protest against bills introduced in the State Legislature that would reduce the state's share of home relief from 80 per cent to 60 per cent, the General Division of the Chamber decided yesterday at a meeting in the offices of the Playhouse Building. According to reports available at the meeting, a reduction in the state's share of home relief costs would place an additional \$18,000,000 in the welfare budgets of cities and towns in the state. While the bulk of this \$17,200,000 would fall on New York City, it was pointed out, it still leaves about \$7,000,000 that would have to be raised throughout the state with the bulk of it probably coming out of taxes on real estate.

Real estate is now much too heavily burdened, asserted Houghton, vice-chairman of the division, pointed out.

New Sewer District Bank Larchmont and New Rochelle

Proposed System Would Include Village and Town Areas

Agreement that Westchester form a 10th county-wide district to serve all of New Rochelle and a certain portion of Mamaroneck, Larchmont and the unincorporated area of the town of Mamaroneck was filed today with the Board of Supervisors in White Plains by County Public Works Commissioner James C. Harding.

A survey toward this end had been ordered by the Supervisors, at New Rochelle's request, because of admitted need for a new sewer treatment plant to replace the present New Rochelle plant which Mr. Harding says has been for a number of years "inadequate as to size and capacity, and overcrowded from installation of ground water and storm water."

Estimated at \$4.5 Million

One reason advanced for a county-wide district, rather than the city itself, is to relieve the New Rochelle bond debt margin of the estimated \$4.5 million cost. New Rochelle now has a bonded indebtedness in round figures of \$8.5 million, with a cash margin of \$1.5 million. A new sewerage treatment plant cost of itself, their margin would be so tight that otherwise needed improvements would necessarily be postponed for an extended period.

Commissioner Harding estimates that with issuance of 30-year bonds for construction, the district's annual budget would be \$240,000. This is made up of \$150,000 in interest on the \$4,500,000 investment of bonds at 4 1/2 percent, and \$180,000 operating costs. This would mean an additional \$250 per capita for the city for \$1,000,000 additional valuation. Mr. Harding says, although at Mamaroneck sewer districts, but lower than the \$4.11 rate in the Saw Mill district.
