Only 1,659 Auto Use Stamps Issued At Postoffices Here; 25 P. C. Of Last Year's Sales

Only 1,659 Federal automobile use stamps have been issued in Larchmont and Mamaroneck as the period began today when they must be expayed on all vehicles. The number is little more than one quarter of the 5,300 sold at this time last year with both postmasters reporting that "very few" were sold yesterday when the offices were equipped with last minute buyers.

RUSSIAN PROOPS SURROUND MINSK; BRITISH HOLD FIRM ON ODON RIVER AFTER REPULSING NAZI ATTACKS

Americans Push Near St. Lo In Central Sector

SUPREME HEADQUARTERS ALLIED EXPEDITIONARY FORCE—The British Second Army held firm on its Odon River salient in the seething battle for Caen today, having repulsed furious attacks by elements of seven Panzer divisions.

Thirty more German tanks were reduced to shattered hulks of steel, bringing the total destroyed by the British alone since May 24 to 142 and the total destroyed or disabled to 152.

Indications were seen here today that Rommel almost had taken personal command of the bridgehead in the Caen sector, the death of Col. Gen. Friedrich Dollman, commander of the German Seventh Army.

It was apparent, too, that Rommel still had a sizable reserve of tanks which he has not used in the battle—but which he could use any moment.

Called troops were strengthening their positions on both banks of the Odon River, said Allied communications No. 21 today. JAP today attempted to break through were frustrated in the Caen-Evrey sector. There is nothing to report on the rest of the front.

In addition to the individual sales, four sales of 6 and 2 percent bonds were sold amounting to \$1,000.

The total for individual sales has now reached \$20,013.75 or nearly half the \$40,000 goal.

RAF Heavies Hit Rail Centers Near Orleans
LONDON, (AP)—RAF heavy bombers, maintaining a steady campaign aimed at straggling the Nazi's channels of reinforcement for the Normandy front, bombed rail centers at Vieux, 48 miles south of Orleans, last night in the Allied fifth heavy bomber operation in 24 hours.

Rolling eastward from Chicago, where the Republicans nominated him Wednesday, the 42-year-old Governor bowed forward to a public reception in the massive old capitol from which Democrats drew their 1928 and 1932 candidacies, Alfred E. Smith and Frank D. Roosevelt.

Scarborough Man Killed In Oil Blast
OSBORN—Barns sustained last night in an explosion, caused when a slow burner ignited fumes from failed battery, causing the death today of Frederick L. Secor of Scarborough.

The accident occurred in the late afternoon at the Colet Corporation, of one Elkhart Road, Scarborough. According to information obtained by police, Mr. Secor was killed by the blast and burned about the head and body. He was rushed to Coaling Hospital, where he later died.

Nazi Soon May Assume Full Control Over Vichy
MADRID, (AP)—Diplomatic reports reaching Madrid today indicate the Germans may wipe out the last pretense of Vichy independence within the next week, according to information obtained by the press.

Available information suggests the Vichy Government already was in process of moving. The results of meetings between Germans and collaborationist leaders, it was reported, were that the Germans would assume full control of the country.

Military Chiefs Named To Form Japan Cabinet

By The Associated Press
 Premier General Hideki Tojo, who led Japan into war against America and Britain and had been virtual dictator for two and a half years, has fallen with his entire cabinet and Tokyo announced today that Emperor Hirohito had ordered another general and an admiral to form a new government "in cooperation."

Hirohito's mandate was given General Kuniaki Koiso, governor general of Korea, and Admiral Mitsumasa Yonai, premier in 1940, two of the most powerful leaders of the fighting services. Tokyo broadcast said completion of the new cabinet was expected tonight or early tomorrow.

The choice indicates there will be no governmental departure from the principle of military rule. Both Koiso and Yonai have been known as aggressive proponents of Japanese expansionist policy.

The designation of two men is unprecedented and signifies a departure from the traditional elements of the Army and Navy in a government to cope with the accelerated pace of defeat by the United States and its allies.

The ousting of Tojo was a setback to the sea, and he was ousted by the loss of Saipan July 9, and the loss of Iwo Jima July 17. The flight of the Japanese home and confronting the people with what Tojo himself called an "unprecedentedly great national crisis."

One spokesman said he thought, with the "amazing record" set in the village last day, respondents would work doubly hard to gather and tie even more paper than last time, so that the record could be maintained.

"It will do even better than that this time," another committee member remarked.

One of the workers, however, said he was afraid householders had cleaned accumulated papers and magazines out of their attics last month and there would be no such source of "saved-up stuff" available this time. Also, he said, many people are getting ready to move this Fall and have probably read some of their paper for wrapping purposes.

The story won't be known until Monday afternoon when the freight cars are loaded and passed over the Municipal Building between 1:30 and 1:45 Sunday afternoon.

In a bulletin released this week by the Westchester County War Council, the first S-Day drive in Mamaronck was described as "spectacular." Communities who have also had conspicuous successes, the bulletin states, include Scarsdale, Croton, Hartsdale and Ossining. The local collection throughout the county during June was 220,000 tons, the highest since the start of the campaign.

Reds Roll Back Nazis All Along 200 Mile Front

MOSCOW—Red Army tank and infantry forces, making a surprise bid for Warsaw, rolled back German Panzer divisions today on a jagged 200-mile battle line. Soviet forces were only 50 miles from the Polish capital.

At the same time the German position in the Baltic grew worse hourly, as Col. Gen. Ivan I. Maslennikov's troops captured Ostrow, a strategic 100-mile-long railway, and left Polish 200-mile salient, Tashina, seven miles from Latvia northeastern boundary, was occupied.

The Red 16th corps, through dozens of battles in the make-shift German line on the Polish front, where Hitler troops were engaged in victory, and where now his troops faced disaster.

The battle for Warsaw developed from these giant thrusts by Marshal Konstantin K. Rokossovsky's apparently inexhaustible forces.

After striking the Bialystok-Brest Litovsk Railway at Czechowca, 90 miles north of Warsaw two days ago, Soviet tanks were reported to have advanced at least five miles.

Other Red Army forces were firing a ring of steel around Brest Litovsk, 90 miles east of Warsaw, after mopping up German pockets to the southeast, including Vitebsk, 18 miles distant on the Brest Litovsk railway.

U. S. PACIFIC FLEET HEADQUARTERS, PEARL HARBOR, (AP)—The liberation of Guam—avenging the Japanese garrison which the American forces in December, 1941—was pushed ahead of schedule today by steadily reinforced Yanks swarming off ships onto that former U. S. outpost.

They threatened to pinch off and quickly capture Port Apra, core of Guam's defense system on the west coast.

From mile-long beachheads easily won north and south of the fine harbor, Marines and soldiers were landed to scale heights dominating its rear.

Communications and correspondent eyewitness reports from the scene of Thursday's invasion told of progress and light casualties.

The radio, belatedly announcing the invasion to the nominal Japanese garrison (about 12,000 men) and 150 tanks landed in the vicinity of Asan south of the harbor and a half division at Agat, to the north.

John R. Henry, representing the combined Allied press, reported from a flag ship, that the Yanks and shore defenses were fought off in the landing zone by some of the 10,000 tons of explosives spread over the island through 17 straight days by warships and planes. In the last eight minutes before the first Yanks landed at 8:28 A. M., Thursday, the warships alone poured more than 90 tons of exploding steel each minute on the enemy.

"The Yanks encountered stiffening resistance inland. But they had tanks to lead them, artillery and armor, and they were all unchallenged command of the sea. Above, American planes apparently monopolized the skies for Adm. Chester W. Nimitz's communications made no mention of the enemy air force.

Hitler Readies Last-Ditch Naziism Stand

LONDON, (AP)—Alfred HIEHR, having in effect placed the Reich and occupied territories under an arch Nazi "big four" was believed today to be preparing a general mobilization of all resources in that part of Europe under German control for a last-ditch defense of Nazi Germany.

A German News Agency dispatch reaching Madrid quoted a German Foreign Office spokesman as saying that Germany herself was going to create new and important military reserves and that other countries "allied" with Germany were to be left behind in this program despite the cost.

Propaganda Chief Paul Joseph Goebbels, newly named by Hitler as Reich commissar for total mobilization for war, will address the German nation by radio at 8:15 P. M. today, Berlin has announced.

Forming the "big four" of Naziism to direct Germany's death battle are Hitler, Goering, Goebbels and Heinrich Himmler. Goebbels' chief appointed last week to be an all-powerful commander-in-chief of the army at home. Reports reaching Barcelona said Hitler was preparing an order liquidating "all Europeans in occupied countries" into the war effort without any end limitations.

MOSCOW—Hard-riding Cossacks drove the severely mauled Germans to the east bank of the Wisla River today in the Pulawy area, 66 miles southeast of threatened Warsaw. Far behind the front, other Russian units surrounded Stanislaw and German garrison inside Lwów and broke into that great rail center.

Around Pulawy the Russians captured 100 prisoners of war. The drive also carried to within 142 miles of German Silesia.

Behind the main front plain ideal for tanks and horsemen, such as the heavily armed Cossacks, NKVD partisans and other Russian drivers driving frontally on Warsaw along the main trunk road, NKVD partisans reported between 40 and 50 miles from the front.

Russians were on the approach of East Prussia. They captured Lipka, three miles from the German frontier which East Prussia annexed in the Russian German partition of Poland in 1939 and within 25 miles of the present boundary of that province of the Prussian Junkers. German reports have placed the Russian advance in the area of East Prussia.

Bialystok was invested. Russian forces in its outskirts within 4,500 yards of the major rail center controlling some traffic to East Prussia and Warsaw.

Still other Russian forces were reported within 42 miles of the city of Bialystok and 100 miles from Krakow (200,000) and 100 miles from Warsaw.

Two advances by Marshal Ivan D. Konev's First Ukrainian Army group were flanking the fortress of Przemyśl. The city lies 60 miles due east of Krakow and on the direct road to Lwów, just north of the Carpathian range. One Soviet force was reported 50 miles southeast of Przemyśl.

Decisions appeared near in the Red Army's mighty drive to achieve top great objectives: seize the Baltic from a half; liberate all Poland; bring the war to the soil of East Prussia and Prussia itself, and open the mountain gateway to the Danube Basin.

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Flaming Battle Rages In Streets Of Marigny

By GLADWIN HILL Associated Press Staff

SUPREME HEADQUARTERS AFRE—U. S. tanks in their first major operation in France smashed a breach four miles deep in the first German defense line west of St. Lo today and hammered into a flanking battle with enemy armor in the streets of Marigny.

The heavy thrust, with infantrymen riding the steel tanks and bombers pacing the way, endangered thousands of badly-battered German forces along the enemy's southern defenses. It centered the entire east of Nazi defenses in a couple of hours, carrying four miles south of the St. Lo-Perris Road, and smashed against the first American defenses near Marigny. This is a road junction just north of the highway southwest from St. Lo to Coutances, near the west coast of the Cotentin Peninsula.

Glutted St. Lo Mark VII Tiger tanks have been thrown in by the Germans to stem the attack. Some of these tanks, mounting 88-millimeter guns, were detected behind urban camouflage nets east of Marigny.

Severe fighting raged in and near Marigny, seven miles east of St. Lo, as the Germans tried to stem the advance of the American units still in position along the St. Lo-Perris line to the north.

The American front from St. Lo, west to the sea, is now the summer of a tremendous artillery barrage and a half and captured La Chapelle. The battle also broke the highway from St. Lo to Pterre.

Fighting was fierce and there were heavy losses on both sides. The initial break through was made along a front of 2 1/2 miles. It was spearheaded by burning light and medium tanks on which doughboy units tried to press on with rifle and enemy bazooka men who tried to knock out the tanks.

Russians Enter Latvian Rail Hub Of Jelgava
LONDON, (AP)—Red Army spearheads rolling across the Polish plain were reported within sight of Warsaw today and the German communists said other Soviet forces had penetrated the Latvian rail hub of Jelgava, which would bisect the Baltics.

The Germans threatened a West coast attack had thrown the Russian vanguard out of Jelgava, 130 miles northwest of Dvinsk and about 21 miles southeast of Riga on an axis of the Baltic sea.

British dispatches from the eastern front said Warsaw could be taken by advance Soviet forces in the Polish theater, made up of cavalry, scout cars and tanks.

Fighting apparently raged on in the vicinity of Jelgava as the Russians threatened a blitz of German Baltic divisions by gaining mastery of the Poryk road from Danzig to Kaunas. The Russians already held Danzig, 30 miles west of Jelgava.

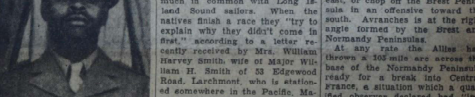

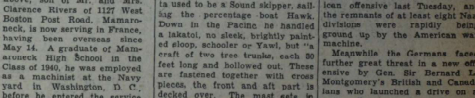

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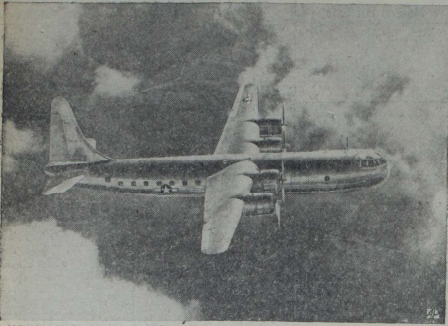
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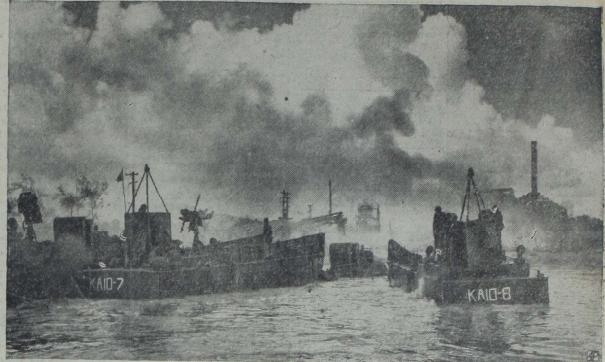

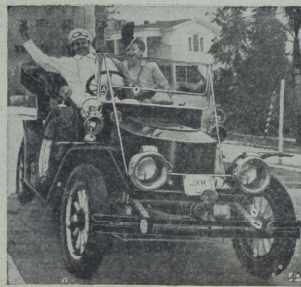
