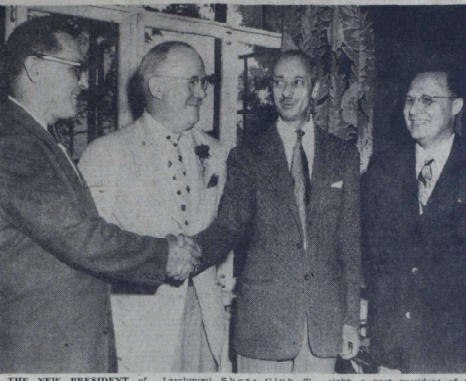

MacArthur Sees No Alarm For U.S. Troops In Korea As Reds Press Southward

Invaders Continuing to Push Forward Beyond Seoul

TOKYO, FRIDAY, (AP)—Gen. MacArthur's communique today reported that Communist forces were continuing to press southward toward Osan and Pusan, 35 and 45 miles south of Seoul, but field detachments put the R. 8 vanguard 60 miles south of Seoul.

A front dispatch from AP correspondent Lambert said the Reds had captured Pusan, 14 miles farther down the coast.
