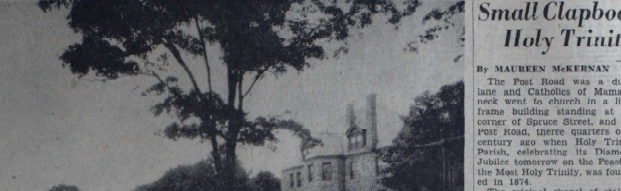

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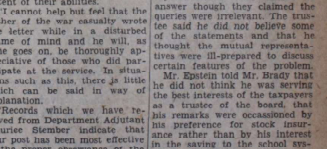

TRUMAN REQUESTS NEW DEPARTMENT TO RULE WELFARE

Changes in Roads And Job Service Set-Up Also Proposed

WASHINGTON, (AP)—President Truman today asked Congress to create a 10th cabinet-rank department—a Department of Welfare—and to put the Commerce Department in charge of public roads.

The plan, seven all told, were sent to Capitol Hill today in a half hour after Mr. Truman signed the bill.

The Public Roads Administration now in the Federal Works Agency, Welfare and social security matters are handled by the Federal Security Agency.

All the bills, if permitted to take effect, will carry out reform and economy proposals of the Commission on Government Organization headed by former President Herbert Hoover.

Plans Outlined

The other five would (a) give the Bureau of Employment Security (Unemployment) to the Labor Department; (b) reorganize the Post Office Department; (c) enlarge the scope of the executive office of the President; (d) stream line the Civil Service Commission; and (e) strengthen the authority of the chairman of the Maritime Commission.

All plans were described by the White House as conforming to the recommendations of the Hoover Commission.

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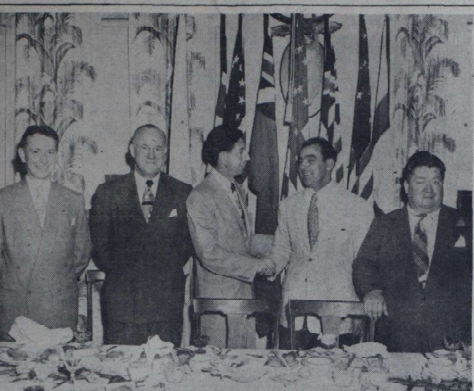

Larchmonter Faces To Retire After 47-Year Phone Service

After 47 years service with the New York Telephone Company, of which the last 27 years have been spent as Westchester Division Manager, Harold R. Wilson announced plans to take a rest.

The company announced today that Mr. Wilson is retiring at his own request as of July 27. It has been under supervision that a large part of the development and expansion of commercial operations of the telephone system in Westchester and adjoining counties has taken place over the last quarter-century.

Born in Ridgewood, N. J., Nov. 27, 1897, Mr. Wilson attended the city schools. At the age of four, he started work as a clerk for the telephone company in New York City. Sept. 10, 1902, he became a counter assistant in 1910, later a correspondence agent and office supervisor, and in March, 1918, he was transferred to the staff of the general commercial manager as special agent.

Then came World War and Mr. Wilson served as private first class in the U. S. Army Sig-

nal Corps. Returning to civilian life in 1919, he was appointed assistant supervisor of methods in New York City headquarters of the company and in 1925 assigned to miscellaneous methods supervisor, and a year later credit manager for the domestic area.

It was on Nov. 1, 1927, that he was appointed Westchester Division Manager, having charge of credit manager for the domestic area.
