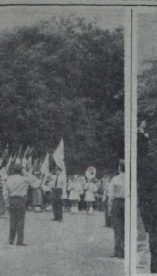

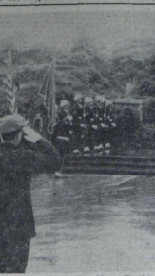

SEoul (AP)—President Syngman Rhee said today South Korea will cooperate with the U. S. in any post-war arrangement of the Korean peninsula, but he insisted on Chinese withdrawal from North Korea after an armistice.

Mr. Rhee said he had received a three-point message from President Eisenhower, but refused to disclose its contents.

The seven-year-old leader's statement came on the heels of a report from Washington that the U. S. had proposed to Eisenhower a mutual defense pact with North Korea, a financial and military aid to South Korea's plan for accepting 25,000 Chinese as U. S. commonwealth citizens.

Justice Douglas, who has been putting the finishing touches on an opinion since June 10, said he would not rule on the stay of execution until he has had time to consider the case.

The group finally recessed at 11:30 p. m. It was by far the longest session of the court.

Rosenbergs To Die Tomorrow Today As Court Rejects Plea

Supreme Tribunal Set Aside Stay Of Execution
WASHINGTON (AP)—The Supreme Court today set aside the stay of execution issued by Justice Douglas to Julius and Ethel Rosenberg. The stay, which had kept them from death until the last minute, was set aside by a 5-4 vote.

Announcement of the decision was made by Chief Justice Warren shortly after the court met at noon today.

The court convened in extraordinary session yesterday to deal specifically with the stay, issued by Justice Douglas only the day before.

Justice Brandeis had said at the time of the stay that the stay would be put to death at 11 o'clock tonight.

The Rosenbergs had been convicted of stealing atomic secrets and passing them to the Soviet Union.

Attorneys for the Rosenbergs had asked the Justice Department earlier this week if it had held their pending appeals.

Prison Breaks Free 28,000 in Rhee Battles

Gunfire Comes From Outside Gates, Aiding Fugitives
SEOUL (AP)—New and bloody mass breaks from Allied stockpiles today resulted in nearly 28,000 of the nation's Communist war prisoners liberated in South Korea's bold defiance of the U. N. Command.

More than 1,800 bolted from five prison camps and a hospital last night and early today, the U. N. Command said.

Mr. Rhee's appeal to the U. S. Executive appeared to be a complete rejection of Mr. Eisenhower's pledge of June 6 to the South Korea communists and to work for a mutual security pact.

Britain Assails Rhee For Betrayal; Clark Set To Sign Peace

General May Approve Pact Without S. Korea, He Says

SEUL (AP) — Gen. Mark Clark, U. N. commander, ordered today with President Syngman Rhee, then announced he can sign an armistice without South Korean approval, but he said doing so would depend upon instructions from his government.

It was authorized at the present time to sign the armistice which has been drawn up," he told newsmen after what was apparently a showdown with the rebellious Mr. Rhee.

Clark said he could not reveal why he was encouraged to sign the pact, but he said the true document was virtually complete, he said there still are problems and added, "The true time table is more or less up to the Communists." He said a truce could be completed promptly "if the Reds desire it."

Gen. Clark's comments disclosed the free-wings South Korean government would check with the U. N. Command before taking any more such line actions as its single-handed rescue of 77,000 anti-Red Korean prisoners since Wednesday night.

Gen. Clark said he doubted if there would have been a truce by now, even if South Korea hadn't opposed it.

He would not say whether he thought an armistice could be reached without return of the 170,000 prisoners and he did not tell Mr. Rhee how the U. N. stood to deal with the situation.

Enemy Demands Capture
Mr. Rhee's action forces the armistice talks on the verge of signing and left the U. N. Command in a bind, he demanded capture of the prisoners and U. N. control of South Korea if South Korea showed no remorse or intention to change its stand against any truce which would leave Korea divided despite a burning Allied desire, the Prime Minister insisted just before the U. N. Command was to meet in Seoul to discuss the pact.

England Not Pledged To Conquer All Korea, Churchill Says

LONDON (AP) — Prime Minister Winston Churchill told a cheering House of Commons today he has not committed ourselves in any way to go forward and conquer the whole area of Korea and take it under the authority of Mr. Syngman Rhee.

At the same time, the Prime Minister disclosed Britain had sent a stiff note to Mr. Rhee denouncing his "treacherous action."

Mr. Churchill said the South Korean President's release of thousands of a 51-Communist prisoners of war had created a situation "full of danger."

Mr. Churchill told the House the matter is obviously very serious. We can all see the casting away by Mr. Rhee of the heavy burden he had taken on himself.

The British protest note to Mr. Rhee, delivered by the British Minister in South Korea today, told him:

As a member of the U. N. military forces are participating in the Korean action but the government of the U. N. Command when the government of Korea had authority in 1950.

Moreover, her majesty's government understands that during recent weeks the government of the Republic of Korea have actually reaffirmed this position by assurances that the U. N. Command would not take any action which would be taken by them.

DATE OF PARLEY STILL UNCERTAIN
July 8 Opening Of Bermuda Conference Depends On Readiness Of France

WASHINGTON (AP) — July 8 has been picked for the start of Big Three talks in Bermuda, but some mid-confusion remained today over how firm it is.

A White House statement yesterday spoke of July 8 as "the present target date" for opening the conference, but added that this plan may be subject to change upon its acceptance by the French government.

On the day, the plan for a Big Three session was announced last month, the French government of Premier Rene Mayer had made four efforts to form a new government but failed since President Vincent Auriol yesterday asked former Premier Antoine Pinay to resign.

Originally, it was hoped that the talks—which British Prime Minister Winston Churchill has been planning as a possible preliminary to Big Four sessions with Premier Malenkov of Russia—would get under way this month. But the absence of a government in Paris threw a wrench into those plans.

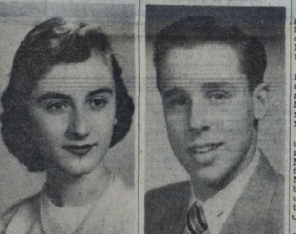

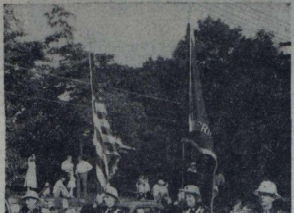
