NEW YORK (AP)—A Russian chainee accused of espionage today refused to answer questions at his arraignment in Federal Court and claimed diplomatic immunity.

Valentin A. Gubitchev, the Russian indicted yesterday with espionage, declared the prosecution against him was "to pursue an end."

However, Justice Simon H. Rifkind answered sharply: "Let the defendant know if he is under the illusion that he is going to be punished without first being convicted by due process of law, he has mistaken a mistaken idea."

The Judge continued Gubitchev's \$100,000 bail and declined to accept an instrument of the suspended United Nations employee that he did not want contact.

Rifkind said he would assign a lawyer to represent Gubitchev when he is set for trial Monday this morning on the indictment.

Ryan Discloses 'Day-Off' Offer In Wire Probe

NEW YORK (AP) — Kenneth Ryan, former FBI agent, disclosed Saturday as a key figure in a sensational wiretapping plot against high city officials, appeared today.

Ryan, object of a widespread police search since his escape from City Hall last Saturday, walked calmly into the District Attorney's office at 12:22 P. M. He was accompanied by his attorney, Paul S. Rieder. Ryan, 41, admitted he had been offered the post of "ambassador" to France if he would drop his name from the wiretapping plot against Mayor William O'Dwyer. Ryan said the offer came from Benjamin Sosenberg, public relations director of the O'Dwyer campaign. Sosenberg promptly denied the statement. Ambassadors are appointed by the President subject to Senate confirmation.

Ryan made this assertion as he prepared to testify before the New York grand jury investigating the wiretapping plot against O'Dwyer and other high officials. He was slated to appear before the grand jury at 2:30 P. M. Meanwhile, District Attorney Frank S. Hogan announced that a key figure — ex-convict Kenneth E. Ryan — sought in connection with the plot had promised through his attorney to surrender "in 10 hours."

Later, Kenneth Ryan's attorney said his client was on the way to the District Attorney's office. The former city detective, no relation to Cleveland Ryan, estimated he would appear after he had been questioned for an hour by O'Dwyer and top police officials. The wealthy Ryan has denied any connection with the wiretapping conspiracy, supposedly disclosed in a sensational exposé on confidential phone calls city officials.

Grand Jury subpoenaed Ryan last night. He is one-time aide to late Mayor Kenneth H. LaRoche and a well-known figure in a budding fusion movement to defeat O'Dwyer. Ryan said the Mayor seek reelection next fall.

G. O. P. APPROVES COMPROMISE ON STATE'S BUDGET

No Slash In Expenditures Due; Other Income Methods Provided

ALBANY, (AP) — Governor Dewey asked the Legislature today for immediate passage of his revamp-modified but record - high budget as "necessary and desirable."

Both Senate and Assembly were expected to vote the budget by midnight.

The budget violates all of Dewey's proposed \$936,200,000 spending Program intact but provides for \$48,000 cut in the State, 200,000 tax increases added by him.

In emergency messages making possible immediate enactment of the budget by the Republican - controlled Legislature, Dewey called for a quick vote.

A short time earlier, assembly Republicans in a party conference approved unanimous passage of the compromise reached between Dewey administration Senate leaders and the Republican tax rebels.

Although both sides appeared satisfied, the Eric and Westchester bloc, which led the bitter revolt, felt they had won a slight victory by blocking proposed tax increases.

As worked out at a conference of Senate Republicans last Friday, the compromise provided for a 444 million cut in the \$196 million tax increases asked by Dewey's requested appropriations, totaling \$936.2 million.

Abandonment of Dewey's request of one cent a gallon in the gasoline tax. The levy now is five cents a gallon.

Collection of only 90 per cent of the full rate of personal income tax money had proposed leaving the full rate.

Dropping of the one-cent jump in the gasoline tax will save \$200 million.

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LIBRARY SEEKS \$1,400 INCREASE

Salary Raises and Book Fund Account for Larchmont Boost

Salary raises and a slight increase in the funds to be spent on books and maintenance account for a six per cent increase in the Larchmont Library budget for 1949-1950 presented last night to the village board. The new budget totals \$24,900 or \$1,400 more than the \$22,900 required by the library this year.

A salary increase, averaging \$150 for each of the six librarians has been requested, totaling \$1,350 for salaries as compared with \$1,440 for 1948-1949.

Miss Pearl M. Day, head librarian, explained today that the increase has been requested because of the low pay librarians receive generally less than other librarians most of whom get a cost of living bonus in addition to their higher salaries.

"During the war we lost many librarians to our campaign, and have had to hire untrained help. Consequently one of our chief objects is to keep experienced members on our staff by offering them a cost-of-living increase."

Books, periodicals and bindings are listed at \$5,000 in the new budget, \$4,600 in the old. Building maintenance at \$2,250 as compared with \$1,950; administration and pensions at \$1,000 as compared with \$850.

Estimated income for 1949-1950 follows: Larchmont: \$31,200; Mamaroneck: \$26,000 and the State of New York: \$100.

The library will again have to operate with temporary appointments on its staff because of the need to obtain an experienced professional librarian for its library.

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CONTRIBUTORS GIVE \$23,000 MORE THAN ASKED; PHONE CO. GIVES \$1,500

Westchester Chapter has reached its quota in the 1949 Red Cross fund campaign. It was announced today by Robert H. Bursall of Port Chester, chairman. A total of \$23,000 has been contributed on the quota of \$20,000.

A gift of \$1,500 from the New York Telephone Company has been received and will be allocated to local committees.

Fifteen branches have not yet found up their campaigns, and will continue solicitation until they have completed coverage.

New Rochelle's quota of \$29,235 is the largest in the county, with the exception of Yonkers, which has raised \$30,000, or 70 per cent of its goal.

"We are deeply grateful to the people of Westchester for their generous response to our appeal," Mr. Bursall said.

Both the national and the local Red Cross accumulated by over-subscription during the war, have been applied to current budgets in recent years, until now they are reduced to the absolute minimum necessary for operation.

The over-subscription, therefore, while not as large as last year, is particularly gratifying, as it helps to offset the cost of the previous years and responsibilities of the Red Cross.

FEDERAL JURISTS TOLD OF RED PLAN FOR REVOLUTION

Prosecutor at Trial Reads Bristling Paper About Program

NEW YORK (AP)—A "manual of organization of the Communist Party" was admitted into evidence at the trial of 11 high U. S. communists today despite vociferous defense objections.

Louis F. Budenz of Crestwood, New York, told the jury that the manual is a duplicate of one given him by Jacob Stachel, a defendant.

Defense counsel said the defendants will be called upon to deny that they had seen or received the document, which should be excluded because the indictment covers a conspiracy which began in 1923.

Prosecution witness Richard J. Glavin said the manual was given to him in 1945 and 1946.

Federal Judge Harold Medina overruled the objections. He said that if the defendants do not admit to receiving the document, he will instruct the jury that they may believe the statements on such points to be true. He said he will give the jury a few words in making objections.

The judge also rebuked a defense lawyer, Richard J. Glavin, for creating "a false picture in the courtroom." The attorney had interrupted the prosecution, who was making an objection.

Glavin said he means no disrespect.

The government unveiled yesterday to the jury a communist master plan for general strikes and revolt "according to the rules of military science."

Demanded Loyalty to Stalin.

Budenz testified that the party had demanded his loyalty to Premier Stalin as the leader of communist revolution in all countries, including the United States.

The witness said he told the defendants, being tried on charges of conspiracy to advocate overthrow of the U. S. government by force and violence, had taken such a loyalty pledge in Moscow.

Budenz was the first witness called.

CONGRESS WARNED ON BIG SPENDING, HIGHER TAX BILL

‘Eventually, We Must Pay Fiddler,’ Rep. Cannon Says in Record

WASHINGTON, (AP)—Rep. Cannon, D. Mo., whose House Appropriations Committee filed a report on government spending, said today Congress is voting heavy taxes without voting taxes to pay for them. He warned: “Eventually we must pay fiddler.”

Cannon sounded the warning as the mythical Senate fiddler took the floor.

In a statement in the Congressional Record, the committee chairman declared for the first time that the Senate fiddler should be voted to reduce taxes in the last session and be voting for every tax increase thereafter by referendum.

The result, he said, “is that eventually we must pay fiddler, where the money is coming from.”

Mamaronock was particularly interested in the so-called “home duty” control and river and harbor bill — amendments which Congress recently passed — to remain after the final vote next Tuesday.

The bill came out of the Appropriations Committee with a total recommended expenditure of \$88,762,000. When the House finished debating it yesterday, the total was \$93,292,270, and the increases were expected to remain after the final vote next Tuesday.

In total still is approximately \$14 million below the President's request, but the Appropriations Committee promised supplemental funds if those recommended turn out to be inadequate.

FORUM TOLD HOW TO COMBAT REDS

Kirkpatrick Lists 10 Ways To Check Spread Of Communism

Citizens should act against communism in their own homes, not “sit around getting worried up and just letting Theodore C. Kirkpatrick, director of the FBI declared last night at the third forum on communism at Holy Trinity School Hall.

“What’s the good of listening to talks and discussions unless it eventually leads to action?” Mr. Kirkpatrick asked his audience which filled the auditorium.

“Communism is so complicated a subject that one can spend a lifetime studying it and then not learn much unless one is a member of the party. However, I can give you 10 down to earth, simple things that you can do.”

“First: Each of you make it your business to read authentic publications devoted to exposing and tilting the truth, not smear and propaganda. Get facts. How do you know these publications are true? Well, for one thing, I recommend that you write the United States Chamber of Commerce in Washington, D. C., and ask for a copy of the pamphlet ‘A Program For Anti-Communist Activity.’ The pamphlet is the best I’ve seen. You will want the bibliography of books and pamphlets.”

“Second: Read, at least occasionally, the official Communist newspaper, The Daily Worker of ‘The Sunday Worker’ and their ideological magazine Political Affairs. Don’t give the Party any money for them. Read them at the public library.”

“At least once in the next few months, attend a Communist Party meeting in Madison Square Garden or Manhattan Center. You cannot get an actual understanding of how deadly serious is their threat until you watch them in action and read their words. You must be able to understand their words until you see and hear them.”

“If every adult in America were forced to read The Daily Worker for 30 days, the Communists would be eliminated within the following 30 days. You’ll be so informed, if you do so.” (Turn to Page 3, please)
