Drivers Changing Tune

Criticism of bus service in the Mamaroneck area at the Village Board meeting was not entirely confined to the County Transportation Company. Frank P. Herz of 1508 Crown Court, who admitted he was not a commuter, said he had heard considerable criticism of the service given by the Surface Transportation Company between Mamaroneck and White Plains.

This is one of the 27 routes on which a fare hike is being sought by the Surface Transportation Company, which is described as "the largest independent operator of buses in the New York area."

Further criticism heard since Monday's meeting of the Village Board has been directed toward the drivers, rather than toward the company. Certain drivers previously described as "arrogant, discourteous, surly or indifferent" have changed their attitude toward commuters during the last few days, several drivers good-will by doing errands and other favors for patrons in an effort to induce the public to petition the company against curtailment or suspension of routes which would mean loss of wages to them.

Stumped With Bills

No Skating Yet

Although the ice on Larchmont Gardens Lake was measured yesterday by the Town Park Department and found to be five inches thick, the ice signaling "safe skating" was not put up.

Reason: The lake, treated with "snow ice" and tried out by too enthusiastic skaters before it was safe to use, was too rough. While the ice was thick enough to prevent any impositions in cold water, the new danger of broken bones and bruises loomed.

Today's rain has made the surface slippery, so Larchmont skaters will just have to wait a little longer before they can try out those new Christmas skates.

Police Retirement

A bill pending in the State Legislature to fix the voluntary retirement age of police department members at fifty-five was approved in a resolution passed by the Mamaroneck Village Board this week.

There was no dissent as Mayor B. J. Santoro explained that policemen who are physically able may continue on their jobs beyond the retirement age if they desire.

COUNCIL MAY GET PROTEST TONIGHT ON FIRE ELECTION

Proxy Vote Investigation Asked; Board May Call For New Balloting

The possibility loomed today that the Mamaroneck Town Board, sitting as a Board of Fire Commissioners at the Weaver Street Fire Station tonight, may declare last week's invalid election of officers departmental and order a new election.

That the fire commissioners will formally ask to make a thorough investigation of alleged irregularities before confirming the 1950 slate of Town Fire Department officers appears virtually a certainty, according to usually well-informed sources.

These sources state that rejection of Chief George W. Burton, renominated for his ninth term in last week's caucus, is not necessarily the intention of the anticipated protest tonight. The object is actually the assurance of proper procedure in future elections with universal proxy votes disallowed and no rereading of nominations.

The Daily Times learned some time ago that the legal department of the New York State Firemen's Association gave an opinion prior to the 1949 Town Larchmont-Mamaroneck unit of proxy votes was invalid unless specified in the department by-law. However, no provision was used to elect Chief Burton last year, it is believed.

Water Use Down BY 17.3 P.C. HERE

Saving of 16.9 Million Gallons is Registered For February

With rain and melting snow keeping the reservoir overflowing, the Westchester Joint Water Works reported a saving of 16,900,000 gallons over the normal February consumption of water by residents of the Town and Village of Mamaroneck and the Town of Harrison. It was disclosed today.

No water had been drawn from the New York City system since Dec. 15 of last year and the saving of 17.3 per cent for February represents a huge jump from the January saving of 9.9 per cent when the volume saved was 8,582,000 gallons.

Normal pumping of water here averages 98,044,000 gallons during February but only 81,109,000 gallons were pumped last month.

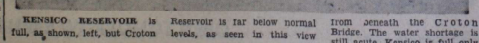

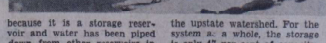

Dr. Richard Ford, head of the department of pathology at Harvard, testified that between 200 and 300 cc of air delivered within 20 minutes would be required to kill a human being.

Dr. Ford said he was basing this estimate on the finding of eight cubic centimeters per two and one-half hours of breathing two weeks were required to kill a dog.

LENTERE GUIDPOSTS
Rickenbacker Says He Found God While Flying On One Wing

By EDIE RICKENBACKER
Edited by NORMAN VINCENT PAUL

Captain Edie Rickenbacker, a Westchester resident, is high on the list of American heroes. A man of inspired and demonstrated faith, he has become in his lifetime almost a legendary figure. He is president of *Exeter* magazine, and one of the country's most vital and active business leaders.

THERE ARE a lot of things about the human mind and soul that we don't know much about. We get glimpses of them when in times of danger or suffering we cross a little way over the line of ordinary thought.

As I roared down the last stretch in an automobile race years ago I felt that I could control that machine with my mind, that I could hold it together with my mind, and that if I finally collapsed I could run it with my mind. It was a feeling of mastery, of supreme confidence. But it was gone.

If I had said such a thing then, the boys would have called me mad. Even now I can't explain it.

I believe that if you think disaster you will get it. Brood about death, and you hasten your demise. Think positively and masterfully, and faith and life become more secure, more fraught with action, richer in achievement and experience.

Perhaps such thoughts as the control of mind over matter and the transmission of thought waves are tied up together, part of something so big we haven't grasped. It's part of us and part of something that is looking after us. It's one of the things that make me believe in personal protection and in life after death. I don't know how to put it into words.

Another strange thing happened to me. Several years ago I was flying to Chicago. It was a Sunday afternoon in the middle of December, and the weather was miserable. We suddenly lost the radio beam. For a long time we cruised back and forth trying to pick it up. Fog was all around us.

Flying Blind on the 'Big Radio'

We WERE LOST, off the beam, and flying blind. Our two-way radio went out, and I lost all communication with the world. For seven hours we flew—where, we didn't know. Nobody knew where we were; nobody even knew we were lost.

Darkness was coming on. Then, suddenly, we saw a break in the mark. The pilot brought the ship down to within 100 feet, and we saw lights glowing on a four-lane highway.

Then we saw a red glow away off to the right, headed for the road. We saw a river gleaming. We saw that river, and out of the dusk of Winter sprang a town—Toledo! I saw the Toledo-Edison sign flashing as we swept over the bridge tops. Skimming the roofs, we circled and landed at the airport a moment later. We had just enough gas left for 11 minutes of flight.

We had found blind without a beam, but we were on a beam, just the same. I like to think it was the "Big Radio" that kept us going—the thing that keeps all of us flying safely through the fog and night toward our goals.

The "Big Radio" is a two-way job. You've got to keep tuned with it, and you have to talk back. I believe in prayer. I learned to pray as a kid at my mother's knee.

One day in France, with only one magnet on my Neoposit biplane functioning, it was attacked by three German Albatross planes. I came out of a dive so fast that the terrific pressure collapsed by right-hand upper wing. No matter what I tried I couldn't come out of that whirl of death. I often wish I could think as fast under normal conditions as I did during that drop.

While I fought the controls and tried to get the engine going, I saw all the good and bad things of ever done, and most of them were bad. Then I began to pray.

"O, God," I said, "help me get out of this."

As a last desperate act, I threw my weight to the left-hand side over the cockpit and jimmied the propeller, and the engine wide open. The thing suddenly sputtered and vibrated violently, and sailed away on her one good wing for France. I held it that way all the way home.

'I Knew There Was a Power'

THIS ESCAPE and others I have had were not the result of any superability or super-knowledge on my part. I wouldn't be too sure.

OUR MOST ENTHUSIASTIC friends think Alcoholics Anonymous is a modern miracle. So they ask, "Why can't A.A. principles be applied to all personal problems?"

The world of today is a problem world because it is full of problem people. We are now on the greatest emotional tender of all times; practically no one of us is free from the tightening coils of insecurity, fear, resentment and aversion. If A.A. can revive an alcoholic by removing these paralyzing liabilities from him, it must be strong medicine. Perhaps the rest of us could use the same prescription.

Not being reformers, not representing any particular sectarian or medical point of view, we A.A.'s can only tell the story of what has happened to us and suggest the simple (but not easy) principles upon which, as ex-drinkers, our very lives now depend.

Fifty thousand alcoholics—the men and women members of A.A.—have found release from their fatal compulsion to drink. Each month two thousand more set foot on the A.A. highroad to freedom from obsession to sanity powerful that once engulfed, few alcoholics down the centuries have ever survived.

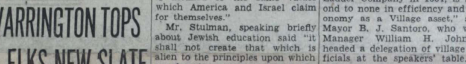
