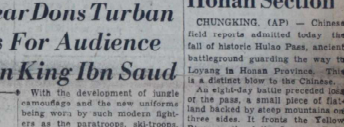

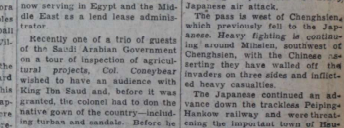

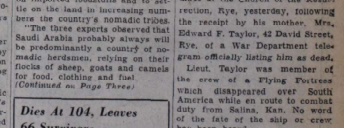

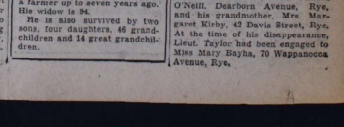

Heavy Casualties Inflicted On Foe Along Frontier

SOUTHEAST ASIA HEADQUARTERS, KANDY CEYLON, (AP).—

Allied forces have gone over to the offensive at all points in the area of the Indian frontier base of Kohima and their attacks are making "satisfactory progress," a headquarters communique said today.

Heavy casualties have been inflicted on the Japanese in minor clashes north of the Imphal-Patani area, the announcement continued. 71 Percent Of Tax Levy Paid By Rye

Because many of its property owners paid their state, county and town taxes last month, the Town of Rye yesterday was able to pay to the Westchester County Comptroller \$135,625.96. The town's share of the 71 percent of the county tax, supervisor Arthur G. Schemm announced today.

That amount represents 69 percent of the \$423,209.54 due to the county from the town of Rye, whereas under the law, the town is obliged to pay only 60 percent of the state and county levy on or before May 15.

The remaining \$138,783.02 to state and county taxes is due on or before Oct. 15. Last year the town's first payment of state and county taxes amounted to 69 percent of the levy.

At the same time Mr. Schemm reported that a total of \$485,225 to state, county and town taxes had been paid during April. The 1941 levy for the three taxes amounted to \$620,853.56.

Potential rivalry or cooperation between the two great powers, Russia and Great Britain, in the contest for balance of power in the Near East, is the most important international world peace problem in the Near East. ALLIES PUSH ROUND-THE-CLOCK ASSAULT ON NAZI RAIL SYSTEM; HIGHWAYS, FRENCH WARNED

Keep Roads Free For Our Troops, London Urges
LONDON, (AP)—The importance of France's transport system in the impending invasion of Western Europe was emphasized by both the Allies and German today as the London radio urged the French to keep off the highways after the attack starts and Vichy repeated that a passenger train service would be cut Monday to facilitate troop movements.

The Allied request to French civilians was made in a BBC broadcast of invasion instructions. It stressed that troop movements must have right-of-way.

The announcement by the German-controlled Vichy radio of the forthcoming passenger train reduction, made originally three days ago and reiterated today, caused many in London to wonder whether the Nazis were setting the remnants of the bomb-damaged rail system for what it was worth in helping to maintain the Atlantic Wall.

Help Monday Will Be D-Day
The latest German strike on the rail system will be on Monday, the same day the French train service change is effective.

On the British side, it was disclosed that emergency units are provided and ready to take action on D-Day to evacuate and provide shelter and food for civilians of the English coast towns that are used as invasion points. Details of the units were kept secret.

ANN ARBOR, Mich. (AP)—Dr. Norman R. F. Miler, University of Michigan psychologist, who forecast the German "fall," predicted today that the German people will liquidate Hitler on the heels of a successful invasion.

LONDON, (AP)—An armed German traveler was torpedoed and sunk and his orders were damaged off the Dutch Coast today when light coastal forces of the British Navy attacked a strong force of enemy patrol vessels which on a pre-invasion offensive sweep of the English Channel, the British announced today.

BULLETIN LONDON, (AP)—Three thousand Allied planes dumped an estimated 20,000 tons of bombs on German airports and rail centers in western Europe today in the 27th day of the great, pre-invasion assault.

LONDON, (AP)—American Liberator bombers continued the systematic destruction of Hitler's western railroad system today, bombing three yards in France after Marauders and Havocs had thrown new blows at airfields near Paris and coastal installations.

The Liberator thrust under-neath of the railroads and Mustangs marked the return of British bombers to the heavy bombers to the pre-invasion offensive after a one-day lay-off.

German radio broadcasts said other formations were over southern France during the afternoon, and Londoners said the ground-landing roar of bomber aircraft winging in from across the 27th straight day of the round-the-clock assault was the loudest they ever heard.

The daylight armadas followed their night's fourth assault on Budapest by bombers striking from bases in Italy.

Last night's heavy and medium bomber attack on the Hungarian capital came close on the heels of daylight blows from Europe in which more than 3,000 Allied aircraft winged in from across Italy and Britain poured some 4,500 tons of bombs into Europe.

Both Army and medium bombers of the Mediterranean Allied Air Force attacked the Hungarian capital today in a coordinated effort to daylight blows against the German invasion route at Wiener Neustadt, Austria, and the Tugay rail center of Kolin, Czechoslovakia.

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Nazi Barrage On Beachhead At New Peak
ALLIED HEADQUARTERS, Naples, (AP)—German artillery barrage on the Anzio beachhead reached a new peak Tuesday night with approximately 4,000 shells lobbed into Fifth Army positions in the space of half an hour. Allied Headquarters announced today.

The same night the German air force sent 15 planes to raid the beachhead port area, but it was announced that no damage resulted and no-ack-ack shot down two of the raiders.

The Allied command gave no report to the board of the Eighth Army troops which yesterday were reported following up the Germans withdrawing to shorten their lines in the mountains of the main route 15 miles inland from the Adriatic.

Traffic Mishaps Reduced 50 P. C.
Traffic accidents in Mamaroneck were reduced 50 percent yesterday by more than 90 percent of the figures for the first two months of 1943, according to a recent report from Clifford J. Plimpton, chief of Motor Vehicle Bureau of the New York State Department of Taxation and Finance.

4 Nations Warned To Quit War Or Go To Defeat

WASHINGTON, (AP)—In a virtual ultimatum addressed directly to the peoples of four Axis satellites over the heads of their Nazi-affiliated governments, the United States, Britain and Russia today warned those nations they must decide now whether they intend to go down to utter defeat with Germany.

SMASH ENEMY PLANES IN SOUTH COAST

Counter-Invasion Thrust Continues Second Night

LONDON, (AP)—The German air force, striking with possibly 300 planes in its counter-invasion aerial offensive, attacked the southern coast of England last night for the second consecutive night and the Berlin radio said today that the assault was concentrated on Portsmouth.

Defensive forces shot down six planes as the Nazis came over in two waves shortly after midnight. Four other coastal towns felt the weight of enemy bombs as the raiders spread through the dark sky. A hospital was hit, causing a number of casualties.

Allied operations from British bases last night were confined to attacks by Mosquito planes against the industrial city of Ludwigshafen on the Rhine River, Germany and an enemy aircraft in France. Four aircraft failed to return to their bases.

The first report of broken windows was received about three weeks ago but no one was reported injured. On May 5 a stone was thrown through a window in the vicinity of 125th Street striking a Methodist church.

Fortresses Bombed German Submarine Center of Kiel

LONDON, (AP)—Flying Fortresses bombed the German submarine center of Kiel and U. S. Liberators pounded German fortifications in the Pas-de-Calais area of France today after a night in which 750 heavy British bombers battered the major inland Nazi port of Duisburg with 2,800 tons of explosives.

The double-barreled daylight sweep carried the newest Allied aerial pride to the western invasion port 80 hours of continuous daylight attacks.

Up to 20 Flying Fortresses and the same number of Liberators, each group protected by a screen of American fighters, struck the twin harbors of Kiel and Duisburg.

Handover, a rail and rubber center, and a German island in Belgium carried the British in daylight.

In all some 3,000 Allied planes, including 1,500 heavy bombers, were in the air over the Netherlands and Belgium.

Nearby every moving piece of Nazi transport sighted in Western Europe was hit with cannon and machine-gun fire. These fighters were seen to strafe German railroads and to burn up German tank and motor vehicles.

Patrols Driven Back From Key Coastal Anchor

At the lower edge of the valley, the Allies punched into the outskirts of Pontecorvo, and in the center of the Italian front cut the Pontecorvo-Pico Road, setting off a German retreat to the west. The German command, suspecting the Allies might have fallen through the defenses, ordered that the line to Terracina, heavily defended by German troops, should be held.

Headquarters said the German were putting up "determined resistance."

Terracina was entered in a swift surprise move by the Allies. The town was flooded by the German and made impenable.

Tokyo Claims Marcus Island Hit By Allies

LONDON, (AP)—A Japanese naval unit approaching from the east had launched aerial attacks Saturday and Sunday against the central Pacific Marianas Island, 1,200 miles southeast of Tokyo. Damage to Japanese installations was acknowledged in the broadcast and the British declared that at least 20 buildings were shot down.

Marianas, an island, is about midway between the Marshall Islands and the Japanese mainland. It has been attacked before by U. S. fleet units.

ALLIES NEAR LAST ESCAPE ROUTE FOR GERMANS ON ITALIAN FRONT; U. S. BOATERS RIP RHINE CITIES

5th Army Drives Toward Key Point In Defense Line

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS, (AP) Thrusting closer to the Caserta, Italy, last German escape route from the main front, Fifth Army reconnaissance elements were reported today in the vicinity of Arlena, about two and a half miles from Valmontone, a strong point in the center of the Nazi defense line below Rome.

Valmontone is 21 miles southeast of the Eternal City. Thirty miles to the south of this spot, a road runs along the main front where defeated German armor and fighting tanks were being massed with equipment, including tanks, behind them.

Lt. Gen. Mark W. Clark's reconnaissance troops in the Arlena area, passing the drive from the beachhead, had advanced about 12 miles from the front of the former beachhead perimeter after the Allies had broken through enemy counter attacks, in which they were being harried.

An official report said the enemy appears to be pulling back heavy artillery from the Cliterna-Valmontone Road. Surging up the Liri Valley, the Eighth Army defeated the German armor with tank battalions west of the Melfa River, knocking out 12 tanks.

The Canadian and British forces pushed to within two miles of the line of the Liri and Sacco Rivers, and within two or three miles of the Caserta-Rome Highway.

Gen. Sir Bernard Montgomery's headquarters at the head of the Anagnino Highway, a long, straight stretch of a road, were today in Rome.

Italians Say They Won't Defend Rome

LONDON, (AP)—The Germans have opened a propaganda campaign preparing for the fall of Rome, and through the Vichy Rufe has spread word that Nazi forces would retire to a new defense line if the city is captured.

Quoting a German military spokesman, the broadcast said: "The city of Rome would not be defended as an Italian city, but as a city of the German people."

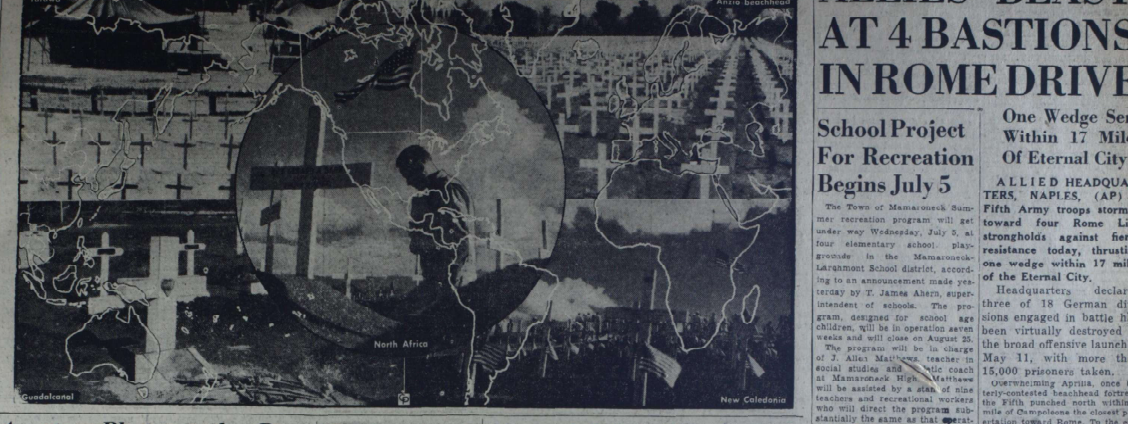

FIERCE FIGHT RAGES AS BRITISH WITHIN 14 MILES OF ROSE; PLESTI OIL REFINERY BOMBED

8th Army Takes Half Dozen More Towns In Drive

A LLIED HEADQUARTERS, NAPLES, (AP)—British troops advanced to a point just south of coastal Pescaraella Nuova, 14 miles south of Rome, and the German front fighting was in progress inside Velletri, Alban hills road junction 18 miles from the capital.

Along the meandering 20-mile front from Velletri to the Alban region east of Cassino, the 8th Army advanced rapidly against withdrawing German rear guards, taking a dozen or more towns.

But in the critical area of the Rome line generally 16 to 20 miles south of the eternal city, enemy defenses were stubborn and skilled. Along 20 miles of battle zone stretching from the Alban hills around the southern slopes of the Tiber to the Caserta-Caserta area.

At some points west of Velletri, the Allies were within six miles of the Pope's Summer home at Castel Gandolfo.

The German assault infantry, guns, tanks and flame-throwers scattered miles in profusion in a desperate attempt to check an Allied breakthrough of their line of established steel and stone fortifications. The din of approaching battle grew louder as German armor units Army attacked gallantly and without pause.

The provincial capital of Frosinone, on the IVa Cassinia 48 miles southeast of Rome, indicated as the Allies moved within four miles from the town and the city of 20,000. Increased enemy fire showed the Germans were intent on holding the village until the bulk of his troops could be withdrawn from the area.

The 8th Army wheeled steadily forward against enemy rearward positions on the mountains of Central Italy, occupying such strategic positions as Frosinone, Cassino, and Capua. They are now closing in with a four-mile front from the Alban hills south to the Tiber.

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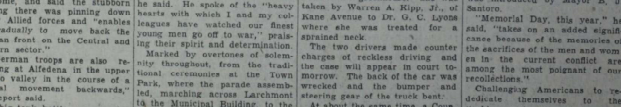
