Offers ets Aid At Cost Henigson Would Supply Material For Nonprofit Building Project ROTARY INTERESTED

The efforts of a group of Larchmont Rotarians to boost the non-profit housing cause took a definite step in the right direction this week with an announcement from Adrian A. Henigson that his lumber company would supply building materials at cost for the construction of a privately-owned non-profit apartment house.

The plan was approved by the Mamaroneck Town Board on Oct. 2 when Councilman George E. McGuire, pastor of the Larchmont Baptist Church, the committee has its eye on a tentative site, a three-acre plot located at Merrick Street and Blossom Terrace owned by the Brunville Trust Company. Such improvements as sewers, streets and lighting facilities are already on the project now.

A committee spokesman said today that the building could be constructed at a cost of approximately \$1,800 per room, each of which would rent for about \$17. The Rotary committee, which has met once to discuss the possibility of supporting such a project, also included Jules Levin, Mr. Mills, Fred F. Schick, Ted Allen, Milton K. Weinstock, and Mr. A. J. Brod.

In offering to furnish building materials on a non-profit basis, Mr. Henigson has set a note that the committee hopes will be taken up by other supply men locally. The project has already received its first concrete steps in the form of a letter under way in Pelham. It is believed that such an apartment house could be completed by the date around 30 veterans and their families. The apartments would be built on a lot of about three and a half and perhaps four and a half acres.

Any builder or other agency desiring to cooperate with the Rotary in its building project would be urged to get in touch with either Dr. McGuire or Councilman Mills.

Nov. 1 Slated As Deadline For End Of OPA Rule

WASHINGTON, (AP)—The Administration's program for ridding the American economy of Federal restraints clicked into high gear today with Nov. 1 set as the deadline for ending the great majority of wartime price controls.

A high official said that foods, services and many commodities will be taken out from under planning by then—two months or more earlier than had been planned before President Truman's recent declaration.

This official emphasized to a reporter that it will be "an orderly retreat" from controls and will not result in "riot or chaos."

Furthermore, for the commodities that are immediately to be added that price lists will remain on prices, automobiles, building materials, refrigerators, furniture, basic clothing items and many other commodities.

Major developments on the fast-moving retreat front included: 1. A 20-cent increase in the price of flour to 11 cents a bushel. 2. A 10-cent increase in the price of sugar to 12 cents a bushel.

Meat Supply Up But Buyers Balk At Prices

Only a small supply of fresh meat appeared in most of the neighborhood butcher shops this week. Ready buyers were indications many customers weren't going to pay the higher prices for beef, pork, steaks, pork chops, ham and other cuts.

Despite a flood of livestock into markets this week after removal of price controls, packers said that several more days would be needed to move even a "fair" supply of meat into retail outlets.

But there was more meat in the country's butcher shops this weekend than for the last several weeks, and at much higher prices.

The American Meat Institute, representing the country's major packers, urged consumers to "shop around for the best buys" in meat and it appeared many housewives were heeding the advice.

From cities across the country came reports of buyers' resistance to the soaring prices asked for meat. And in some instances dairy products, ceiling prices on cattle had been \$3.25 and sheep \$3.65. During the week the highest prices for cattle were a record of \$36 and for sheep \$12.

Reaction to \$1.25 a pound steaks, 99 cent pork chops and 59 cent wieners ranged from "I'd starve before I'd pay that price" to remarks described by one market manager as "unpleasant."

Some dealers, however, refused to buy meat, and in New Jersey the president of C. Taylor, an Independent Butchers Association urged consumers to "struggle" against meat purchases until prices come down "within reason."

Erisco Bids 400 Launch Chest Drive For Capital Of World Tomorrow In Effort To Reach Goal Within Day

Counter Offer Made To Get UN Acceptance ASSEMBLY TO OPEN

NEW YORK, (AP)—San Francisco's glowing prospect for setting up the world peace capital in her environs was ready for presentation today as a counter to New York City's newly launched official propaganda campaign to keep the headquarters of the United Nations here on a permanent basis.

Erisco, who is based in San Francisco, is the official spokesman for the General Assembly meeting which will convene in the new building at Meadow Park, San Francisco's revived hope of becoming the headquarters of the United Nations here since the California Attorney General Robert Keene.

Erisco called a news conference for 4 P. M. as a preliminary to the expected arrival of Gov. Earl Warren of California and Mayor Rogelio P. Corrales of San Francisco. Their campaign to return the UN to the city where the UN charter was drafted in 1945 was launched the day after New York City formally handed over the control of the World City Building on the 1930-40 Works Fair Grounds for the permanent headquarters.

Erisco expressed wish that this might be done by directing the country's attention to the fact that the Headquarters Commission, which is now in the city, is a former City dumping ground, now attractively landscaped.

New York offered the UN a 350-acre site in the grounds for its building center and said the headquarters could be built for \$85,000,000.

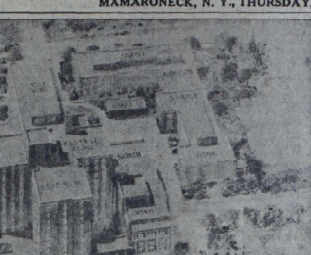
