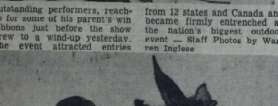
Books to restock the public library of Roseton, Conn. which was voted out by the Annual Meeting of the Roseton Board of Education, are requested of Mamaroneck.

The school has no library. Mr. Friedlander said, "I would like to see a copy of the book 'The Hobbit' by J.R.R. Tolkien."



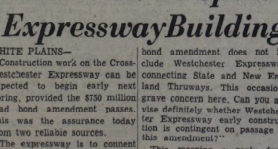

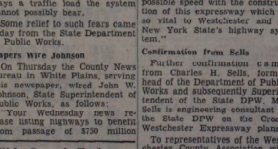

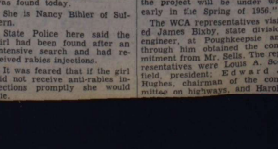

TENSION RELAXES AS EISENHOWER SLEEPS SOUNDLY

Optimism Prevails As He Continues To Improve From Heart Attack

DENVER (AP)—President Eisenhower's doctors reported early today that he had "an excellent night" in his fight for recovery from a heart attack.

The T. A. M. bulletin from Fitzsimons Army Hospital came as a corker of cautious optimism compared to prevail around the President's bedside.

The latest medical report said: "The President had an excellent night. He slept soundly from 9:15 P. M. to 6:30 A. M."

"His condition continues to improve satisfactorily without complications," the report stated.

There was no let-up whatsoever in the physicians' vigilance because the crucial battle was not over until a heart attack would be up until Sunday. Any complications, the doctors have warned repeatedly, are likely to occur during those first few days—and of last Sunday night's attack, the President's condition was not as good as it appeared.

The reason for that is found in the medical bulletin from the President's bedside, which was issued at 8:40 P. M. last night.

"The President had another good day. His condition continues to be satisfactory without complications."

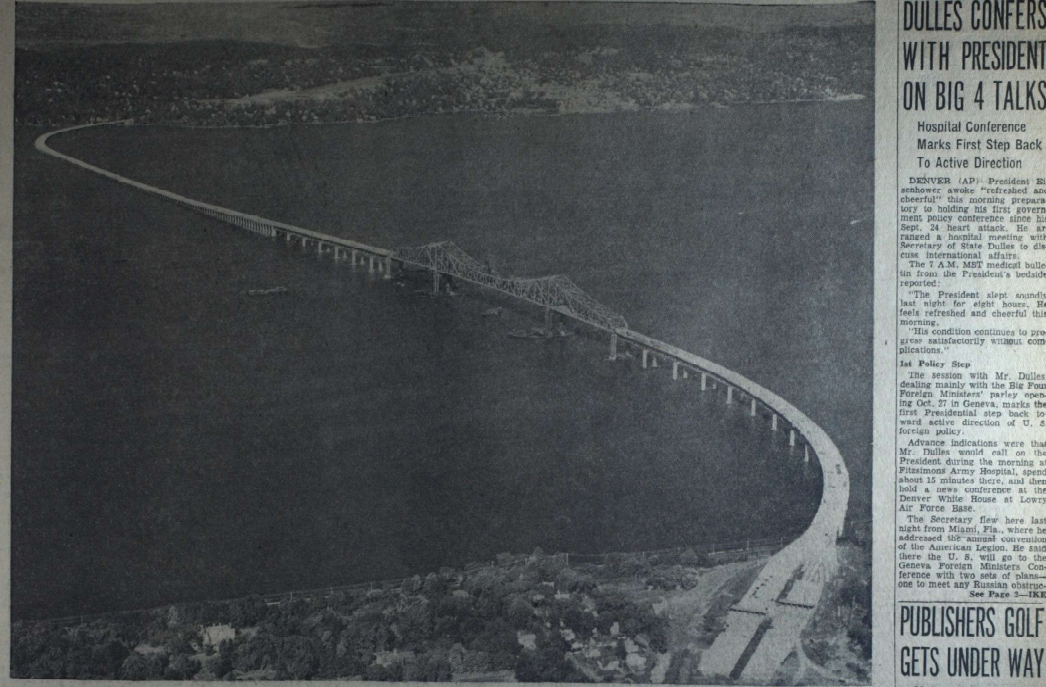

JERUSALEM (AP)—A new Israeli-Egyptian clash flamed the mounting tension in the Middle East today.

An Israeli Army spokesman said 20 Egyptian soldiers were killed and 20 taken prisoner last night when an Israeli military unit stormed an Egyptian camp at Kuntala in the northern Sinai peninsula. The Israelis then returned to their base, it was reported.

West Offers Russia 9-Point Pact With German Buffer Zone

Treaty Calls For Radar Frontier

GENEVA (AP)—The United States, Britain and France today offered Moscow a nine-point "treaty of assurances" as a basis for German rearmament. The treaty would call for Germany to become a NATO member at West Germany's borders with Poland and Czechoslovakia.

The aim of the treaty proposal is to induce Russia to agree to renunciation of military aid to membership in the North Atlantic Treaty Alliance (NATO). The treaty would become fully effective only if united Germany became a NATO member, as West Germany now is.

Together with the security offer, the Western ministers proposed to Soviet Russia all over again a plan for uniting Germany through free elections under Big Four supervision. Virtually the same plan was presented 20 months ago at the Berlin Big Four conference.

Today it appeared the friendly "Soviet Union" had taken the words but it has failed to so far obtain the desired results.

The two camps appeared today to be as badly divided over the treaty as they were in a situation to Europe as a whole. There has been at any time since the end of World War II.

Those are the conclusions which Western and Soviet diplomats alike drew from yesterday's opening round of the Big Four Foreign Ministers conference.

A first maneuver by Soviet Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov rejected the Western Big Three from getting ahead with their major policy proposals on Germany and European security. The move fitted into the developing pattern of diplomatic combat rather than give-and-take negotiations.

UN Disarmament Commission

The U. N. disarmament commission last week swung a similar Soviet request with the argument that it should be taken up first by the Big Four Foreign Ministers. Kuznetsov urged that it be taken up first by the Big Four Foreign Ministers.
