# NEW AGGRESSION MAY BRING WAR, U. S. TELLS REDS

Dulls Issues Warning Against Further Attack In Korea

ST. LOUIS (AP) — Secretary of State Dulles solemnly warned the Communist world today that Chinese aggression against Korea of Indochina might provoke war by the West against China itself.

In doing so, he appeared to be laying down a new general policy of telling potential aggressors in advance where the United States will fight to protect its security.

The Chinese Communists must now realize, he said, that "they could no longer count on the 'privileged sanctuary' of Manchuria and Soviet bases in the event they treat aggression against South Korea.

Mr. Dulles noted the veterans of the Korean War has taught the United States "a lesson which we expect to apply in the interest of future peace." The lesson, he said, was:

"If events are likely which will in fact lead us to fight, let us make clear our intention in advance; then we shall probably not have to fight.

Mr. Dulles told the veterans of the Korean War that the United States "is a nation which will not fight unless it is sure of victory."

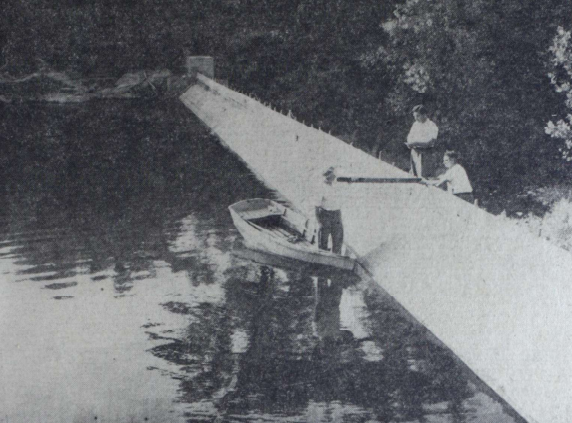

### KEY TO NOMINEE

#### TO OPPOSE KUHN

Democrats To Name Port Chester Mayor For Supervisor Race

Port Chester Mayor Anthony Posillipo will be named Democratic candidate to oppose Republican Edward J. Kuhn for supervisor of the Town of Rye in the Fall election, Democratic Chairman Frank E. McGrath indicated today.

Mr. McGrath said that overwhelming interparty sentiment existed with "many in the street pressure" dictated that the Town Committee announce Mayor Posillipo as the Democratic choice.

Posillipo's nomination was announced at the Mayor's home in Port Chester.

So intense is the feeling for McGrath, "that if the Mayor declines the nomination from the floor then we'll have to go to the polls," he said.

Mayor Posillipo, unavailable for comment today, was the one Democrat to come closest to topping Republican control of the Town when he lost election to incumbent Supervisor John Coward by a bare 71 votes.

The Mayor's defeat, despite the fact he carried the Port Chester districts, was attributed to the fact that he lost the only Republican Rye Neck. His Republican opponent this year is From Eyer.

Deputy Supervisor Kuhn received 1,000 votes, while the GOP Town Committee earlier this month over 1, Leslie Combs, present town clerk.

Other posts up for election this Fall are two councilmen, two chairs occupied by Richard X. O'Connell and Fred Schaefer; town clerk, and Dr. Comstock; justice of the peace, currently filled by appointee Reuben Stirling of Mamaroneck.

The grilling heat wave showed its knock-out blow in time for comfortable weather on Sunday.

It is expected that the cooler will reach here by tomorrow afternoon or night and should bring its knock-out blow in time for the previous 10 days, a steady rising humidity raised Turpin both conditions for the first time in the current hot weather. The humidity at the Westchester County Airport at 11:33 A. M. was 72 per cent, the temperature was 83, four degrees cooler than yesterday at a corresponding time. The maximum yesterday was 92.

## 4 HELD IN ATTACK ON LARCHMONT

### Grand Jury Accuses Men Of Assault During Strike Fracas

NEW YORK—The New York County Grand Jury yesterday handed up three criminal indictments charging four men with assaulting Earl Johnson, vice president of Radio Station WOR, of 25 Homer Avenue, Larchmont, during a fracas with strikers at the station last Sunday.

Members of Local 1122 of the Brotherhood of Electrical Workers, AFL, have been on strike at the station since Aug. 18 because of disagreements with management over job assignments and work conditions.

On Sunday a 35-man picket line was in front of WOR's headquarters at the station. Johnson, in charge of engineers, was on duty. He was surrounded by a crowd and the battle was on. Also in the fray was Patrolman Jacob Ebner of the West 131st Street Station, on duty at WOR.

Four men were arrested at the time. They were charged with assault on Johnson, vice president of Local 1122, according to the district attorney's office. They are members of a sister local.

The four, Thomas McNulty, Joseph J. Brody, Herbert Berkman, thirty-four, of Elmhurst, John F. Shanahan, forty-six, of New York, and Joseph J. Kelly, thirty-four, of New York, were taken to Lower Manhattan Court and paroled in their own custody pending a hearing set for Sept. 8.

In the meantime District Attorney Frank S. Hogan began an investigation of the case and presented the evidence to the Grand Jury, which today handed up the indictments. Warrants for the arrest of the four men will be served at their appearance in Lower Manhattan Court on Tuesday.

**BONN, Germany (AP)** — Germany's victorious a Chancellor Konrad Adenauer today began dedicating a new German government to the "liberation" of East Germany and close armed alliance with the West.

The seventy-seven-year-old Christian Democrat chief opened talks with political leaders on the three of his new administration, after thanking West Germanists for their votes that put him firmly in the saddle for another four years.

Speaking to a huge victory rally gathered in the Bonn town square, Dr. Adenauer called on his people for a united effort to release the 18 million East Germans who are victims of Soviet oppression and slavery.

The Chancellor's consultations on his new government were expected to be short. He is scheduled to present plans for the new leaseup Thursday to a committee of the first cabinet.

The new government must be approved by the incoming Bundestag, lower house of parliament, which is expected to meet here on the first of October.

The voting Sunday gave 48 Bundestag seats to the Free Democrats, both members of Dr. Adenauer's government lost their seats in 1949; three to the Christian Party, which henceforth said it would vote along with the Christian Democrats and the new Refugee Party formed by the millions of fugitives from Communist-occupied Germany.

# Supreme Court Justice Vinson Dies Suddenly

Heart Attack Fatal To Famous Jurist At Age Of 63

WASHINGTON (AP)—Chief Justice Fred M. Vinson, a Kentucky jurist's son who rose to the highest judicial office in the nation, died unexpectedly of a heart attack early today.

The sixty-three-year-old Justice and former holder of the Supreme Court's most important position was stricken while at his Washington apartment.

He wife and his son Fred J. were at the apartment and summoned a physician at 2:30 A. M. Mr. Vinson died 45 minutes later.

Justice Vinson took over leadership of the Supreme Court on June 24, 1946, an appointment of former President Truman to succeed the late Chief Justice Harlan F. Stone.

**Appointment For Eisenhower**

The Kentucky death paved the way for President Eisenhower to make his first appointment to the Supreme Court. Mr. Eisenhower will name his choice within the next three weeks.

**It was believed most likely that Mr. Eisenhower would name the new appointee as Chief Justice. But he could also choose one of the present members of the nine-man court to be Chief Justice and name the new appointee as an Associate Justice.**

**Wife Dies**

There was some speculation that California Governor Earl Warren would be Mr. Eisenhower's choice. Mr. Warren, a Republican, announced last Thursday he would not seek reelection when his present term expires at the end of next year. He gave no hint of his future plans.

Three solutions to the question were proposed by officials. The simplest one is to allow \$400 for the cost of the building by a local contractor.

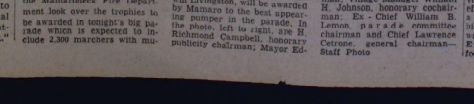

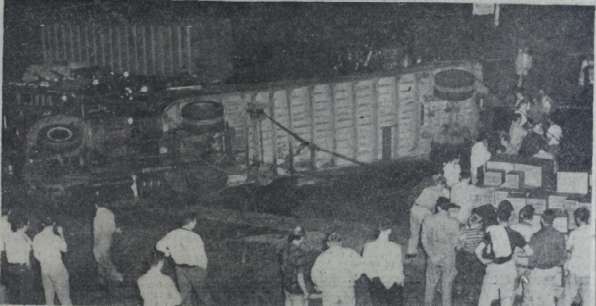

Only Soviet Can Create New World Climate, He Tells UN

UNITED NATIONS (AP)—Secretary of State Dulles declared today that there can be no new world climate unless Russia ceases to contribute toward this end. In a policy declaration before the U. N. General Assembly, Secretary Dulles ranted over major world problems, laying down terms on which tension might be eased.

"The United States is quite prepared to explore ways to end the present tension," he said. "But what the United States does cannot achieve the required goal unless there is an equivalent response."

"Occasions are now imminent which permit, indeed require, the Soviet leaders to show more authentically their present intentions."

Then Secretary Dulles said: "If the Soviet leaders are honest, they must recognize that, there is to be a new world climate, they must contribute more to it than they have yet contributed."

## FRANCE OFFERS TO MAKE PEACE IN INDOCHINA

### Schumann Suggests U. N. Widen Korean Parley To Include Task

### UNITED NATIONS (AP) — France today offered to negotiate with the Communists for peace in embattled Indochina and suggested that the projected Korean political conference be broadened to take on the task.

Such a peace pact, French Foreign Minister Maurice Schumann also told the U. N. 60-nation political body, would make it possible to look forward to the return of normal conditions of international relations in Asia.

The French diplomat said he had heard "unofficial" declarations from two French sources which inspire and arm the Viet Minh rebels. He said that the peace talks should be held in Geneva.

**NEW YORK (AP)**—Rebel workers threatened to tie up New York's ports today as a "tight as a drum" unless a new wage contract is signed by Wednesday.

This move added a new factor to the already tense situation at the sprawling port. Beside the wage dispute, a bitter battle is shaping up between the expanded International Longshoremen's Association and the dock workers.

To prevent possible clashes in the union struggle, all available New York Police fanned out at the pier across the river east of Manhattan, Brooklyn and Staten Island.

**New IIA Set Up**  
The International Longshoremen's Association was thrown out of the AFL for failure to cleanse it of communists. It was promptly set up as a new union by the same name.

The new IIA defied the new AFL union to tie its ranks, threatening to work strikes in port.

The IIA has a contract to bargain with a new contract with the New York Shipping Association. The present contract expires at midnight Wednesday.

Although an IIA official said last night there would be no strike if the talks go past the deadline, a rank and file group plastered the dock area with handbills calling for a no contract, no work stand.

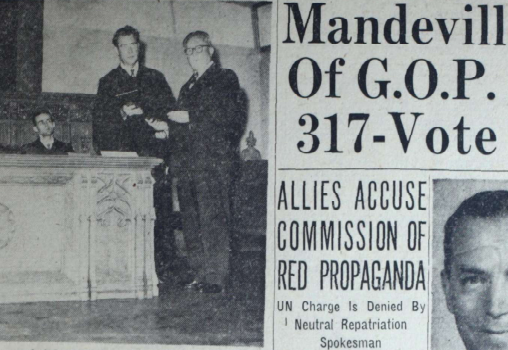
