CAR DEATH TOLL REACHES 420 FOR 3-DAY WEEKEND

Drowning, Other Causes Push Holiday Total To 587 Fatalities

CHICAGO (AP) — America's motorists ran up a near record toll of 420 car deaths during the three-day Labor Day weekend.

Deaths from other causes, including drowning, pushed the total to 587 fatalities.

The traffic toll was about the 400 mark during the National Safety Council had estimated would occur.

Injuries to Cause Deaths
Safety Council statistics show that for each traffic death, 32 other persons were injured.

North Dakota reported no fatalities during the holiday.

Some safety experts contend that the toll could be reduced by an adequate road network to handle the large number of automobiles in operation.

Cash Reported Biggest Need Local Flood-Relief Collections Continue

The combined efforts of community officials, business, public and private groups and individuals in the Town and Village of Mamaroneck and Larchmont continued over the Labor Day weekend to pour supplies into the flood-ravaged Connecticut Valley towns.

Reports from residents visiting the areas indicated a continuing need for these supplies. Cash donations to the American Red Cross and to town efforts to rehabilitate themselves appeared, however, to be the primary need.

Parity of all types to go into the water-wrecked homes began to take precedence over clothing items as residents in the town's hospitals, East View, where they reside near flood-stricken areas.

TURKEY ASSURES NATO OF MOVES

Greece Reported Out Of Joint Manners

PARIS (AP)—Turkey assured the North Atlantic Treaty Organization today that all possible measures are being taken to prevent recurrence of anti-Greek rioting.

This came as reports from Athens said Greece was conducting negotiations in NATO maneuvers as a result of anti-Greek rioting which erupted in the Turkish cities of Istanbul and Izmir Tuesday night.

With relations between the two NATO nations at their lowest point in years because of differences over Cyprus, NATO Secretary General Lord Ismay announced the NATO Council's special session to discuss the grave situation arising out of the riots.

Delegates representing 15 nations in the Western European Organization met for almost two hours behind closed doors.

No communique was issued, but persons who attended said Mehmet Ali Tikrit, Turkey's permanent representative on the council, informed fellow members his country was taking all measures to prevent any new outbreaks.

Georges Kallistris, the permanent Greek representative to NATO, reported on the latest rioting by Greeks living in Istanbul and by Greek officers at Izmir headquarters of NATO's south-east command.

Board Gets Building Plans

\$50,000 Earmarked For Town Hall Site

The Mamaroneck Town Council last night set aside \$50,000 to acquire land on which will be erected a new Town of Mamaroneck police station and general town offices.

The money is to come out of the Town surplus, estimated by Supervisor Owen A. Mandeville at \$150,000.

The plan was presented by the architectural firm of Rogers and Higgins of Larchmont, which also presented plans for a proposed town swimming pool, \$250,000 structure.

The building would cost \$250,000, plus heat, water, gas, and furniture, according to David Fice.

It would be located, according to the plans which are subject to review by the Architectural Board of Palmer Avenue and Weaver Street.

The structure would include full facilities for all town clerical and assessing offices, extra storage and minor parking rooms, police headquarters with rooms, a judge's chamber, and a town and women's hall, and be cause of its location.

ARCHITECTS SEE EYE NECK COSTS NEAR \$2 MILLION

New School-Expansion Figures Recommended To Citizens Panel

The Rye Neck School System building and remodeling program will cost the district from \$2,000,000 to \$4,000,000 more than the \$1,600,000 and \$1,900,000 cost advance last spring by the Rye Neck Citizens Committee after extensive study, according to architect's figures released last night.

Estimated 1954 estimates 485,000; land acquisition (estimated at \$600,000) and a recommended auditorium for Barry Avenue School costing \$500,000 are not included in the figures, presented at a special public meeting of the Rye Neck School Board in the auditorium of Bellows High School.

These cold cash figures revealed during an hour-and-a-half discussion brought murmurs of disbelief from the largest group of attendees at the public hearing, which began in March with the Citizens Committee, and ran through six before the School Board ending July 20.

Comparative figures of Perkins and Will, architects, and the Citizens Committee, will appear tomorrow in The Daily Times.

Vote Follows Stormy Session

Guadagnolo Loses Plea For Downzoning

Members of the Larchmont Hills Association were preliminary successful last night in forcing a vote on the Town of Mamaroneck Council to vote on a plan to allow a proposal of Frank Guadagnolo for downzoning of the Madison Avenue property. The Council voted 4-1 to reject the application.

It was only after a stormy session that the town council members present and announced that the Committee will hold a public session at 8 P.M. Tuesday in the library at Barry Avenue School.

The Citizens Committee had proposed that the applicant should be required to build a \$250,000 structure, which would cost \$250,000 higher.

The Committee estimated Plan A would cost \$1,600,000. The architects' figures were \$2,200,000. If major additions of classrooms under this plan were to be made at Daniel Warren School instead of Bellows High School as contemplated by the Council, the estimated cost would be \$2,275,000. Since this had not been considered by the Citizens Committee, comparative figures were not available.

Walking Beats Rails

Train Of Woes Long; Riders Jounce NHRR

STAMFORD, Conn. (AP)— Commuters who use the New York, New Haven & Hartford Railroad set their complaints in the hands of the Connecticut Public Utilities Commission last night.

They told of riding "the rat" and of tripping "the Bronx holdovers."

"This was the man who got a conviction" from his home about being late for work every morning. He said he has to get up an hour earlier every day now.

There was a fellow who lost track of Train No. 357 from Wilton in New York ever since last December. "I wasn't on the train," he said.

Walking called Foster Burton Ebert of Wilton said the commuter's complaint was sometimes and gets to the Wilton railroad station about eight. So do other riders. He said many times the train from New York stopped about a quarter of a mile from the station.

A housewife said she was concerned about her husband—she always late for work and threatened to pack up and move to a family out of Westport. She doesn't want to move, she told.

ADENAUER CALLS FOR RELEASE OF RED-HELD POWS

Bulgarian Asks 'Normal' Relations At Start Of Moscow Talks

MOSCOW (AP) — West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer called on the Soviet Union's top leaders to release German prisoners held in Russia as a promise to normalization of relations between their two countries.

Opening his historic first meeting with the Kremlin communists, Mr. Adenauer also pleaded with Soviet Premier Bulganin, Communist Party boss Nikita Khrushchev and Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov to "discontinue all negotiations" to speedily conclude with the German people.

Three of the 10 German prisoners, including a pilot, were released yesterday. Mr. Adenauer asserted: "It is unthinkable to establish relations between our states so long as the question of the prisoners remains unclarified."

Mr. Adenauer said in asking for the release of the prisoners that he was not making a "precondition" but rather indicating the essential nature of the relations between the two governments.

Normal Relations Asked

The West German government claims that nearly 10,000 German prisoners are still in Soviet custody. The Russians and the East German government insist that the number is less than 10,000.

WEST GERMAN PRESS DEMANDS POW RELEASE

Adenauer Grim After Stormy Three-Hour Moscow Meeting

MOSCOW (AP) — West Germany reiterated emphatically today in a stormy session with Soviet leaders that it would not establish diplomatic relations with Russia until the German prisoners of war question is settled.

Heinrich von Brentano, West German Foreign Minister, stated the German position during a meeting at Spidovnka Palace that lasted more than three hours.

West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer emerged grimaced from the working session, without comment.

Von Brentano spoke after 8:00 P. M. and said the Soviet Union is not holding any German prisoners of war in its custody 9,626 "war criminals whose sentence was a humanitarian act."

Mr. Adenauer and his delegation, which included the German Foreign Minister, stated they are holding their confidential talks about the talks because of their skepticism concerning security at their Soviet Embassy Hotel headquarters.

The conferees faced each other across the negotiating table in the ballroom of the hotel. Mr. Adenauer and his delegation were seated on the left, the Soviet representatives on the right.

The Soviet press gave the talks tremendous publicity. The first and second pages of both Pravda and Izvestia were almost entirely devoted to the conference.

Both papers printed eight-column pictures of the conferees.

Committee Contradicts Americanism Unit

WASHINGTON (AP) — A special American Legion committee has termed "utterly without foundation" charges that the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization is Communist.

Summarizing an 18-month investigation of the controversial U. N. affiliate, the six-member group said in its report:

"UNESCO is not favorable toward world government, is not subversive and is in no sense of the word a Communist front organization. The special group thus placed itself at odds with the Legion's Americanism Committee which has said it has evidence there are a number of Communist sympathizers in UNESCO.

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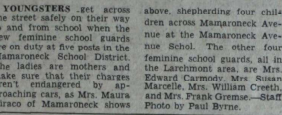

Buenos Aires (AP)—Close in close contact with the Army and Navy leaders in the Argentine, President Peron today announced today it has crushed a revolt by Army and Navy forces in the interior of Argentina.

The government extended the state of siege—virtually martial law—to the entire country. Previously it had been proclaimed only in Buenos Aires, the entire country to remain calm.

Only one death was reported—the shooting of a policeman in the street.

The arrest of 100 civilians at Cordoba was announced in Buenos Aires.

Rebels were reported in Rosario, Argentina's second largest city, with a population of almost a half million, 170 miles north-west of Buenos Aires. At Santa Fe, 100 miles north of Rosario, and at Paraná, 215 miles north of Rosario, rebels were reported.

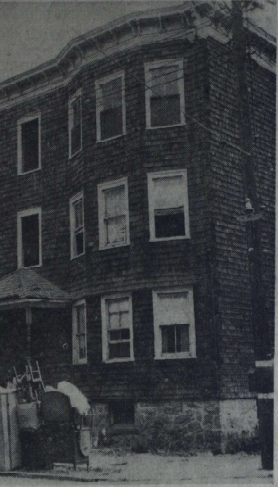

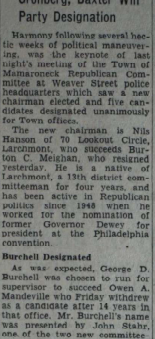

Road Killers Unpunished Law All But Protects Drivers From Prison After Car Deaths

Editor's Note: This is the first of two for a series to answer the question: "Why are we not more watchful to prevent the death of highway motorists?"

By JOSEPH MORTIMER. Motors involved in a fatal accident can almost be sure they will not have to go to prison as a result.

They are all protected from convictions for criminal negligence by a variety of circumstances, the score of which is a series of laws which make illegal only the negligent.

Of those indicted, two defendants were acquitted by a jury; two pleaded guilty.

Measurable auto deaths in the County have averaged in the 70's each year—76, 75, 77, 72 and 73, with this year to date paralleling last year.

Since the start of 1935, 36 vehicle fatality cases have been considered as possibly criminal and sent to the grand jury for consideration. The result: 17 died.

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8 DEAD, 15 HURT IN 4-HOUSE FIRE AT CONEY ISLAND

Several Swept As Flames Raced Through Frame Dwellings

Rebels With Accord Win Peron's Men

REBELLION (AP) — The rebel forces of the Army and Navy won a peace agreement today from the loyalist government.

The rebels established one of their leaders, Eduardo Lonardi, as provisional president of the nation.

Mr. Lonardi was a military general who served in the Argentine army in 1931 on the suspicion that he was plotting against the government.

He directed the rebellion of the last few days in the Cordoba province.

Signing of the peace pact was announced in a communique from the Junta which took control of loyalist-held areas after Mr. Peron fell.

A broadcast from the rebel station at Cordoba earlier today proclaimed a governmental national government and said Mr. Lonardi had been elected president.

The Argentine state radio broadcast a statement by Mr. Peron today.

The military junta, by virtue of the authority assumed by the resignation presented by his excellency the president of the nation, has accepted the resignation with the command of the situation.

On Sept. 22, Gen. Donato Manuel de la Plata, president of the military junta, will take charge of the provisional government.

At the start of the revolution Gen. Lonardi was proclaimed as the leader of the rebellion.

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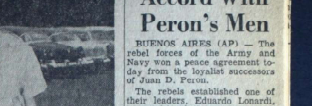
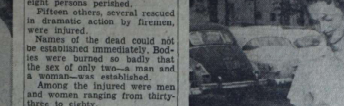
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Weathermen Weary As One Goes To Sea

Adams Tough, Hardworking Man Ike Calls 'Boss' Ready To Take Over

WASHINGTON (AP)—"The Boss," as President Eisenhower has aptly referred to him, flew to Denver today to take charge of the temporary White House.

"The Boss" is fifty-six-year-old, white haired Sherman Adams, a one-time lumberjack who as Mr. Eisenhower's No. 1 aide has become one of the most influential men in the nation.

With Mr. Eisenhower hospitalized in his native state of New Hampshire, Mr. Adams has taken over the major and minor problems that develop as important decisions are taken up with the President. Officially, he's listed as "the assistant to the President."

And if you want to make haste with a temporary arrangement, as urged as the President's health, Mr. Adams has a reputation around Washington as the man to see if you want something from the President. Officially, he's listed as "the assistant to the President."

Mr. Adams himself, a former two-term governor of New Hampshire, looks on his \$20,000-a-year job as protection for the President against the tremendous pressures that go with the job of the nation's Chief Executive.

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Moscow Radio Attacks Ike's Swap Plans

WASHINGTON (AP)—Moscow radio broadcasts provided new evidence today that the Soviet Union has in fact rejected President Eisenhower's proposal for an exchange of aerial inspection and military blueprints in advance of an agreement on a complete, global disarmament program.

While avoiding criticism of Mr. Eisenhower, Moscow broadcasts recorded here are beginning to attack it as an "inspection-without-arm-reduction plan."

One broadcast contended that the United States would send in one million fissionable materials in exchange for Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev's proposal to send in 500,000 tons of atomic material.

NEW YORK (AP)—New York's State GOP Chairman, L. Judson Morhouse, says the Republican Party could consume treasonous Eisenhower's program "with any one of several men, both in or out of government," as the president does not run for re-election next year.

He said these men, whom he did not identify, are endowed with high purpose and the qualities and capabilities for national leadership.

Government Shifts Back To Denver As President Improves

DENVER (AP)—The direction of government shifted back to Denver today as President Eisenhower continued to improve from his heart attack and his chief deputy flew here from Washington.

At the same time, one of his principal physicians added to the growing evidence Mr. Eisenhower will return at the end of his present term by saying if he were the President he "wouldn't want to run again."

Dr. Paul Dudley White, asked whether it would be possible for the President to run again, told a national television audience: "Many things are possible that may not be advisable. It is up to him to make the decision. He may or may not have complete recovery. If I were in his shoes I wouldn't want to run again, having seen the strain."
