On Winter Sport Facilities in New York State

We thought it was about time that you had some idea of what New York State has to offer in the way of winter sports. Here is the best information we have been able to get hold of.

Recent contacts throughout the State New York have completed more than 100 miles of ski-touring and other improvements this year. Much as any time in recent years to greet a great influx of outdoor sports enthusiasts during the winter, according to an official state survey.

Topographic details of winter sports facilities in the regions of the Adirondacks, St. Lawrence, Thousand Islands, Saratoga-Lake George, Catskill, New York, Genesee and Westchester counties have been compiled by the Bureau of Forestry, Division of Commerce and are available free upon request in two booklets, "On the East of Winter in New York State" and "Ski Trails of New York State."

These state guides will include information on skiing, tobogganing, ice skating, snow-jumping, snowshoeing and other sports activities available with the best means of transportation to the sports centers.

The internationally famous winter sports area of Lake Placid, in the Adirondacks, offers this year more than 100 miles of ski-touring trails, ten downhill ski runs and five ski jumps, with skis-touring open slopes, skium courses and downhill trails.

Many New Trails Open This Winter

North Creek has one of the most extensive systems of downhill trails in the state—30 miles of skis-touring and 40 miles of wilderness trails.

New trails have been opened at Champlain Lake, Bolton, Ontario and Watkins, St. Lawrence County, St. Albans Lake, three or four miles of state trails for cross-country skiing and three downhill trails. Minerva is situated in the center of an exceptionally fine system of cross-country trails, including the Adirondack, in addition to having interesting facilities for a ski school.

Modern improvements and a system of 31 trails are now being developed in the southwestern portion of the Adirondack Park, in the Forge area of the Central Adirondacks and all miles of cross-country routes, 14 development trails and skium open slopes, skium and practice slopes.

In the Saratoga-Lake George region a new skium trail is being opened on Forge Mountain. Lake George has the cross-country and downhill and cross-country trails on Prospect Mountain. Fine trails, runs and ski jumps are maintained in the Lake Luzerne-Adirondack area, Saratoga Springs and Northville.

Central New York Offers Fine Opportunities

Central New York provides unlimited opportunities to winter sports fans. Binghamton offers miles of ski runs with interesting terrain. Cooperstown's main slopes are in the Shaw Hill section, six miles north of the village, where there are numerous runs. Very attractive ski trails and open slopes are on the golf course at Gettysburg. Schoharie has several short runs, fairly lengthy woods ski trails and some open slopes for practice.

Outside of the city limits of Syracuse, there are on number of ski slopes and trails available to the public at Drumheller. New trails have been completed at Boyleville and Middleburg, additional trails will be popular this winter, including Clinton, Cortland, DeWitt, Oswego, Lewis State Park and Green Lake State Park.

The rolling country of Warren town, in the St. Lawrence-Thousand Island Region, has good terrain for skiing in the vicinity of the city and complete facilities within the city.

Buffalo and Allegany state parks highlight winter sports life in the Niagara-Chautauque Region. The park has about 50 miles of wilderness cross-country ski trails, downhill trails and open slopes.

Last year the chapter sent 23 cured patients to convalescent camps for an average of 28 days each, Dr. Ramsey said. Doctors, he added, last year received over 300 textbooks on infantile paralysis from the chapter, and 100 nursing books were distributed.

**LIBRARY ACQUIRES OLD DOCUMENTS**

**Records Dating Back to 1863 And Early Photos Added to Collection**

Several collections of early Mamaroneck material have been donated to the Mamaroneck Free Library during recent weeks.

Mrs. H. G. Brewer of Beach Avenue has given a most interesting collection of old bills, vouchers and account books dating back to 1863. Many of these items were once the records of the old Mamaroneck and Rye Neck Literary Association, an active literary club in the 1870's and lasting in its membership many of the prominent families of the Mamaroneck of that day. Most of the names are still represented in our Village now.

One interesting book contains the records of the Union Literary Club, the treasurer's report from 1863 to 1887 giving reports of the membership lists, the dues collected and the receipts from lectures held. The proceeds of the first "Lectures and Essays" held on April 7, 1863 are given as \$34.20. The subject of the "Essays" vary considerably from time to time, one given by R. W. Hume on Sept. 18th, 1863, being entitled "Honey on Huzarens" for which Mr. Hume received \$7.24.

The prices and wages paid at

that time make very interesting reading when compared with current prices. One entry is for the purchase of 12 lbs. of "sawing and splitting and carrying" the same price as today.

Several pictures of groups of clubs and public functions are also in the collection and a copy of the Mamaroneck Register of July 1, 1861. The make-up and advertisements of these old papers make most interesting reading. Some of the items listed in the "Scientific Industrial" column are the following:

"Paris has electric cabs." "All umbrellas are \$1 a pound." "Electric boots are being made."

Mrs. Charles E. Rice of Brookside Avenue has given the Library from time to time many photographs of Mamaroneck Village from her husband's collection of material. The largest group, which contains plates showing many of the old streets and buildings, now on, are being mounted together in a leather folder and can be easily used by those interested.

The Charles M. Haver family has also given many pictures and photographs of family places throughout the Village. All are being mounted and assembled so they may be more accessible to students of local history.

The library is always glad to have additional material to add to the rapidly growing collection of historical source material. This will prove more and more valuable as time passes and will furnish an important source of information for workers interested in doing basic research on Mamaroneck and its history.

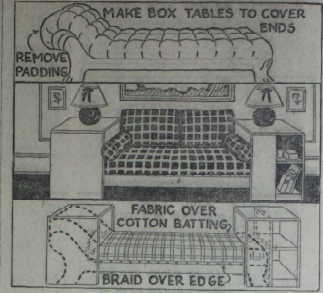

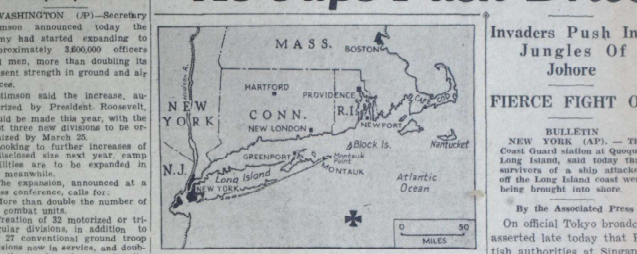

## 30 Cameras Surrendered By Aliens To Police Here; Radio Sets Also Given Up

All Enemy Nationals Must Obtain Identification Certificates

Thirty cameras and several short wave radio sets have been deposited with the three local police departments, by enemy aliens since the effective date of the order from the U. S. Government, it was learned today.

Meanwhile, President Roosevelt in Washington yesterday ordered that all enemy aliens within the United States, Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands obtain certified identification.

Attorney General Biddle, an Associated Press dispatch from Washington continued, today ordered all German, Italian and Japanese aliens in eight Western states to apply for such certification between Feb. 2 and 7. Such aliens elsewhere in the United States must apply between Feb. 8 and Feb. 25.

It was not clear with the first order that identification certificates should be made at local postoffice or at local police headquarters, an announcement by Mr. Biddle was expected later.

In the Village of Mamaroneck eight cameras have been surrendered by alien, Police Chief Arthur W. MacIntosh said. A large assortment of short wave radio appliances also were turned in by a young "ham" or amateur radio enthusiast whose father is an alien.

Several short wave adaptors for use on long wave sets were also deposited, Chief MacIntosh said. In Larchmont Village, 41 cameras and two short wave radios were surrendered to police, and in the unincorporated Town area, two radios and eight cameras were deposited with Weaver Street police.

The cameras ranged from the familiar rectangle box type to the more elaborate and expensive equipment. Receipts have been given and the apparatus is being held until the Federal Government arranges a depository for the duration of the war. Such a place will be set up, the government advised in its original order directing aliens to surrender cameras and short wave radio.
