

HOME SERVICE WORKERS HEAR MRS. GOETZ

90 Branch Members Attend First of Three Training Sessions

The goals of social service work and the ideals for which we are fighting today are closely related. Mrs. Hilda Goetz, director of Home Service in the Westchester County, American Red Cross, told those attending the first of three training sessions for branch home service committees of the chapter in White Plains yesterday.

More than 90 members of the branch committee, who were gathered for the first of three training sessions, held in Republican County Headquarters, White Plains, Mrs. Edgar V. O'Daniel of Bronxville, chapter chairman of Home Service, presided.

During the past month the Home Service Department of the chapter acted on 841 cases, of which 410 were new. Mrs. Goetz also reported during the portion of the morning session devoted to the chapter's monthly meeting. She described Red Cross Home Service as "the link between the individual and the community." Her duties include the service to the armed forces and their families with inquiries in regard to their welfare, and information concerning regulations and legislation affecting service men and their dependents; cooperation with military and naval agencies by obtaining social history material for medical treatment, and reports on home conditions, including questions of discharge, furlough and allowances.

Those eligible to be members of the service men or ex-servicemen and their dependents, service men and their families, nurses, members of the armed forces and the National Youth in their country and their dependents, members of the Merchant Marine when on duty and their dependents, civilians serving with the armed forces outside of the United States. Only Slight Drop Shown In Hunting Fatalities

It isn't the old story of "I told you so." Yet each year's rod and gun writers point out to their readers the sheer folly of carelessness by hunters during the hunting season. We stress with a great deal of emphasis the proper use of firearms, the caution which should be exercised and to look twice before pulling the trigger. In spite of these yearly warnings, the number of deaths and accidents continues. While the following may be void of romance, we think it worth the attention of the reader. A report from the New York Conservation Department makes on page up and into nature. It is the story of hunting fatalities and accidents which are coming from a war theater rather than a hunting area. Yet, by the same token, it isn't pleasant news to realize where it comes from. During 1942, the Department states the lives of 22 sportsmen were forfeited and warning degrees of injury were suffered by 154 others. We know that some of these accidents are avoidable, but if there is any comfort in comparing last year's figures with those of 1941, there is the difference. During 1941, 29 were killed and 193 injured. Car accidents seem to be the outstanding cause of the mortality figures. It seems that while there are more than 100,000 cars on the road, and year after year accidents continue to occur. DEFENSE CHIEFS SEE NO THREAT IN DRIVING BAN

Restrictions Not Endangering Protection Set-Ups Here, Officials Agree

The ban on civilian driving offers no threat to the civilian protection personnel in Mamaroneck, Larchmont and the unincorporated section, according to the chiefs of the three local setups.

No reason for alarm was seen here despite the statements made yesterday by Deputy Protection Director Rooster Holbrook and Mayor Stanley W. Chase, Jr., of Rochelle that the new driving restrictions are imperiling the civilian protection organization.

Mr. Holbrook called on O.C.D. Director James M. Landa for a letter explaining the use of cars by emergency personnel. Mayor Chase sent telegrams to Mr. Landa and Governor Lehman stating that "if volunteers are held to this ban it will mean the end of the civilian protection organization."
