## Yets Aided

NEW BASE PERIOD FOR TOYS, GAMES

A new supplementary regulation to the existing Regulation 11, amendment 8, permits retailers of toys, games and Christmas decorations to extend their base periods from July 1 to Dec. 10, 1950.

Arthur Dunn Jr., executive secretary of the Mamaroneck Chamber of Commerce announced this morning. Although he has not yet received the official amendment, the information came to him in a special bulletin from the National Retail Dry Goods Association.

Toys, games and Christmas decorations were brought under C.F.R. No. 7 by a regulation issued June 29, Mr. Dunn pointed out, and the original base period was set at Oct. 1 to Dec. 10, 1950.

Complaints against the base period were filed with the Office of Stabilization by a special committee of the NREDA and the recent amendment resulted from representations that the original base period prevented the inclusion of many invoices for goods received early in 1950, Mr. Dunn stated.

Copies of the regulation should be in the Chamber office shortly, Mr. Dunn said.

WASHINGTON (AP)—Secretary of State Acheson and Britain's Herbert Morrison discuss their difference over cold war tactics in the opening meeting today of the Big Three Western Foreign Ministers conference.

A proposed new partnership for West Germany, the British dispute with Egypt over Suez and the Iranian and Pakistani crises were expected by diplomats to figure in the talk this afternoon.

Mr. Acheson Mr. Morrison and Foreign Minister Robert Schuman of France flew to the capital in an Air Force plane last night from the Japanese peace conference at San Francisco. For next four days, in the first full meeting of the three nations in years, they are due to talk over a global range of problems—mostly in view of Soviet Russia and communism.

Today's Acheson-Morrison talks are to be followed tomorrow by a similar session between Mr. Acheson and Mr. Schuman. Starting Wednesday it will be a three-day discussion. The three high commissioners for Germany were on hand for consultation in the scheduled effort to iron out final details of a plan to bring the Soviet government into the Western lineup.

Soviet-Type Rockets Hit Allied Positions U. S. 8th Army HQ, Korea, said rockets of the type used by the Russians in World War II had landed behind Allied lines on the east front, it was officially reported today.

There was speculation they might have been brought to Korea by communists caucasian troops recently reported near the battlefield. No Allied installations were hit. Official sources refused to disclose the number of rockets that landed.

In the air war, 30 American F86 sabre jet tangled with 80 Russian-type MIG15s over north-west Korea in one of history's biggest jet battles. Two Communist planes were damaged.

Yesterday the Allies shot down two MIGs and damaged another. There were no Allied losses in either scrap.

Army sources said tonight they have reliable but not conclusive evidence that Russian pilots have been flying some of the jets in battles against the United Nations.

They will be in the new building with its classrooms, recreation and rumpus room. Facilities will be on hand to foster them spiritually, socially and recreationally."

The same theme was emphasized by the young people who cited the fact that in the present center building, the inadequate space for activity when two or more of the youth groups meet at the same time and that classroom space for the Center school is inadequate.

A musical interlude in the ceremonies was provided when Mrs. Barney Balaban sang "Eli, Eli" and a song, as yet unnamed, of her own composition, and when Sidor Reizsky, noted baritone, presented three Israeli songs.
