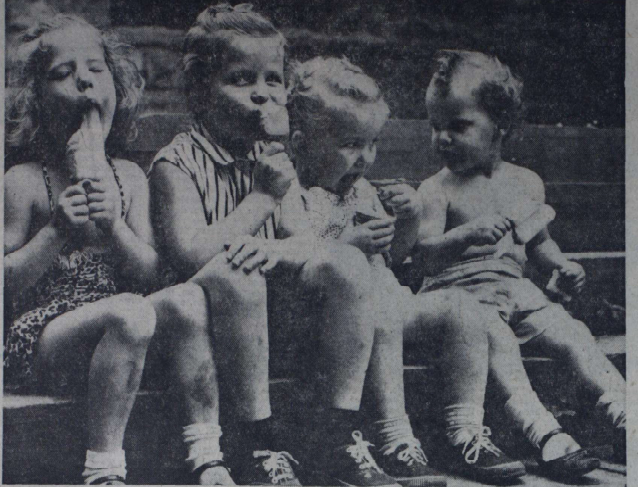

Dulles Asks Russia To Prove Policy By Freeing Satellites

Reds Charge Air Violations

Washington Silent On Russian Protest

WASHINGTON (AP)—Secretary of State Dulles said today Russia should "restore full independence to the Communist satellite nations to prove the reality of its new policy of 'decentralization of power'."

Within the Soviet system, he said, "it is a military matter and the reality of vigorous democratic institutions will genuinely insure there are no corrupting power of despotism."

"The whole world will therefore follow," Mr. Dulles said, "to see what will actually come of the present developments."

"If they dependably alter the domestic and foreign policies and practices of the Soviet state, it would benefitfully transform the world scene. We hopefully await the coming of that day."

Mr. Dulles had a prepared statement which he read concerning the Soviet Union.

Other Points
As to other matters, Mr. Dulles said:

1. Made an expression on the issue of "neutrality." In a recent speech, Mr. Dulles had said that with few exceptions neutrality is "immoral." But today he defined membership in the United Nations as having neutralized the world, since it virtually all nations in the free world now belong to the U. N.

2. Asserted news that he believes liberalizing forces within Russia will prove irresistible, eventually changing the Soviet Union for the better.

3. Described United States relations with India as fundamentally good despite surface irritations.

4. Offered to discuss slightly with Vice President Nixon on Mrs. Nixon's statement in Asia last week that some economic aid cuts a rope around the neck of a free nation, Mr. Dulles said that he believed it was a mistake to think that Soviet aid was given for strong political purposes but he did not believe that in every case it would involve a great danger.

5. Repeated a Nixon statement that the United States will give aid as desirable to countries which are "unable to receive assistance from the Soviet Union. In this connection, Mr. Dulles said Mr. Nixon had well stated United States policies.

6. He added that whether removal of present Soviet leaders would strengthen the prospect for a new era of friendship in Russia. He said when the question was put, that he would not like to discuss the merits and demerits of so much would depend on the successors to the present leaders.

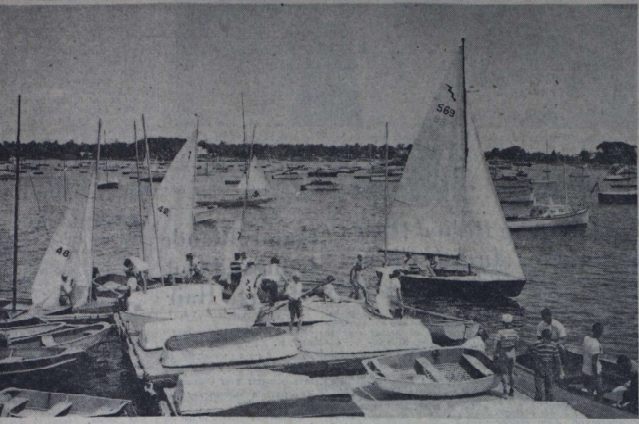

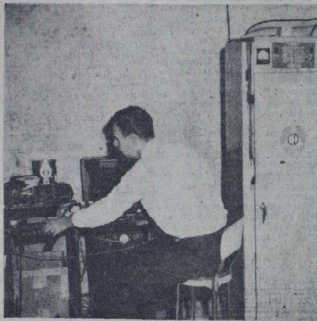

State Siren Change Leads To Confusion; 73 Cities Hard Hit

More than 30-government departments sent detailed plans to secret relocation centers at 'safe' distances from the capital.

Millions were reported 'killed' as mock enemy bombers smashed targets of attacks this morning. The biggest test in this hemisphere also affected Canada, Hawaii and Puerto Rico.

Consequently in most villages and cities of Westchester, motorists and pedestrians jumped the gun. The confusion was compounded by the fact that the signal was sounded as a C.D. advisory. They'd forgotten instructions that had stressed that the all-clear would be signaled only through the Conrail emergency radio system.

For more than a decade C.D. exercises have ended with an all-clear. But the change, ordered by the State, has brought predictions of confusion. In fact, hundreds of cars stalled up thousands of pedestrians ducked out of doorways for a quick trip home, only to be shunted back to three more minutes of shelter by C.D. personnel.

So let's put it this way: for 12 minutes the 15-minute drill was a smashing success. The last three minutes can be charged off to poor timing by State C.D. leaders—the "alert" sirens were too close to the end of the "all-clear."

Although newspapermen are all over the county sought to fault the public's cooperation, they had to agree with the reports that the emergency sirens, which rang from "good" to "the best exercise."

There were isolated instances of failure to heed C.D. regulations, but for the same percentage of violators even if the atom bomb was set off on the spot.

Major and C. D. Director Edwin G. Michaelson of White Plains said the public's cooperation "was even more satisfactory than we had hoped for."

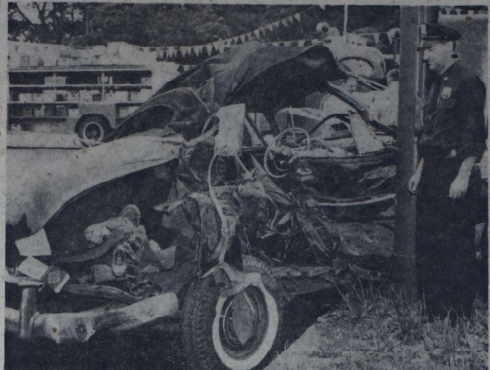
