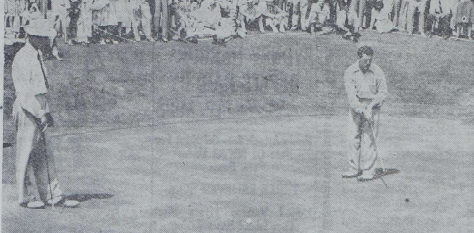

The sales booth in the Playhouse Theater closed \$745, and the one at the railroad station, \$349.35. Another sales booth is to be set up in the Woodwain store on Mamaroneck Avenue. The Mamaroneck Postoffice sold \$2,233 in stamps, bringing up the stamp sales for the month to a total of \$423,228. This appears to be a worthwhile program, for there is no greater thrill to a golfer than in tackling a hitherto unfamiliar course.

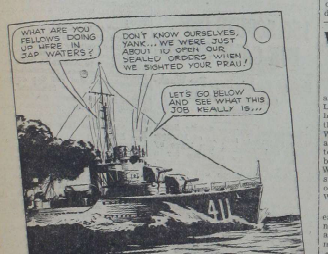

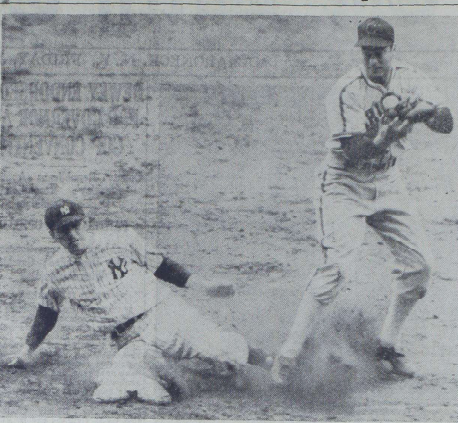

BRITISH-SOVIET TREATY SIGNED

20-Year Pact Announced As Axis Armies Assail Black Sea Base

By The Associated Press. Russia and Great Britain signed a 20-year mutual assistance treaty today as the Axis armies pressed a violent assault on the key Black Sea naval base of Sevastopol, in the Crimea, and the Germans announced the capture of a strategic post in the battle of North Africa.

British Foreign Minister Anthony Eden said the new Anglo-Soviet Pact was signed May 26. Eden said the pact was directed "against Hitlerite Germany" and that the signatory powers pledged themselves to rebuild post-war Europe on the design of the prime minister and President Roosevelt and the former Soviet Premier Joseph Stalin.

The pact provides for "common action to preserve peace and prevent aggression in the Balkans, the Near East and the Caucasus" and to "proceed to the utmost limit to enter into any negotiations with the Hitler regime or any German government which fails to accept the agreement."

Japan was not mentioned in the treaty. On the North African front, British High Command announced that Axis troops had captured Bir Hacheim, Southern anchor of the 50-mile British defense line, while British headquarters declared that the French defenders had beaten off a new series of assaults on the army outpost.

The Nazi communiqué said: "The Fort of Bir Hacheim, southern pillar of the British defensive system, was this morning captured by the German army."

On the Eastern front, the Red Army's 100th Rifle Division, which yesterday advanced to the Caucasus, was being reorganized.

Soviet dispatches said the Axis drive against Sevastopol was stalled, but acknowledged that the German army had taken the initiative in the Caucasus, 400 miles south of Moscow.

A Red Army communiqué reported that "a battle took place" around Kharkov. No details were given.

With the Germans striking at their major ports, from Sevastopol in the south to Murmansk in the far north, Soviet dispatches said that "a battle took place" around Kharkov. No details were given.

Neutral observers doubted, however, that Hitler had reacted to favorable bits offered along the whole front.

## Salt Water Fishing
