## BIG JAP CONVOY SIGHTED ON WAY TO NEW GUINEA

14 Ships Reported En Route To Lae; Allied Airmen Ready To Attack

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Navy reported today that American dive bombers had attacked and started fires in the Japanese air base area at Munda on New Guinea Island on the Solomon Islands.

A 14-ship Japanese convoy, moving along under cover of an advancing "mother fleet," was reported en route to Lae or other New Guinea bases in the Southwest Pacific today while Gen. Douglas MacArthur's forces awaited the opportunity to attack.

The American and Australian flyers were expected to begin their performance of last Jan. 8-10 when they succeeded in sinking the leading unit of action at least five of the 14 ships. It was reported that the Japanese were carrying 14 or 15 of the 20,000 enemy planes in one of the convoys.

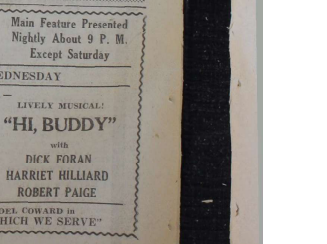

### COUNTY PAY RISE FACES OPPOSITION

#### Civic League Of Westchester Asks 'Where Is Money To Come From?'

"Where is the money to come from?" was the query advanced today by the Civic League of Westchester, in opposing requests by county employees' association that the 1943 Westchester County budget be increased and raises ranging from 5 to 20 percent be granted to 2,400 such employees.

County employees have generally been treated well by the county and during the depression years enjoyed steady employment at salaries which were generally higher than could be obtained in private employment," declared James H. Moseley of Yorkville, head of the Civic League.

"They also receive vacation, liberal sick leave, etc. Without having analyzed their request, we should like to merit them, they should like to have them answered by the following questions and suggest that the members of the supervisors' budget committee insist upon answers to these questions or provide the answers themselves:

"1. Where is the money to come from to pay for these salary increases and the increased cost of the 1943 tax levy approved an all time high record?

"2. Are county employees willing to double up on jobs and perform more than their share of work with a lesser number of employees in order to provide funds for some kind of temporary bonus to assist employees in meeting increased costs of living?

"3. Are county employees willing to share their difficulty with real estate taxpayers in raising rates that may be accomplished in departmental or personal service costs?

"4. Are they willing to agree that any such shared savings will be distributed as temporary cost of living bonuses to be continued only for the duration?

"5. A quick analysis of the budget does not substantiate the figures submitted as representing the percentage of county employees receiving certain salaries. Do these figures include any salaried employees in certain classes of employees? We suggest the employees furnish to the public details of these figures by category of work that they can be readily checked with the budget.

"6. The county employees receiving the same increased living costs as are the county employees. With the exception of wage earners engaged in war activities, citizens generally will not receive increased incomes to offset these increased expenses."

### SAVINGS SHOWN IN TOWN REPORT

#### Disbursements \$125,000 Below Previous Year, Annual Analysis Reveals

In the first wartime year just closed, the Town of Mamareonek disbursed approximately \$125,000 less than in 1941, chiefly because of three drastic cuts in expenditures—welfare, construction and highway—an analysis of ex-Superintendent C. McCullough's annual report revealed. The complete report appeared in last Friday's Daily Times.

Last year disbursements from all department funds amounted to \$8,791,197.84 as against \$9,020,422.92 in 1941.

The savings came from roughly \$75,000 less spent by the Department of Public Welfare whose relief rolls dropped to a 10-year record low, \$3,500 less spent by the Highway Department, spending on a restricted wartime budget, and the absence of any important improvements.

Whereas \$83,717.47 was spent in 1941, chiefly for the town industry, only \$34,496.45 was spent last year, mostly on minor WPA projects, accounting for a difference of \$49,221.02.

The big difference in welfare expenditures accounted for last year's total operating costs of \$36,043.17 as against \$48,778.08 for 1941, the supervisor's report showed.

The Highway Department disbursed \$2,010,127 in 1942 as against \$2,069,121 in 1941.

The total amount disbursed for the redemption of debt was about the same last year as the year before—\$4,522,887.18 in 1942 as against \$4,541,287.18 in 1941.

Similarly, grant and investment payments, made chiefly to the town schools and the county treasurer for milk-obsolescence losses, were about the same—\$1,497,522.95 in 1942 as against \$1,497,522.95 in 1941.

On the receipts side of the ledger, four factors contributed to a drop of approximately \$100,000, detailed preceding year—less money was borrowed, less money was collected for general property taxes, less money was refunded the town for welfare expenditures and less money was budgeted for highways.

Total receipts last year were \$3,999,201.21 as against \$3,899,693.19 in 1941, the report showed.

An amount of \$2,000,000 collected in 1942 on general property taxes, \$232,762.66 was refunded to the State, accounting for a difference of \$35,000.

Temporary loans brought in \$690,000 last year as against \$1,020,000 in the year before—accounting for another \$330,000 drop.

Excess of Mr. Wilson's Law, which provides for refunding 40 percent of the town's welfare expenditures, the town received approximately \$28,000.

Dr. John Koenig, Tallmadge, in charge of the County Health Department's Division on Tuberculosis, was named secretary to the board.

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With Alex J. Cooke, Jr., Yorkville Second Ward, in the Democratic floor-leader's seat, in the absence of Minority Leader Richard W. Moseley, whose brother was accidentally killed last Friday, the county supervisors in White Plains yesterday afternoon heard a committee report that \$50,000 additional fee could be earned annually by county departments if the scale be pushed up to levels of New York City.

Charles H. DeLaney, New Rochelle First Ward, reporting for the committee on county departments, said that after conferring with approximately 100 employees it was impossible to prepare the necessary report in time for introduction this year before the State Legislature adjourns. He advised that the committee would continue meeting to study the fee and that an effort would be made to have the bills prepared and pushed through the Legislature next year.

The appointment by County Executive Gerlach of Frank W. Appleton of Mount Vernon as a member of the County Planning Board, to succeed C. Addison Young of that city, was referred to the committee on county departments for a report next Monday.

### Supervisors Act On Proposed Bills

Bills presented to the supervisors yesterday afternoon by William P. Murray, Poughkeepsie, chairman of the committee on Legislation, included the following:

To lift the \$1,000 limit now set on permits for excavations in connection with civil defense matters, with villages therein were approved.

To prevent holders of transfer of tax liens from stopping the properties of trees and top soil, as presented a town may not secure an injunction within a 30-day period. The bill which was approved would permit town officials to stop such stripping at once.

To give justice of the peace in town the legal authority to open estates and judgments, approved.

To require city clerks to print and deliver to the County Board of Elections abstracts on local laws to be submitted at elections.

**15,000 Enemy Troops Lost In Air-Sea Victory in Bismarck Sea**

WASHINGTON, (AP) - Five hundred raids on Japanese-held positions in the Solomon Islands area, including the 22nd attack on Munda, were reported by the Navy today.

 A large convoy of 22 Japanese battleships, cruisers and destroyers and 13 transport and supply ships - has been wiped out with all ships sunk or sinking by Allied air forces which have scored one of the greatest, air-sea victories of the war. Gen. Douglas MacArthur's Headquarters in Australia announced today.

The battle of Bismarck Sea, as the Allied communique called it, began with a Japanese attempt to reinforce their base at Lae in New Guinea, and ended in a victory of such completeness as to assume the proportion of a major disaster to the enemy.

In addition to thousands of naval personnel killed or drowned in a fiery holocaust of burning, exploding and sinking ships, about 15,000 Japanese troops were shot down.

**MERCURY FALLS TO LOW RECORD**

**Coldest March 4th Recorded With Advent of Spring Only 17 Days Off**  
 Temperatures dropped to zero and below in some Westchester points today, with Spring just 17 days ahead. The Weather Bureau said the mercury would continue to rise slowly.

Thermometer readings about dawn set the coldest March, also ever recorded and in some places the coldest March day on record. In Mamaroneck the mercury fell to a low of eight degrees above zero at 8 o'clock this morning, according to an official reading at the Westchester Joint Water Works. The highest temperature for the 24 hours was 22 above at 8 o'clock yesterday morning.

No true estimate of the snow fall could be made, but on the basis of the rainfall-equivalent of one tenth of an inch the Water Works reported roughly under three inches of snow for the day. The Associated Press reported that the 6.6 in New York City was the lowest on record for the day in the history of the New York Weather Bureau. It broke the mark of 7.8 registered on March 4, 1928. The coldest March day on record at New York was 3.1 above on March 5, 1872.

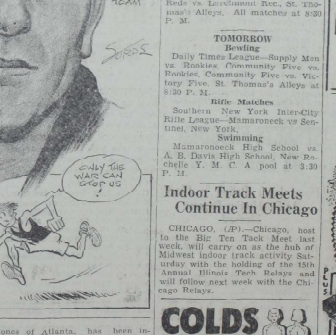

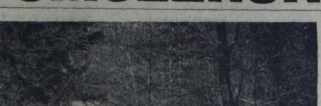
