## COMMITTEE PLANS TAX PROBE OF AIRPORT GOODS

House Group to Investigate Retailers Complaints On Competition

WASHINGTON, (AP)—The House Armed Services Committee wants to know why soldiers and sailors can buy shirts' night, exclusive jewelry and television sets for less than at almost wholesale prices.

It ordered the start of an investigation after a committee member made a top-to-bottom study of the more than half a billion dollar business of Army exchanges and Navy ship stores.

Public hearings will begin in two weeks before a committee headed by Rep. Phillip D. Mass, Chairman Vinson, D. Cal., ordered the probe after civilian retailers, and some business competitors, complained that military services are competing unfairly with them. The services have no Federal excise taxes on luxury items, and some of their stores' expenses are met from government funds appropriated by Congress.

There are three classes of items sold, with limits on some of them.

The first is the mandatory list which all post exchanges and ship stores are required to carry. This includes candy, soft drinks and beer, tobacco, such suit coats as shaving soap and A. and S. shoes.

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## Shanghai In Chaos As Railway Escape To South's Out

SHANGHAI, (AP)—Traffic was reported suspended today on the last railway escape from communist-enslaved Shanghai to South China.

Outside the city, the chaotic money market crashed at mid-day, after garrison negotiators outside tried to trade in great silver dollars on threat of death—obviously a measure of great desperation.

The Red radio last night said eight Chinese government armies were "routed" out and parts of four other armies "routed" in the Nanjing-Shanghai-Hangchow area. (A Chinese Army is usually 20,000 men. The Red broadcast claimed a "great victory" was not confirmed by government sources.)

The semi-official Chinese Central News Agency said all service had been suspended between Hangchow and Nanjing. Hangchow is a tractor, resort city and communications center 100 air miles southwest of Shanghai. Nanjing, capital of the Kuang province, is about 200 miles farther southwest, almost midway between Shanghai and Canton, provisional nationalist capital on the south coast.

(This was the first indication that the communist offensive might have succeeded so deeply into South China. Previous dispatches were stopped.)

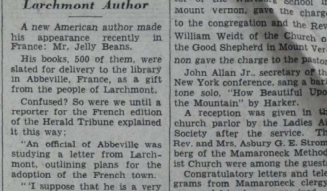

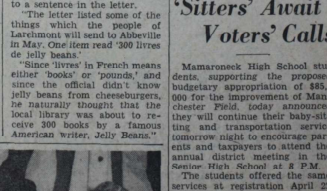

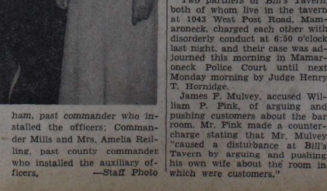

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### County's Board Of Election Lists Those Important Dates

Ball primary election will come this year on Tuesday, Sept. 6

from noon to 9 P. M., and the General Election will be on Tuesday, Nov. 8, from 8 A. M. to 7

P. M.

Such are the dates listed, along with other general information, in the 1949 political bulletin issued by the Westchester County Board of Election, Commissioners are Walter W. Westall, White Plains Republican, and James H. Sullivan, Yonkers Democrat. The law requires a bipartisan board. Deputy Commissioners are Carl J. Noe of Katonah and Joseph E. Moran of Yonkers, Republican and Democrat, respectively.

July 8 will be the last day to become a resident of Westchester in order to be eligible to vote and Aug. 10 the last day to gain citizenship by naturalization in order to vote, both cases being the general election in West Plains.

Central registration, for those who do not wish to register on regular days will run from June 1 to Sept. 26, with such registration at the Board of Elections in the counties of West Plains.

Mostly Personal Districts

Absentee voters may make applications for local registration, such regular registration is on Oct. 19, to 14 inclusive, in personal districts and on Oct. 8 and 15 in non-personal districts. A large portion of the county is in personal districts, that is, those municipalities of 5,000 population or more.

Officials to be elected on countywide basis this year are as follows:

County Executive, Surrogate, District Attorney, Sheriff, County Clerk.

Normally, the election of a Sheriff would not be held until next year, but the recent death of Sheriff T. Vincent Ehrbar of Mount Vernon makes the election of a new Sheriff come this November.

### FREE MOTORBOAT INSPECTIONS SET

The Coast Guard Auxiliary announced today its 1949 program of free courtesy inspections of motorboats in the Third Coast Guard District. Commander Ernest A. Cascini, USCG District Director of the Auxiliary, said that all craft passing inspection would receive red-and-white windshield stickers giving them immunity from being stopped and boarded

during the boating season for routine inspection by Coast Guard cutter crews.

Commander Cascini said the Coast Guard would conduct a vigorous drive this summer against violations of safety regulations. At the request of the Coast Guard Auxiliary will make courtesy inspections where requested by boat owners. This includes the number of craft subject to boarding by cutter crews.

Three hundred inspectors in the Auxiliary's 50 flotillas in New York, New Jersey, Connecticut and Eastern Pennsylvania will complete their training courses this week and begin courtesy inspections immediately thereafter. This is the third year of the courtesy inspection program and many of the inspectors have taken part in the earlier inspections.

Commander Cascini said owners desiring to have their boats inspected should make a request to the commander of the nearest flotilla. Stickers will be issued to all boats receiving minimum boat requirements for safety.

The owner of a boat that fails to pass inspection will be given an opportunity for reexamination if he remedies the craft's shortcomings. In no event will the owner whose boat has received a courtesy inspection be at any disadvantage from the owner who makes no such request. Boatmen who operate their craft without remedying faulty conditions that may be revealed by a courtesy inspection will run the same risk of being picked up later by a Coast Guard boarding crew as the owner of any other craft without the red-and-white sticker.

Commander Cascini said.

Lawrence Gosselson, district courtesy inspection officer, reported today that 2,644 boats received courtesy inspections last year and 2,052 received stickers. Of the 592 that failed to pass inspection, 310 were found to lack fire extinguishers or have defective extinguishers; 130 were without the required number of life preservers in good condition; 70 had defective carburetors or lacked backing straps; 41 were without proper lights; 28 boats did not have the required papers aboard; and 21 had no horns or defective horns.

While a record is kept of faulty conditions for survey purposes, no record is made of the name of the owner or the boat's number. Mr. Gosselson said no penalty was attached to failure to pass a

### HOOVER PLAN VOTE

WASHINGTON (AP)—Doerflinger a personal appeal from former President Herbert Hoover, of the United States Chamber of Commerce prepared today to vote on only a qualified endorsement of his government reorganization plan.

### Patri Urges School Meeting All Requirements

BY ANGELO PATRI

I am all for the compulsory school attendance laws. All children should have the opportunity to attend school and acquire all the education that every child can take. We should, then, supply the education that every child can take and that means a school course for the book-minded, others for the hand-minded, a school in short that meets the needs of any child, anywhere. We do not always do that. In far too many places the only available school is the old style book-storing school, rigid in matter and method. We have outgrown that school. It no longer serves.

That brings us to the matter of school attendance. Some pupils are habitual absentees. We have expensive attendance bureaus and officers to force them to attend. The officer drags them into school, they are held like prisoners for the session and off they go again. Why?

They stay away from school because it is little more than a jail to them. There is nothing there for them. They have no ability that allows them either an interest in book knowledge or a mastery of it. They are disliked by

their teachers because they lower class results, spoil the attendance records, make themselves disagreeable for the brief while they are in the classroom.

These young people are precious to the nation. They have hidden powers and latent abilities. They could, if opportunity were offered them, learn some sort of skill in one field or another. They are not all dull boys and girls. A goodly number of them have had experiences with life that matured them early and accordingly they find a school

unfamiliar to children while they are matured young people. They fly from it as from the plague. We who manage the schools are to blame, not the young people.

One day an attendance officer counted on his boy, a young man in his growth into the office and said, "He'll be working six in a couple of months. Try to hold him until then and keep him off the streets."

"The officer left and the boy said, 'What's the use? I'm dumb. I can't even read. Look at me. I should sit with the kids?' Plainly he could do no such thing so he said, 'Go through the school with this monitor. Visit the whole plant. Maybe you'll see something you would like to do.'"

"When he came back he said, 'I'd like to play the cello.' Astonished but game we said, 'We will teach you.' He stayed three weeks in school, learned to play

the cello and to read, too. Now he is the cellist in a famous orchestra. What are you doing for the children who absent themselves from your kind of school? No American child can be wasted.
