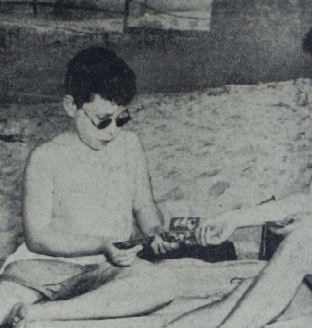
Called by the Board as a delinquent, Callahan is subject to prosecution by the Department of Justice. His whereabouts is unknown at present to Draft Board No. 750.

10 Million Auto Crosses Toll Span

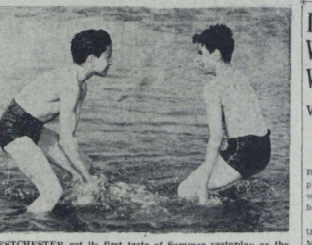

PLANS TO ENROLL WOMEN FOR WAR WORK CANCELED

Voluntary Registration Not To Be Carried Out, President Reveals

WASHINGTON, (AP)—President Roosevelt announced today that plans for voluntary registration of women for wartime activities had been dropped.

The chief executive disclosed this had been done after Paul V. McNutt, in charge of mobilizing men and women power for the war effort, had consulted women members of the Social Security Board's Federal Advisory Council

and had been told that over the country there are more women than necessarily permanent and necessary to the war effort.

The president indicated to his press conference that the decision to go ahead with a voluntary registration for women was not made until it was clear that such a plan would not have any effect on the situation at the present time.

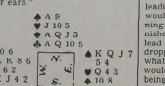

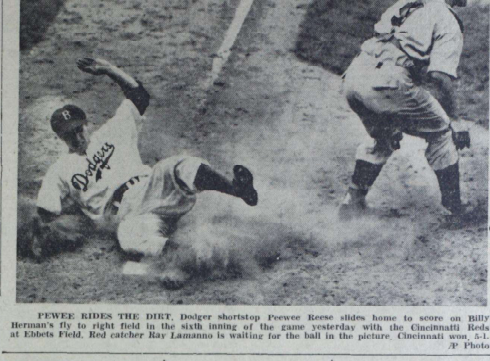
