Rubber, Transit Tieups Serious, Coal Precious

A walkout of 30,000 Akron rubber workers and a strike by transportation workers in New York, Baltimore, and other cities, have brought about a serious situation in the coal fields providing an estimate on the overall situation.
Baltimore transit workers allied with an American Federation of Labor union voted to strike at 4 A. M. but at 8 A. M. company spokesmen estimated service was only about 15 per cent below normal.
The strike vote, protesting extension of an independent union and discharge of an employee, followed a work interruption yesterday which union spokesmen attributed to workers attending a union meeting.
The union said today a strike would tie up four-fifths of the city's transportation system, but this morning the company said "the situation is just about the same as yesterday."

The stoppage of work in the steel and rubber factories, forcing out vital war equipment, has been protested against refusal of the War Labor Board to grant a 10-per cent wage increase. The WLB allowed a 5 per cent increase. The Board's ruling would raise the rate unless they went back to the table. The CIO United Rubber Workers called an extraordinary meeting of the executive board to consider the situation.

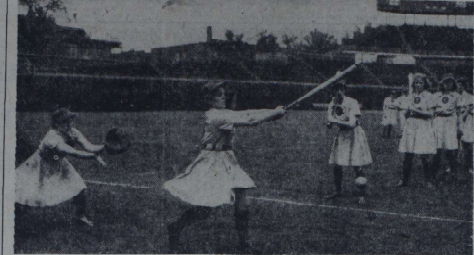

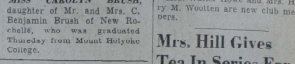
