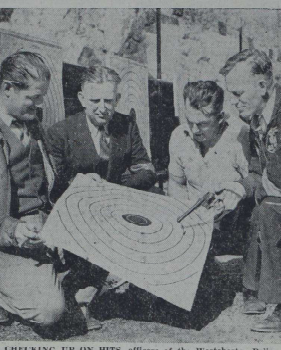

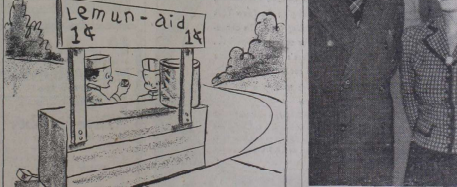

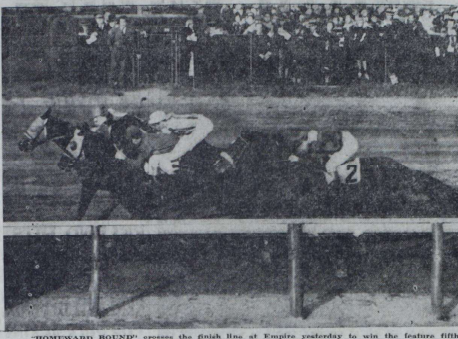

COUNTY SALARY RAISES

It is true, as county employees have pointed out in resolutions addressed to those preparing the 1942 county budget, that living costs have increased sharply and that these employees will be called upon to pay heavier federal income taxes next March.

The employees' through their association, request a flat increase of 10 per cent for all employees now receiving less than \$5,000. If that request be agreed to by county officials the 1942 tax levy and tax rate will almost certainly exceed the figures for this year.

As for the taxpayers, no large increase in taxation at this time can be proposed. They, too, face the same increased cost of living as do the public employees, they, too, must pay higher federal income taxes next year.

Some compromise between the interests of these two groups lies a compromise; that is what the budget makers should seek.

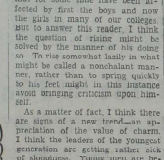

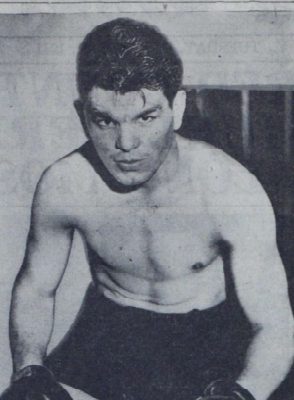

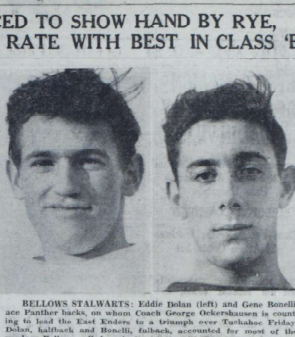
