Death Of John Glover A Shock Beyond Belief

It only rated a paragraph or so in yesterday's late editions, but the shocking story carried greater message or moral. The shoc-king, almost unbelievable news that twenty-three-year-old Olympic hopeful John Glover of Larchmont had died in Yale University's Payne Whitney pool completely stunned followers of this young American athlete.

Glover was in training for the forthcoming Olympic swimming trials when he suddenly "doubled up" and clutched his abdomen while standing in the shallow end of the Yale pool. He was taken to the hospital, but he died before a heart attack.

Only a few short weeks ago we had written that John Glover would probably be one of only three Westchester athletes to make the 1956 U.S. Olympic team. We have followed his career closely since his swimming days at Mamaroneck High School when he won practically every event and championship ever entered.

It just doesn't seem possible that this career is now ended. No athlete ever worked harder for success. John had his heart set on an Olympic team and was close to his scholastic days. He wanted more than anything else to represent his country in the Olympics.

Burning Desire
And this intense desire to achieve a boyhood dream is what claimed his life. This burning desire to make good almost drove him beyond the capacity of a fighting but insufficient heart. If ever a young man died in the service of his country it was John Glover.

The next time you read of the lack of Olympic funds, you might

keep young John Glover in mind. John gave his life. What can we do to help?

A 1935 graduate of Dartmouth, where he won all sorts of swimming honors, Glover was the 1935 National AAU free style champion. His time for 49.3 seconds was just a fraction off the national record. He was also named to the All-America team and last year was toured portions of Europe as a sports representative of his country.

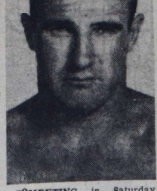
This is a sad story, but not without its moral significance. His young athlete being slipped just as he was about to approach the apex of his career. John had his heart set on a goal, a goal that apparently only death would end.

Much too young, John never-thless had attained more than many a short span of years than many an entire lifetime. He had often been called to the winner's circle and wore the mantle of success with class and distinction. Someone has defined class as poise under pressure. What finer tribute can a young man be paid?

Our thoughts today and for some time to come are with his saddened family.

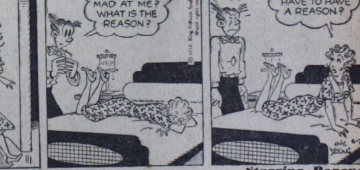
