LONDON, June 20 (AP)—The British Government announced today that a committee of British, Swedish and Norwegian experts would meet here for Spain soon to determine whether aerial bombardments in the civil war have constituted a violation of military objectives.

The announcement, made in the House of Commons by Richard Austen Butler, parliamentary secretary for foreign affairs, indicated that the United States had requested an investigation to participate in the investigation.

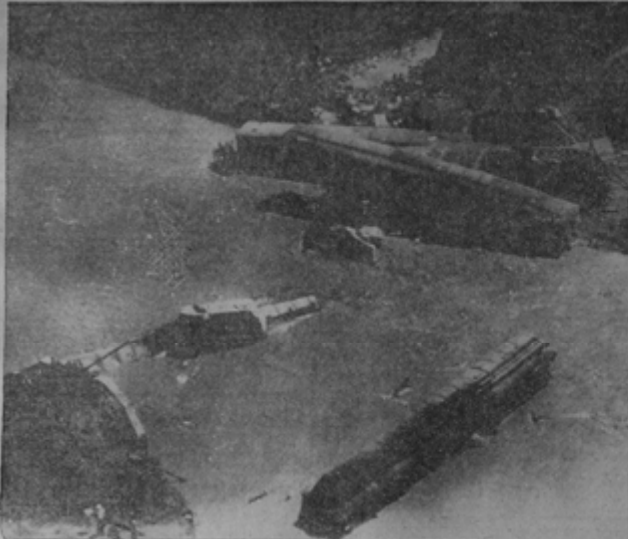
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SCENE OF TRAIN WRECK KILLING SCORES IN MONTANA

TWO FACE CHARGE IN THEFT OF KEEL

5 IN BANK SUIT FACE REHEARING

Court Issues Order Against Defendants in Fife Bankruptcy Case

NEW YORK, June 20—Superior court yesterday in a recent suit over the bankruptcy of the F. A. Fife Corporation of Mamaroneck are required to show cause tomorrow why there should not be a rehearing in the case, in an order handed Saturday by Federal Judge John W. Chase.

Griffiths Says He Will Push Yorkers Man For Nomination SEES GENERAL DEMAND

WHITE PLAINS, June 22.—Republican county chairman W. H. Griffiths, viewing the turbulent state political picture with growing concern, today announced his intention to support for the United States Senate, announced that he will push for the nomination of Judge Bleakley, former Supreme Court Justice, as the man they favor for the Republican gubernatorial nomination this year.

Political observers who heard of Mr. Griffiths' statement, however, are of the opinion that he had not included in that statement the name of the State Chairman, William S. Murray of Ulster, and Kenneth Simpson, chairman of the Westchester County and leader of the largest delegation to the Republican State convention in Saratoga Springs on Oct. 3 and 4. Dewey of New York County, former racketeer, as the man they favor for the Republican gubernatorial nomination this year.

In addition, it has been reported in Assemblyman James H. Todd, of Yonkers, who is also state vice president of the D. O. P. and "back man" to Mr. Murray, as the designation of Mr. Dewey instead of the Westchester man, as Todd has herself been suggested for the post of lieutenant governor in the event of a general election. Westchester should receive nomination for Governor, Mr. Bleakley himself was announced today. So far as Port Chester High is concerned, White Plains and Georgetown slipped a swift one over on the seventh base when the White Plains team of the WIAA baseball fight.

We don't know whether it was a conspiracy of silence or not, but the fact that White Plains High claims to have capped the WIAA baseball crown over Georgetown, N. Y., last Friday in a "playoff" game, and thereby scored a tremendous grand slam in the county major sports, never reached much beyond the news printed in the County Seat itself.

Maybe the Flaminians' news hawks were being just modest about it, and didn't want to blush too much when they informed an eager waiting Westchester sports world that the Len Waters line had brought White Plains into a pinnacle of sports glory heretofore unknown to the Tiger.

Or perhaps, while doffing their numbers which by now had become too small for their backers, they considered the football, basketball and baseball championships in WIAA more trifles, rather than the glory, and, as a result, in mentioning, especially in view of the hard efforts that high school is making to withdraw from the WIAA.

Anyhow, White Plains and Georgetown arranged for what they called the league "playoff" after each other tied at eight victories and four losses. Meanwhile, Port had seven victories and four losses, with the postponed (even that is questionable) till yet to come off with Roosevelt.

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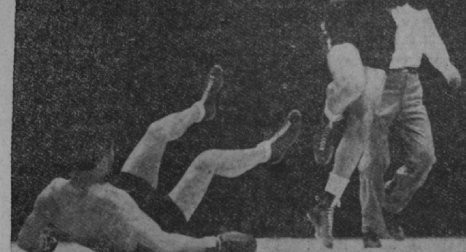

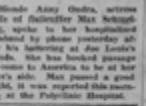

CASH FOR HOME RELIEF LIKELY IN WESTCHESTER

Commissioner Rath Taylor Cites Advantages Over Vouchers - Lead to Cash With Which Rent, Fuel, Clothing, Groceries And Other Necessaries Are Paid in County

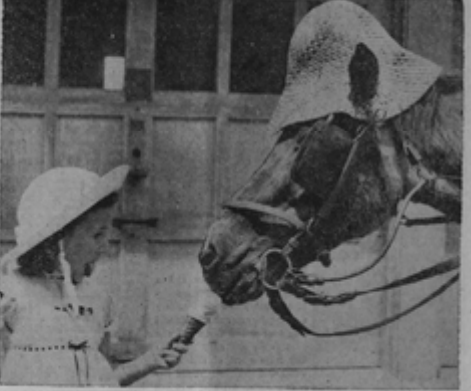

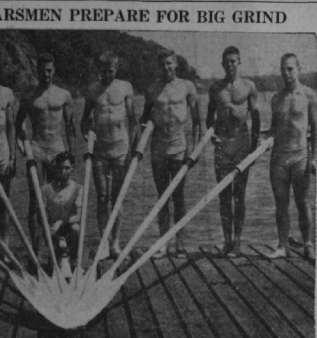

Irvington police got their first of three calls in the affair on Saturday but a patrolman reported no disorder at the house. Later Chief McCall conferred with private detectives guarding the front door of the Blanchard home. He said that only through a court order which might come from Judge Justice James J. Lynch could the woman be legally removed.

Blanchard and his wife are said to be estranged. In the meantime, Heuser is reported to be staying in Vermont. He is expected to have met Mrs. Heuser last Monday, according to police reports. Mrs. Heuser left her Stranahan apartment, barricaded herself in a bedroom at the Blanchard home, and has refused to leave.

Private detectives obtained by Blanchard are guarding the front door of the home, against Mrs. Heuser's attorney, Mr. O'Brien. According to O'Brien, Mrs. Heuser claims Blanchard had promised to marry her and she insists she will not define arrangements until she has seen the attorney.

As on Saturday, Mr. O'Brien was unable to obtain admission to the Blanchard home. He was, however, talked to the client in the pouring rain as he leaned from her second-story window. **SUN SHINES AGAIN AFTER 3-DAY RAIN**

**2.67 Inch Downpour Recorded; Vacationists Hopeful For Holiday Weekend**

The sun emerged again today after three days of rain and low temperatures.

A total of 2.67 inches of rain fell during the three days, according to the Westchester county weather office here, it was announced by Fred M. Abbeneth, supervising chemist.

Doctors and others looking forward to the Fourth of July weekend were hopeful the sun would remain shining, though the weather forecast did not extend beyond tomorrow.

The prediction for today was cloudy and somewhat warmer for tomorrow, generally fair with moderate temperature.

The rain gauge at the water works here showed that 73 inches fell Sunday, 1.37 inches Monday and .57 inches Tuesday. Mamaroneck River was a miniature torrent yesterday, but had subsided somewhat today.

The 2.67 inches of rain for the three days was not unusual for that period, according to Mr. Abbeneth. It did, however, bring the total rainfall so far this month up to 5.53 inches, which he admitted was very unusual for June.

June's average in the above table figures, he said, last year a total of 4.84 inches was recorded in June. In 1936, 5.27 fell, but during June in previous years, as far back as 1923, the greatest amount of precipitation for the month was 4.22 inches in 1925.

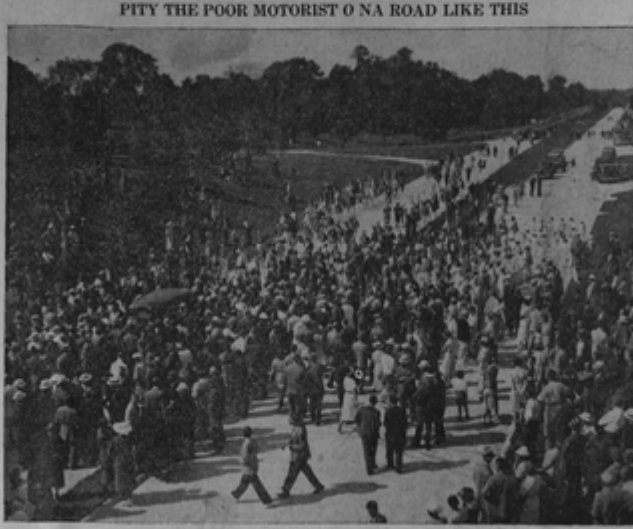

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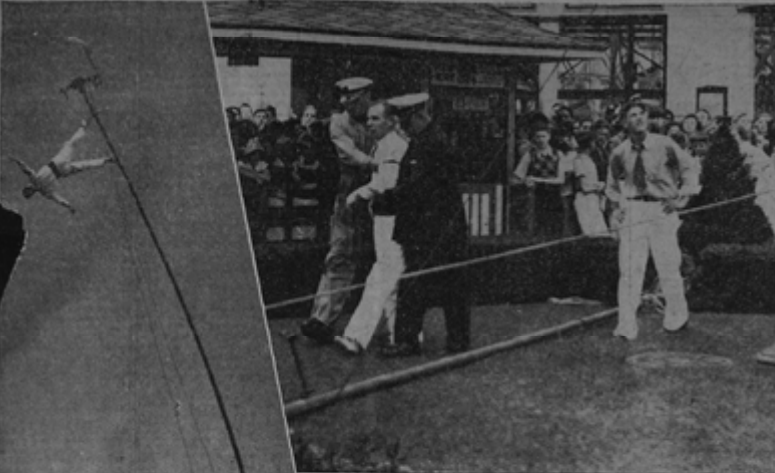
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NO PARACHUTE NEEDED—PLAYLAND AERIAL ST FALLS 65 FEET UNHARMED
