### RECORD FOR JULY SET HERE AS RAIN CONTINUES SIEGE

3.81 Inch Downpour For Month Surpasses Previous 1936 High Mark  
NO RELIEF IN SIGHT  
Showers Forecast For Tomorrow; Update Bridges Washed Away

Overcast skies today and occasional light showers gave promise that the siege of rainwater in this vicinity would continue, as Fred M. Aldenbach, supervising chemist of the Westchester Zoda water works, reported that the rain gauge there showed that all records for July have already been broken.

The rainfall for this month and with nine days yet to go had amounted to 3.81 inches as of 10 P. M. today. This was almost the same as the previous record for the entire month of July, which was 3.80 inches in 1926. Mr. Aldenbach's records extend back to 1901.

The preceding month of June was also a wet one. Mr. Aldenbach's figures show that the total rainfall for that month was 4.18 inches, a total of 1.37 inches of rain fell in June, 1938.

### DERBY ENTRANTS SEEK POINTERS

#### Questions Answered On Problems Facing Lads Entering Races

In every Soap Box Derby throughout the country, a long list of questions is asked of derby entrants.

While the time for making repairs and putting finishing touches on Mamaroneck-Larchmont-Darbyson races is over, a re-examination of some of the problems may help for future entrants, and also for the winner of The Daily Times classic, who will go to Akron, Ohio on Aug. 14. Here are some of the questions and answers which have arisen locally and nationally.

Q—May I have a professional painter paint my racer?  
A—No. But a professional sign painter may paint the name or advertisement of the sponsor of the car upon it.

Q—Do I have to use flexible wire cable for my steering?  
A—Any safe steering device other than the cable-controlled type may be used but it must abide by the provisions of Rule 11 to wit: cut down automobile steering assemblies will not be permitted.

Q—I have built double action drag brakes, operating from two foot pedals and have provision so that I can put on both brakes at the same time. Is this all right?  
A—No matter what type of brake is used, it must be operated by a single brake handle of a single foot pedal.

Q—My boy has to remove the steering wheel from his car in order to get into the racer. What kind of a locking device is best for him to use to lock the wheel back onto the shaft?  
A—The removable steering wheel will not meet the inspection staff. The hub of the wheel must be secured and rigidly fastened to the shaft upon which it is mounted. The solution is to cut out part of the rim of the steering wheel, between two of the three spokes, in order to provide room for the axle legs. Regardless of interpretation of the official rule, this rigidly removable wheel will be adhered to locally. There is a constant chance that the boy would fail to lock his removable wheel onto the shaft and that it would come off while he is in progress down the hill.

Q—There is a rule which says drivers will not be permitted to wear goggles or sun glasses during a race. My boy is very near-sighted. He has glasses and would like to wear them at all times. I think he would be more eager to drive without his glasses than with them. What will he do?  
A—He will wear his glasses. These are not goggles or sun glasses. As protection to boys who wear glasses and do not wish to drive without them, provide the use of cages such as are worn by basketball players to protect their glasses. However, it is necessary that this matter be brought to the attention of registration officials at the time the boy presents his car for inspection.

Q—My boy is 9 years old and a little inclined to the stubborn side. I cautioned him to hold a heavier car but he preferred to work with only a light one, using the very sound argument that it was easier for him to cut out the parts. Now, however, he wants to add weight to the racer, having read that the winning loads are approximately 250 pounds. How can he do it?  
A—Only by rebuilding the car. All weight in the car must be a part of the car and must be bolted to the car. Lead is not allowed. Lead, lead, lead, cement, water, etc.

Q—I have given my nephew a \$400 when assembly for his Soap Box Derby racer. Is this money to spend \$10 for other parts of his car?  
A—No. He is permitted to spend \$150 for other parts of his car. The \$10 limit in car cost refers to the retail price of material used in construction and not necessarily to what the boy paid for his various parts.

Q—I have been told that if a derby car doesn't quite measure up to specifications it will be approved, providing the mistake was innocently made. Is this correct?  
A—It is not correct. One of the big things to be guarded from the Soap Box Derby is the importance of living up to rules. A car that is too long or too wide or too high, too heavy, or improperly constructed so far as materials are concerned, will not pass the inspectors without alteration by the builder. The only tolerance permitted under any conditions is on wheels. There is one make of wheels on the market which goes slightly over the 15-inch maximum permitted by rules due to the fact that a heavier wire was used inside the tire than originally was planned. Inspectors will be asked to pass any wheel up to 12 1/4 inches.

Q—Do I have to build a body on my Soap Box Derby racer?  
A—You do not. But you will have to satisfy the inspectors that you have protection against falling off the abandoned racer.

Q—Does my Soap Box Derby racer have to be upholstered, and if so, with what kind of material?  
A—It does not have to be upholstered. However, there will be a prize given for the best upholstered car. The material may be anything from steps to calico, velvet or velvet. It should, however, have no rough edges likely to tear clothing or injure the driver in any way.

Q—I built my racer in any way school was out when I weighed 111 pounds. Now I weigh 118 pounds and I may weigh 120 pounds by the time the race is held. My car weighs 185 pounds. Will the little bit of extra weight give me the inspection?  
A—No. There are two things

His 28 rooms and lawn estate, are furnished with transax.

Eddie Dooley is a native of Brooklyn. In 1924 he starred at Dartmouth as a quarterback on its football team and was named to the enviable position of All-American. 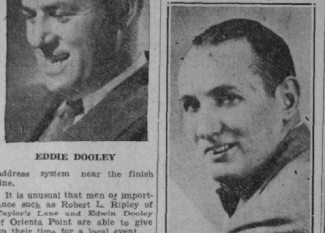
Important among the points the contestants in the Soap Box Derby have been obliged to watch are those dealing with the size of wheels.

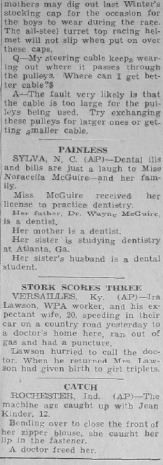

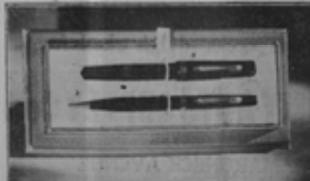

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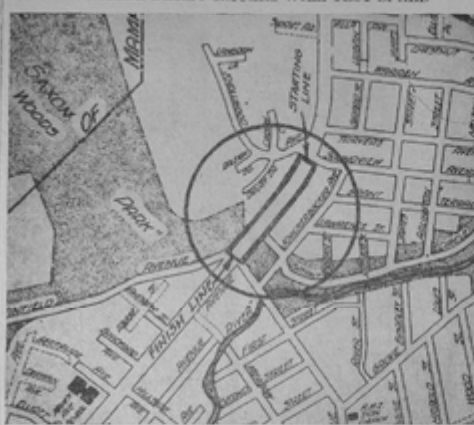

### CHARLEY DAYMON TOOK 1ST LOCAL 'DERBY' IN 1905

#### But They Were Called "Push-overs" Then And Raced Over 3-Mile Course

As you think the Soap Box Derby is something new?

Then think you will be amazed and later to Charley Daymon, local real estate broker, who was Mamaroneck's first "derby" 33 years ago in an open city of 12 "push-overs" as they then called the winner.

"We raced over a course of three miles, was driven by Walter Leonard's automobile. They weren't really downhill racing such as now, but it was a derby, but straightaway affairs. Each driver had four "pushers" to keep him going over the level and uphill stretches, but the rules required him to coast on downhill grades without help.

The real reason I was who that I had good hill-climbing ability and that the others on the downhill were right, Mr. Daymon, and that's the reason every other day since was held because, otherwise it would be a lot easier for my early derby state.

The pushable course started on Melrose Avenue, headed over Van Hook, Union and Madison, and back to the starting line. Each pusher would take a certain distance, and a fresh one then would carry on.

Promotion of the pushable course have more than a quarter of a century ago when descended because the boys wanted something different in the way of a sports event, says Mr. Daymon.

Daymon is, then, a 33-year-old man, only one failed to show up, and that was Bill Handford.

#### 'Best Story' Plans Fail With 4-Hour Psychology Test

This was to have been the best story I've ever written.

Hiding in White Plains yesterday to get the material, I planned how the story would begin.

Like this: "I hope my boss doesn't read this. It will surely verify his long-time suspicion for, after all the years I've written for this newspaper, it has finally been conclusively proven that I shouldn't have been a reporter."

"I might have been more effective as an actor, a second-floor chair instead in a third-rate hotel in a fourth-rate bumper report—"

I spent four hours with Mr. Zuckerman. We talked out "preference" material, I judge, discussing my mechanical aptitude, reading, after I'd finished several for a while, Mr. Zuckerman said, "Well, never mind. These are questions, to know whether a boy should be encouraged to become an engineer or placed as a machine operator, for instance. They indicate whether the girl should be a nurse or do better as a cook. Basically they show that a boy has possibilities as a scientist, that a girl might do well as a librarian. For every case their tests show, they open another. Everybody has the ability to do something. The great mistake would be in the ill-famous methods

that show engineering people to look into social hole jobs.

Lamentable, Mr. Zuckerman. The young people tested are equipped against a thorough knowledge of their backgrounds—of their home life and their school accomplishments. The results of these tests will in fact be made available to the schools—"

What, in Westchester, are they doing these skills, with trade and vocational schools only in Yonkers and Mount Vernon? How can they be placed in jobs for which they have aptitudes if they have no training for those jobs?

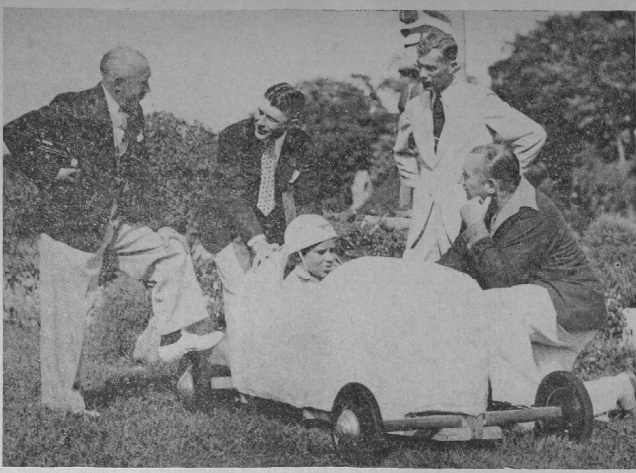

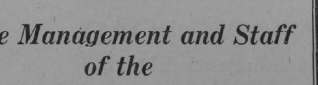
