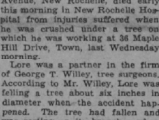

Injured In Fall From Motorboat

Woman Becomes Entangled In Propeller At Harbor Entrance

Miss Helen Hawk, 28, of Woodside 1, L. I., was severely cut about the thigh of the right leg when she got caught in the propeller of a motor boat from which she fell yesterday at the entrance of Mamaroneck Harbor.

According to Edgar Mayer, of New York City, owner of the boat, Miss Hawk was sitting in the bow of the boat. As they were passing Bony 42 at the entrance of the harbor, a huge wave washed her into the water.

Before Mr. Mayer could shut off the motor of the boat Miss Hawk was caught in the propeller. As soon as he could stop and turn Mr. Mayer got into Miss Hawk and pulled her into the boat.

Going to the County Boat Yard Mayer sent in a call for assistance. A police ambulance was sent to the yard and Miss Hawk was taken to United Hospital, Port Chester.

At the hospital it was said that Miss Hawk's thigh was so severely lacerated by the propeller blades that it required ten stitches.

THE COUNTY'S BALANCE SHEET

It's good practice in any type of business to strike a balance now and then, check expenses against receipts, and look ahead to future obligations and how they are to be met...

Budget Commissioner William B. Folger has now reported to the supervisors on the first half of 1938 and the outlook for the next quarter. His report and estimates are worthy of taxpayers' consideration.

Expended in the first half-year, including not only the county's budget but that of each district operations as health, welfare, and sewers, was \$84,000, against receipts from all sources for the same period of \$10,000,000...

That is what Budget Commissioner Folger has done. Looking ahead to the end of the third quarter, he sees total expenditures, including the districts, of \$12,150,000 for the three-quarter year, with total receipts in that period of \$12,800,000.

From 15 of the 24 villages in the county the commission-ers find tax collections of 82.5 per cent of the year's levy, exactly the same percentage which was collected at the same date last year...

LABOR PART DEMOCRATS FOR FALL ELECTIONS

ALP To Endorse Full Ticket With One Exception PUTS 2 ON SLATE

By HUGH W. ROBERTSON
WHITE PLAINS, Aug. 12—Open and almost complete coalition between the Democratic and American Labor Parties in Westchester will be effected this Fall. The Democrats will give two of their five assembly candidates to the ALP, which in return will endorse all of the Democratic County ticket except Assemblyman Arthur Doran, Fifth District, Yonkers.

This agreement, previously rumored, was unofficially confirmed today following a meeting yesterday by the Democrats of Westchester, and the ALP, for Assembly, Fourth District, Greenburgh and a pair of Yonkers to oppose Assemblyman James H. Todd, Taycoyville, vice chairman of the state G. O. P.

In addition to Steinberg in the Fourth District, the Democrats are expected to let the ALP name the candidate for Assembly in the Third District, Mount Pleasant, Greenburgh and Cortlandt, to oppose another Republican incumbent, Oswald Owsen of Owsen. To effect this coalition the Democrats are expected to withdraw Albert Pearson, Owsen, formerly designated for the Democratic nomination for Assembly in that district.

The Labor Party will, in return, designate as its own candidates the Democratic candidates already accepted with the sole exception of the Assemblyman Doran in Yonkers. Endorsement is withheld from Doran, because Doran voted against the Federal Youth Control Measure at Albany. However, it is not believed the ALP will oppose Doran vigorously, as he has not even put up a candidate in that district. Endorsement is withheld from him mainly on principle, it is said.

Democratic candidates whom the ALP will endorse are Walter G. C. O'Neil, New Rochelle, for county president; R. W. J. Flynn, Mount Vernon, for sheriff; William Schramm, Larchmont, and James M. Garity, Yonkers incumbent for the State Senate; Ralph M. Schain, New Rochelle, First District; and Joseph A. Vesco, Harrison, Second District, for Assembly.

CARROLL MURDER TRIAL CONCLUDES

Jury Asked To Decide If Deputy Slew To Hide 'Un-fatherly Act'

SOUTH PARIS, N. E., Aug. 12 (AP)—In closing arguments today a jury was asked to decide whether former Deputy Sheriff Francis M. Carroll murdered elderly Dr. James G. Littlefield to conceal "un-fatherly act" toward his own daughter Barbara, 18, or whether that murder was committed by Paul N. Dwyer, 19, Barbara's former sweet heart and Carroll's chief suspect. Special Prosecutor Ralph M. Ingham contended evidence showed Carroll strangled Dr. Littlefield to silence him, after Dwyer informed the physician of letters from the girl accusing her father of improper conduct.

Defence Counsel Clyde R. Chapman asserted evidence showed Dwyer killed both the physician and his wife.

Bodies of both were in an automobile in which Dwyer, asleep was arrested at North Austerlitz, N. J., last Autumn, a few days after the crime.

Dwyer at first took full responsibility but later testified as the prosecution case, which he admitted or confessed only because he feared Carroll.

FRANCE ALARMED BY VAST GERMAN ARMY MANEUVERS

Paris Orders Diplomats To Report On Military Preparations

PARIS, Aug. 12 (AP)—France today instructed her diplomats in the French and British newspapers to obtain dispatches said Savaris' population was upset by military preparations along the German frontiers. The statement was made in regard to reports of huge German troop movements published in the French and British newspapers.

An authorized source said information in the Foreign Office possession showed "important maneuvers will be held in the Reich."

The source said "it seems excessive" to call German troop movements "mobilization" as reported in some French and British newspapers and declared the German Army Division chief was European press appear exaggerated.

Newspapers of both London and Paris reported 1,200,000 reservists had been called to the colors in a period of instruction to supplement the standing army.

Some belief was expressed in Foreign Office quarters that German military preparations were designed to aid diplomatic pressure on the Czechoslovak Government, as well as Britain and France, for a rapid solution of the Sudeten question.

While admitting "anything can happen," Foreign Office and diplomatic circles in the main were inclined to believe Nazi preparations were designed only for peace.

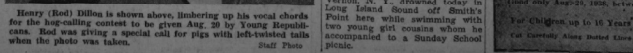

FEEDING YOUR DOG

By DR. JOSEPH L. SERLING, D. V. S.

EDITOR'S NOTE—This is one of a series of articles appearing weekly in The Daily Times on the care of your dog. Questions will be answered if addressed to Harry Marshall, of the Human Society, Mamaroneck.

Dogs are omnivorous, or meat-eating animals. They can live entirely on meat and be perfectly healthy. In fact if a dog is permitted to choose his own diet he will eat nothing else.

The meat is best limited to lean beef, lamb or chicken. Beef may be fed raw or cooked without salt or chicken must be cooked. Pork, potatoes and root should never be fed to dogs.

When the dog has become accustomed we should feed him meat first by adding milk, eggs, cereals, fish, and vegetables. Milk, the best, should be in an important part of the puppy as for the baby. Eggs are fed raw. They may be added to milk or bread.

A cooked egg is indigestible to a dog. Cereals such as bran, wheat, oatmeal, rice, corn and oatmeal may be mixed with milk and fed. Eggs should be removed after getting another variety to the dog. Vegetables, such as green peas, carrots, cabbage and string beans are indigestible. Spinach is about as good as anything and may be fed to a grown dog occasionally.

You will find your pet will learn to chew a new leaf "have teeth" been preferred. A dog cannot be satisfied for the time being of times. Always keep a dish of fresh drinking water where your dog can reach it to it.

A few don't for the diet of your dog are: No candy, cake or pastry; no pork, bacon or veal; and no corn, oil or chicken bones.

A puppy under three months should be fed four times daily—in the morning, sometime at 2 P. M., and before bedtime. For the morning meal a puppy requires lukewarm skimmed milk with any needed cereal, fruit or shredded wheat. All portions should get a small portion of beef or lamb or other cooked or raw meat with bread or shredded wheat. The five o'clock feeding should be similar to the morning feeding and the night feeding repeats the noon feeding.

A dog from three to six months should be fed three times daily. In the morning and evening your dog should have substantial meals with meat as a basis. In addition, at feeding at noon should include lukewarm milk mixed with bread, cereal or raw egg. Salmon may vary this meal about twice a week. A puppy of this age should have a raw bone to chew on.

All dogs over six months should be fed twice daily, at about eight

A SIGNIFICANT FLIGHT. Four Germans who brought a huge flying machine from Berlin to New York this week probably will not be received with one twenty-second of the fuss which attended the solo trip of Douglas Corrigan to Ireland and his return to this country.

Yet the German flight is vastly more significant—vastly more thrilling, if one ponders all its implications and potentialities.

The announcement by Lufthansa that the history-making trip of the Brandenburg was under way embodied an explanation that the great German aeronautics organization hoped relatively soon to establish regular non-stop mail and passenger service between Berlin and New York.

What will be the effect of such service? It may seem silly to suggest that almost daily exchange of aerial communication between Germany and the United States would, in itself, make any appreciable contribution to permanently amicable relations between the two nations—there has been almost constant air service between Berlin and the capitals of other European nations for years without any resultant effect on nationalistic and racial relations in the Old World.

Yet this German-American or Berlin-New York service may be different—bear in mind that such a service will be established only if there is a need for it, and the need for it can develop only if enough German and American business men require speedy or frequent exchanges of visits for the promotion of mutual business interests.

In other words, the Germans may have some definite reasons for anticipating a large-scale resumption of trade with the United States.

And on the latter score we are going to venture a prediction—a reckless prediction because it admittedly is based entirely on guess work. A SIGNIFICANT FLIGHT. Four Germans who brought a huge flying machine from Berlin to New York this week probably will not be received with one twenty-second of the fuss which attended the solo trip of Douglas Corrigan to Ireland and his return to this country.

Yet the German flight is vastly more significant—vastly more thrilling, if one ponders all its implications and potentialities.

The announcement by Lufthansa that the history-making trip of the Brandenburg was under way embodied an explanation that the great German aeronautics organization hoped relatively soon to establish regular non-stop mail and passenger service between Berlin and New York.

What will be the effect of such service? It may seem silly to suggest that almost daily exchange of aerial communication between Germany and the United States would, in itself, make any appreciable contribution to permanently amicable relations between the two nations—there has been almost constant air service between Berlin and the capitals of other European nations for years without any resultant effect on nationalistic and racial relations in the Old World.

Yet this German-American or Berlin-New York service may be different—bear in mind that such a service will be established only if there is a need for it, and the need for it can develop only if enough German and American business men require speedy or frequent exchanges of visits for the promotion of mutual business interests.

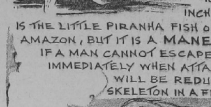

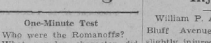

The boy, however, was defeated by Joseph W. Hiss, Jr., of Tarrytown, N. Y., who covered the course in 22.8 seconds, approximately a second less than the Omaha champion's time of 23.71 which won the race.

Julius Horvay of South Bend, Ind., was second in the heat, and Billy ran a third.

PAROLED CONVICT FATALLY SHOT BY BROTHER-IN-LAW

Slayer Confesses To Police After Shooting Victim Through Back

When he was arrested, Mosca was held on an open charge and locked in jail overnight. Dr. Squire tomorrow is to question a number of relatives and other witnesses who were on parole from Sing Sing Prison, from which he was released on July 6, 1936, after serving 14 years of a sentence of from 20 years to life for murder.

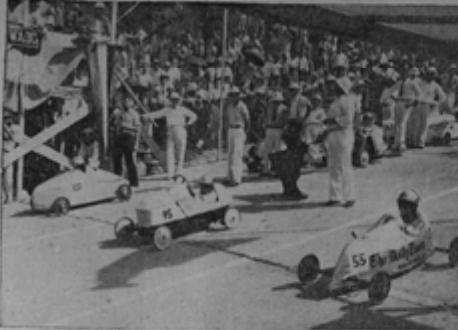

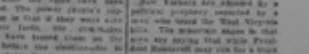
