Anyone who went back-bass fishing over the holiday weekend, will bear this statement out. The morning breeze backed the boat in somewhat better style than on Tuesday the first day the season opened. From reports coming to me hot fishing was in our own watershed and the season...

However the news to date on black bass fishing is far from exciting. Anglers who fished the Fishways say that while there are numerous in that river they are running small. One angler fishing Rye Lake took over two dozen and all of them were over two pounds. Our experience was just soon.

We did not see an evening and night of fishing but took to the big fish. During the day, even before dusk, we fished a floating bass but it was practically every fourth cast had an strike.

In every instance the fish were either just legal or under size. So we returned them all to the water. While we were looking out on this type of day they are usually known just by the name and when removed from the book are they injured.

At the night were on we switched to a half-moon lure and fished with a short cast using a jerking motion as it was being retrieved. We managed to catch during four hours' fishing along the shoreline. Only one fish over the two-pound mark.

The rain we have been having is most certainly going to help in the trout fishing. Other-wise, the weather is just what we need to get them to rise to a fly. Now the streams are taking on a seasonal aspect and the fly fishermen should have better luck during the week. Strangely enough, they will be rewarded eventually that it know, and then some of us will say when we hear that a 25-pounder was caught. "Good! Why wasn't I fishing that day?"

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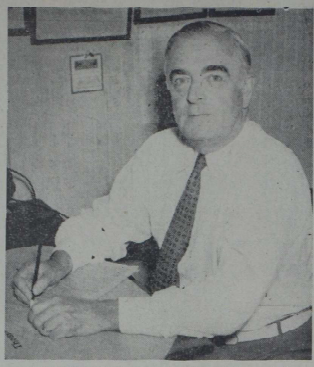

## Each Entry Sees Triumph Where Former Champions Failed To Last One Heat

**Victor Here Must Produce Car Capable Of Shading Marks Set By Ex-Titholders; Winning Time At National Final Reflects Improvements In Racing Designs**

Three Mamaroneck Soap Box Derby champions in three years have gone to the national races at Akron, Ohio, only to teleglyph back the three disappointing words eliminated first heat.

The local winner this year will be just as confident as were those three boys he will "take king of the champs" but to do so he must not only go past the first heat but must win many others.

It is a fierce, grueling competition, in which boy and car must function perfectly in each and every heat if they are to finish on top at the end. Factors 100 miles for calculation enter a contest lasting 24 or 25 seconds.

The rivalry word "eliminated" has come back from Billy Pooley, the 1938 and first Mamaroneck champ; from Raymond Poccia, 1939 champ; and from Richard Stagnaga, the 1940 champ. Not one of the three found the wheeling unfair or had any criticism of it.

They just lost to better cars. The new champ to be picked by Poccia car to win and the young Akron upon a speed that is being narrowed down each year at Akron. The 1938 national champ won with a time of 28.75 seconds; the 1939 champ, 29.40, and last year's champ, 30.25.

The 1940 national champion, Richard Stagnaga, won with a time of 31.25 seconds. The 1941 Derby will be held at Akron on July 21-22.

By adding the three local speeds of former years follows: Pooley 29.40, Poccia 28.75, Stagnaga 31.25.

There has been a thrill every year for the thousands who have attended the Mamaroneck Soap Box Derby—and there is no question but that the new champion will be found only after a keen contest while more thousands look with excitement.

Three years ago young Billy Pooley provided one of the thrills of the afternoon when he came near to being eliminated in his first heat. Something went wrong with his steering apparatus and his steel helmet fell down over his eyes.

Local race race slipped over the finish line in 32.50 seconds here, not quite so good as Poccia's time but still good enough for him to have confidence in his ability to finish well towards the top at Akron.

Went Dick returned to Mamaroneck he said: "I had a swell time in Akron and I'm glad to bid that experience over if it.

The derby developed tomorrow and the chance of the future will say that, if such be his fortune in Akron.

But the day may come—tomorrow may be the day—when Mamaroneck will produce a champion who will go to Akron and will not long it necessary to teleglyph any message home.

The national news services and the radio will proclaim him the Soap Box Derby King and the home folks will know about it in instant he flashes over that Akron finish line.

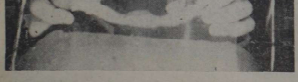

## 'Best Boy Should Win,' Mothers Agree, But Each Is Sure Her Son Is 'In'

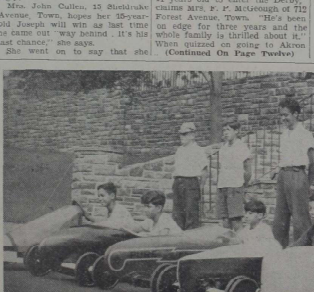

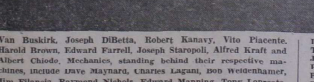



**RAMPS ASSURE AN EVEN START**

**Mechanically Operated Device Allows Each Heat To Go Off Simultaneously**

The ramps which will be used in tomorrow's fourth running of the Derby Times Soap Box Derby insure a fair start for the entrants.

Mechanically operated, the starting ramps allow each racer to roll off the line at the same instant as rival cars, avoiding errors and confusion.

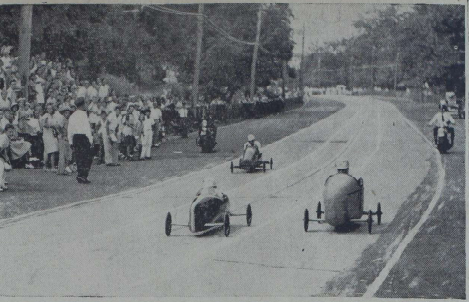
As was the case last year, The Daily Times has made arrangements through publisher George M. Forbes to borrow the ramps which are the property of the Turf-crowd "News".

The ramps will be carried from White Plains, where they were used Wednesday in that city's "Respectfully" Derby. They will be erected by Village employees under the supervision of Ned Buch, veteran Derby starter.

**Derby Downs, Scene Of Akron Finals, Is Last Word In Soap Box Raceways**

Derby Downs scene of the National Finals is a stretch of concrete surface, 30 feet wide, without a curve. It is divided into three lanes, permitting three cars to compete in each heat. The actual racing distance between the start-line and the finish line measures 1,000 feet. Beyond the finish line there is a continuation of the paved surface which extends for an other 1200 feet, providing side-line space for the cars to slow down, and come to a safe stop after each race.

There is a stretch of 250 feet above the starting line where cars are lined up in heat formations in readiness to race. The service pits are located on the level raised area at the top of the hill.

The racers are held in position at the starting line with baffles fastened to a heavy shaft which is counter-sunk in the starting platform. The platform extends across the course and is elevated about six inches above the pavement. The shaft which controls the baffles is operated by a vacuum-powered cylinder. When the starting signal is given, the baffles drop simultaneously and the racers move absolutely even start. The operation of this starting device also controls the electric timing equipment which times each heat.

Moving down the track from the starting line, the racers travel over a stretch of more than 100 feet on a 4 per cent grade. This grade is sufficient to give the cars momentum. The next 500 feet over a grade of 6 per cent and the balance of the course to the finish line is over a 2 per cent grade. An electric "eye" controls the special photo-finish camera located above the finish line and stops the large timing clock as the first racer passes through the beam. This makes it possible to get a photograph of each heat finish, including a photo-record of the time of the heat.

A double-headed judge bridge spans the finish line and provides adequate space for officials, judges, photographers and radio announcers. The photo-finish and timing equipment is located on this bridge. Judges can be furnished with photographic results of each heat finish within two minutes after a race. This eliminates any possibility of error in judging a heat, and it accurately times each heat. It is possible to register to one-hundredth of a second.

The entire course is bordered on each side by "kick boards" (12 inch by 22 inch planks protected by rubber molding) to prevent a car from running off the track. At a definite distance behind the "kick boards" wire fencing spans the area between the stands and sides.

The large tunnel underneath the track makes it possible for people to move from one side of the track to the other without crossing the course itself.

There is such a constant demand for cooling beverages during the Derby running that vendors see little if any of the speed classic.

BLEACHERS SEAT 1,500

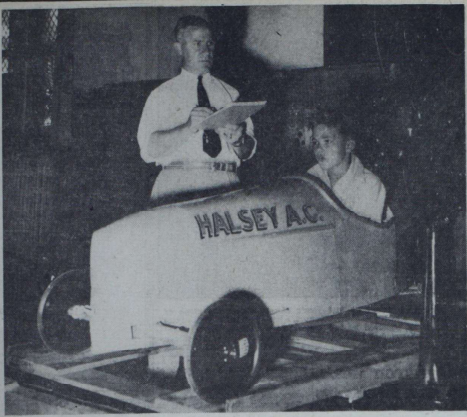
Most Spectators Prefer Walk Along Track to Sitting

As in most sports events, the time-honored bleachers of soap and story play an integral part. The Daily Times Soap Box Derby is no exception.

Although there still had been an extensive set of bleachers erected this year (they elsewhere in this special edition) the men in charge of the installation are confident last year's supply of seats won't be necessary.

The bleachers are transported from Madison street, where they remain the year around, sealing football and baseball crowds. Village workers bring them to the site of the race early in the morning of the day it is to be held. Trained crews have the entire set adjusted by 10 cent despite the necessity of maintaining a level surface, which is done by "whimpering," underneath the bleachers, supports with various thicknesses of board.

Admission to bleachers this year is 25 cents for adults, 10 cents for children. Those prices are a dramatic reduction under last year's admission cost, when all bleacher fans were charged 50 cents.

HERE'S THE STORY OF MEN WHO REALLY CONTROL RACE

Track Director, Hilltop Supervisor, Judges, Registrar, Clerk, Inspector, Starter, Finish Line Officials Actually Run Soap Box Derby Tomorrow Afternoon

The story behind "what makes the Soap Box Derby wheels go round" is told in the description of the duties of the men who have actual control of running the speed classic tomorrow.  
(The duties of William H. Johnson, general chairman, are recounted elsewhere in this special edition.)

Track Directors—Chief of Village Police Department Arthur Marten; Fire Chief George Carmichael and Albert Wilson, Mamaroneck Lions Club—they head an organization that will see that track is well policed, clear at all times and that the race schedule is maintained. Efficient policing can be accomplished only if fencing is

used along the entire course. Strict attention is given to the finish line where contention may present a problem and where accidents may take place. A safety zone will be patrolled beyond the finish line under their jurisdiction so that racers may slow down and be removed from the course without crowd interference.  
In the interest of safety, they will appoint a detail of police for parking near the course. Automobiles not correctly parked, or left too close to the course, may interfere with the safe operation of the race or prove hazardous to spectators.

The track director will cooperate with the general chairman in the interest of safety for all concerned.  
Director of Hilltop operations—Mervyn Conner, Mamaroneck Lions Club—This official will organize and supervise all activities on the top of the hill back of the starting line. His first responsibility is the provision and location of service pits where water can be served. The director of service pits should have a crew of mechanics provided with equipment so that they can be of service to repairing or oiling entrants' cars.

The director of hilltop operations will appoint a director of heat and his assistants who will be responsible for lining up the entrants in classes, and the classes in heats. The director of heats will secure the necessary information from the Registrar so that he can line up the cars before the start of the race. This official will also provide for entrants to draw lane positions in each heat and see that each heat moves to the starting line in proper order.  
As heat winners are returned to the top of the hill, these cars must be lined up in proper order for the semifinals. The race should start with Class "B" entrants, and the winners in this class should be determined before starting Class "A."  
Judges—George Forbes, publisher of the Daily Times, Ralph Clark, Mamaroneck Lions Club and William Meyers, Soundview Chevrolet Corp.—the chief judge and his assistants should select the winner of each heat in the preliminary heats, and the first, second

EDDIE DOOLEY AGAIN ACTS AS MASTER OF CEREMONIES

Radio Football Expert Lends Talents To Derby Race Behind The 'Mike'

Eddie Dooley, one of Mamaroneck's radio experts, will again act as master of ceremonies at the fourth running of the Daily Times Soap Box Derby tomorrow.

Danger to Mamaroneck's youth of adult population is Mr. Dooley, a resident of Orangetown. He's been known for his first major achievement in attaining All-American rating in football while a student of Dartmouth College. In later years he has excelled in radio, principally as football commentator.

Mr. Dooley's staff sports writer for the New York "Sun" until recently, is now football editor of Liberty magazine. His initial articles for that publication will appear early in the Fall.  
Mr. Dooley's radio work will also result in concluding with the opening of the 1941 gridiron season.

Dr. Irving A. Marsland, chairman, assisted by Charles Reed, R. W. Brewer and Judge Henry A. Baxter, Jr., Mamaroneck Lions Club—this assignment is one of the most important. The chief clerk in charge at the finish line must supervise the activities of four key men and their assistants. The efficient cooperation of this group contributes greatly to the smooth operation of the race.

The director's supervisor in the chief clerk, who will have charge of all records at the finish line. At the completion of each heat, the chief clerk will fill out a heat winner tag with the heat number and the number of the winning car. The tag is then delivered to the heat winner for identification at the starting line. One question should be answered to see that the proper racer receives the heat winner tag, and that the heat winner goes to the chief clerk's desk for his tag.  
The director of finish line operations will organize and supervise the officials and tracking crew at the starting line.

The next key position under the supervision of the director of finish line operations is the official in charge of returning heat winners to the starting line. This official will arrange some orderly procedure that will handle these cars well beyond the finish line. A space may be set aside where they can be lined up so that entrants may easily claim them after the race. The eliminated cars should not be permitted to return partway up the course as they will present a hazard to spectators and to the racers in subsequent heats.

Chief Starter—W. Roy Halley, assisted by Peter Doera, Mamaroneck Lions Club—

Chief Inspector—Leonard Gross, Mamaroneck Lions Club—the work of the chief inspector and his assistants is outlined under "Inspection." This committee completes the job prior to the race. Cars are inspected long before the race in order that unsafe or ineligible construction be checked. On the day of the race the chief inspector and his assistants are in attendance to approve any changes that have to be made before or during the running of the Derby.

Registrar—Edward A. Fisher, chairman, assisted by Thomas McKean and Dr. Lynn H. Kelley, Mamaroneck Lions Club. The registrar will compile a list of all "boys" officially entered. This list should be checked with the actual entries following final inspection. The registrar may assign the numbers, or check his list with the numbers in case the numbers have been assigned before registration. The registrar is stationed at the starting line with name and number of each entrant in Class "A" and "B." An assistant informs him from the finish line of heat winners. Subsequent heats are arranged from the information. Director of Finish Line opera-

It requires much ingenuity and smart thinking for a young boy to build a Soap Box Derby racer. Since the cost of races cannot exceed \$10 all entrants are obligated to hunt up their own materials for construction.

Mrs. Milton R. Brodwin of 300 Halstead Avenue, Mamaroneck, thinks the race is fun for the boys and that "they like the free ease." Other than that she's been worried about the experimental requests which her Theodore has been making on the public streets.

Walter Becker son of Mrs. Julius Becker of 411 English Place, Mamaroneck, has entered for the fourth time. His mother has encouraged him from the very beginning since, "it keeps him busy at home," she says. Also it gave him pleasure to watch him working on the car, "but I wish he'd win this time," she says wistfully. Next year she's going to be 100 old.

Each new year sees some major improvement in the facilities at Derby Downs in Akron, O. where the All-American Soap Box Derby finals are held. Last year erection of a handsome permanent grandstand augmented seating facilities.

For the 1941 race at this unique Derby Downs, additional seats will be provided in the form of all-steel bleachers, which were in use during the professional football season in Milwaukee, Wis., and Washington.

They will be brought from each city especially for the Derby. More than 10,000 race fans saw "the greatest amateur racing event in the world" last year, and a record crowd is expected Aug. 17.

The chief starter will officially start each heat with a gun or flag. Either method may be used as a signal to the men in charge of the starting devices to release the cars, and to the timers. The personal operating of the starting devices will be under the supervision of the chief starter. This official will also keep informed through the registrar on the making up of the heats and decide all questions pertaining to heat starts.

Another assistant should operate at the finish line with the check-off line with which to signal the finish of each heat. Heat and cover flags at the finish line can be used by the assistant starter to signal the chief starter, advising by color when the course is clear or clear. This is important, as no race should be started until the entire course, including the safety zone, is clear.

In charge of the Village police detail at the race tomorrow will be the long empty office who filled the long empty office here March 1.

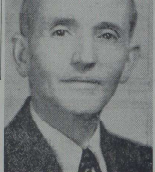

Last year's event was taken by 17-year-old Richard Stamegna. Pooley will always be the youngest winner. Why? Nine-year-old first now barred from Derby competition.

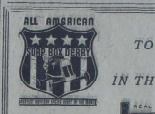

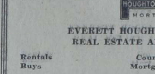
