Training Ship Due

The 3000-ton training ship "American Seaman," of the U. S. Maritime Service, is expected to arrive at Larchmont Saturday on a U. S. Coast Guard cutter passenger.

The ship in Larchmont is part of a 4,000-mile cruise that started in New London, Conn., on June 7, and will be conducted at the same port on July 31. The ship included the "Voyager" from Boston, Ohio, and ports on the Atlantic, Chesapeake, as well as Larchmont on the Hudson.

Arriving in Larchmont Saturday, the training ship will remain over Monday morning. Practice cruises and drills will be held on Long Island Sound.

The ship was formerly the "A. Edgerton," built in 1919 in Seattle, Wash., and taken over by the Maritime Service on June 1, 1919. Powered by a geared steam turbine, it is 425 feet long, 54 feet wide, with a draft of 20 feet.

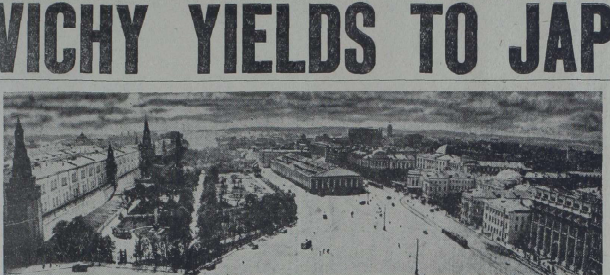

12 NEW PARKWAY POLICEMEN ASKED

Public Safety Director Seeks Additions To Staff To Assure Extra Duties

A shortage of personnel in the highway police force, plus extra duties laid upon the force by a recent local ordinance passed by the Board of Supervisors, will lead to a request that at least 12 additional policemen be authorized, it was learned today.

Thomas F. Reynolds, director of public safety for the Park Commission, is expected to take up the matter with the board of supervisors. He will also discuss the matter with the Board of Supervisors, who must recommend the need for additional police in the highway police force by the supervisors' ordinance.

The ordinance now on file at Albany by Governor Lehman when handled as a state bill, was passed by the supervisors under an ordinance by County Executive William A. Bennett. It would be considered as a "home rule" matter under the present charter. It extends authorization of the highway police force to include the properties of all county-owned highways.

The present highway police force consists of 12 policemen, plus a few others who are on call for emergency. The two young men will return to their duties at Portsmouth on Sunday.

New East Basin Seawall To Get Under Way Soon Despite Labor Shortage

Construction To Start Aug. 15; Other WPA Projects Face Delay

Construction of a seawall in the East Basin of Mamaroneck Harbor probably will start Aug. 15, despite the fact that Works Projects Administration labor has fallen off by approximately 25 per cent in Westchester County during the last two months, Village manager William H. Johnson said.

Johnson said he was informed today by WPA authorities. The present shortage of WPA labor has been attributed largely to the fact that workmen are being employed in private industry.

The Village has completed all administrative work for the project and has obtained approval of the Federal Government on three new laws, namely, the seawall, the widening and improvement of Penrose Road from the Boston Post Road to the Turn Line, and the rebuilding of the Haleside Avenue bridge over Mamaroneck River.

Because labor for WPA projects is scarce, however, the Village will not start the new projects until others in this vicinity are completed.

One of these is the installation of a new short street running back of the Village Yard from Flint Park to Brown Avenue. The street, to be known as Birch Lane, will provide a new entrance to Flint Park and the Village Yard.

The other projects include installation of water mains on Union Avenue and Mary Park in Hart Island.

The federal government has granted \$95,200 for its share of the seawall. Some 200 men, of whom there are a number in Mamaroneck, will be provided work for the project.

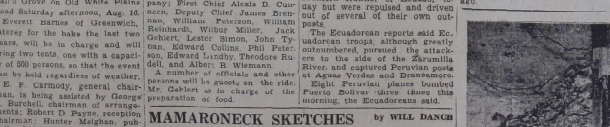
Ecuadorian Peruvian Attack

PLATT OPPOSES 11-MAN BOARD

Rye Mayor Calls On Women Voters To Cast Ballots Against Referendum

Mayor Livingston Platt of the Village of Rye, which is to become Westchester's sixth city on Jan. 1, 1942, with a "flat" almost certain of re-election as the new city's first mayor, last night announced that he opposes the county referendum on the November ballot to substitute an 11-man county board for the present board of 44 supervisors.

Invited to address the Rye League of Women Voters at the Square House, Rye's municipal building, for the inauguration of primary elections, Mayor Platt declared long enough to urge that the league members vote against the referendum.

In his state, Mayor Platt took the opposite side from that of his regular party, County Executive William F. Buckley, Jr., who favors the referendum as the senior member of the firm, Buckley Platt and Walter Judge Buckley is one of the foremost advocates of the referendum.

"We have fought long and earnestly here in Rye for home rule, and just as we are getting it," declared Mayor Platt, "we find that they're trying to take it away from us."

He explained that under the new program for county government, which would retain the supervisor to handle local affairs but that county legislation would be transferred to the smaller 11-man board, against which he urged the league to vote. The league, however, is expected to campaign vigorously for the passage of the referendum.

Grieving Frenchman Ends Life In Club

The fall of France shocked and distressed the Government of a native of France who was an interior decorator in New York City, and he died of grief at the collapse of his native land.

Last night he died in his apartment at the Adlon Country Club, after an overdose of a sleeping medicine, police said. A club employee found the decorator, fully clothed and sleeping in a room which he had a short time ago addressed to relatives in France, but retained their contents.

Marshall Flays Draftee Petition

Denounces As Sabotage Plan To Have Service Men Express Disapproval

WASHINGTON (AP)—Gen. George C. Marshall denounced today as sabotage a dangerous character was said to have organized the service of soldiers and sailors to express their disapproval of the draft.

The chief of staff, testifying before the House Military Committee in behalf of an extension of the draft, said that the petition was a "sabotage" plan to have members of the First Army sign petitions against the draft.

"Word of the petition, Marshall said, came from Lieut. Gen. Hugh Drum, commander of the First Army.

"We cannot have a political club in the army," Marshall said, "and we cannot have a situation where the army is being used to express disapproval of the government."

He did not identify the state.

At the outbreak of his remarks, Marshall told the committee he had been informed that the petition was "aimed" on the question of reorganizing the Army's main garrison at Ft. Bragg, N. C., on the basis of a year-long limitation on the service on draftees and reservists.

Although he said he had been pressed for approval of plans to send additional troops to Trinidad, one of the southernmost of the new bases obtained from Britain, he had refused because of the legislation.

"DROPPING THE PILOT"

News sources indicate that County Executive William F. Bleakley, retiring from that office at the end of this month, will report to the county taxpayers on his conduct of the office as Westchester's first executive head under the new charter administration.

Without any attempt to anticipate what Judge Bleakley will say in that report, it may easily be said that history will record two matters as his most outstanding accomplishments during the two and a half years he has been at the head of the county. There have been, of course, effectuations of the mergers of various county departments, as imposed upon him during his first year by the requirements of the new charter. There have been, too, unusually laborious problems which arose because of the shift in county government.

And, on top of that, a multitude of routine matters to be handled.

But outstanding, it may in all likelihood be found, will be the work which Judge Bleakley has done in two specific fields which ranks highest when the full record of his accomplishments are written. These are his activities in bringing the State of New York to recognize its responsibility for financial aid to Westchester in expansion and maintenance of state highway and county parkway facilities for through traffic, and in a substantial curtailment of county debt to reduce the heavy load upon taxpayers for amortization and interest of bonds issued in former years for public improvements.

In the first instance, the state legislature proved sympathetic in Westchester's attempts to collect tolls for parkway improvements, even if Governor Lehman and the court of appeals were less cooperative; as it is, the state permits Fleetwood tolls to be used for the Hutchinson River Parkway safety-widening. Distribution of state highway funds has been more generous toward the county; the Tappan Zee Bridge Authority paid for the widening of the lower Saw Mill River Parkway; and through Judge Bleakley's personal influence, bills passed by the last legislature, should a November statewide referendum be favorable, will provide for this county in excess of \$15,000,000 state monies for parkway and highway construction.

On the second point Judge Bleakley's insistence upon a rigid policy of economy, with expenditures allowed for only the most badly needed capital projects, has aided in bringing down the county's bonded indebtedness from a peak of \$106,000,000 to around \$31,000,000 at the end of this year. Note that not a single county bond was issued this last fiscal year!

This saving in interest charges, for not only this but future years, has resulted already in a lowered 1941 county budget and the outlook is for another cut in the 1942 total. With Judge Bleakley's expressed desire to return to private life and the legal profession there will be, of course, understanding and sympathy on the part of the public. And, as he renders an accounting of his stewardship there will be different items which will appeal to different minds. But we believe the two accomplishments briefly explained above are his most substantial contributions to good government in Westchester in his latest, and perhaps last, public office.

HOW LONG WOULD IT TAKE?

The County Planning Commission has recommended that "a new complete survey" of proposed county airport sites in Westchester be made before final decision is reached. Inasmuch as the planning commission must, under the county charter, pass upon any capital appropriation for public improvements before the expenditure can be legitimized, the commission naturally has an interest in the question.

But this is not an ordinary capital expenditure; instead, this is the answer to an urgent request made by the army air corps for assistance from the county in development of the national defense program. That program cannot be held up.

Therefore, whether or not to acquiesce in the procedure for another survey properly hinges upon the length of time required for such study.

In other words, speed is important, even if such speed does imply the risk of loss of absolute perfection. Westchester might be able to get a better location if it took more time for more study on it—but will Hitler wait very long?

Along with the Federal government's drive to sell United States Savings Bonds, it would be in order for the government to encourage the public to invest part of its savings in private enterprise. The prosperity of this country is based on the private enterprise system. Our government should be interested in promoting a system that is the lifeblood of the nation and the source of all tax revenue that maintains government itself. It should take good care of the goose that lays the golden eggs.

Pneumatic Equipment Concern To Employ 100 When Work Goes Into Full Swing

Village To Get \$5,000 In Delinquent Taxes Through Transaction

Alvin Billings Corporation, engineer and manufacturer of pneumatic equipment, has purchased the property and factory building at 43 Fayette Street, formerly known as the "rubber factory," in the Village of Mamaroneck.

Fifty persons will be employed at the new plant in the beginning and the force will be increased to about 100 when work on operations is in full swing. The company will use local workmen as extensively as possible, according to F. Billings, president.

The corporation with offices at 220 East 42d Street, New York, and another plant in Pennsylvania, will manufacture pneumatic equipment for the automobile and truck industry. The plant will be used for the manufacture of pneumatic tires and other products. The sale was concluded after months of negotiations. The property was owned by the late Walter Forster. The purchase price was \$100,000, including the cost of the building and equipment. The sale was completed through the agency of the late Walter Forster's estate.

MILK PRICE GOES UP ONE-HALF CENT

Cream Cost To Be Increased Four Cents Per Quart Effective Friday

The Board of Milk and Cream Producers of the Westchester Division of the State Department of Agriculture announced today that the price of milk will be increased one-half cent per quart, effective Friday.

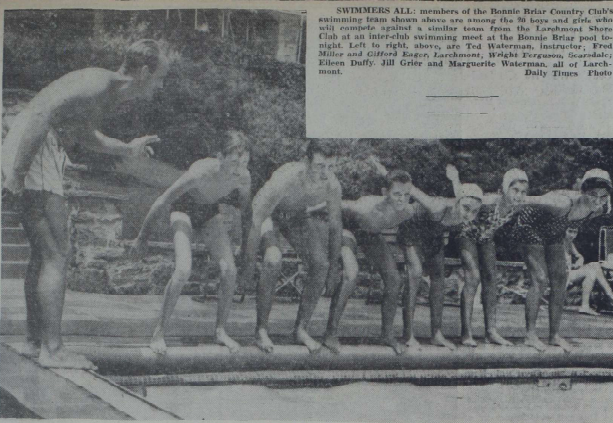
Mrs. Goldsmith Distributes Pamphlets; September Outings Planned

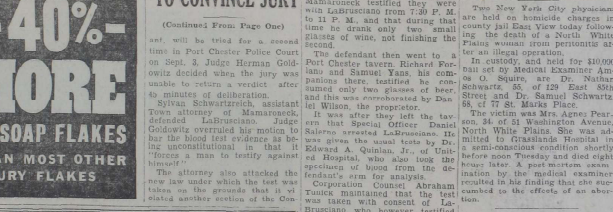

NATION'S TRAFFIC DEATH TOLL SOARS

Fatalities For First Half Of Year Show 17 P. C. Rise Over 1940 Period

CHICAGO, (AP).—The nation's traffic death toll during the first half of this year climbed 17 percent over the same period of 1940, a trend which the National Safety Council says today pointed toward an all-time high for the year.

The six-month total was 28,811, or 2,800 more than the 14,421 for the same time last year.

The death increase was general throughout the nation, only nine states cutting their traffic fatalities during the first half of the year.

Chicago areas had the greatest increase, 22 percent, while towns under 10,000 population had an 11 percent increase.

Among the leaders in the six-month toll were Mount Vernon, N. Y., and New Rochelle, N. Y.

The toll continued to mount in June, the 11th successive month to show an increase. The June total was 3,000, 16 percent above the 2,633 reported for June, 1940.

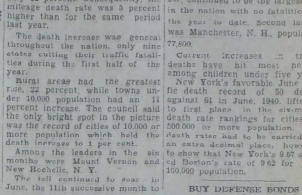

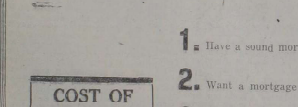

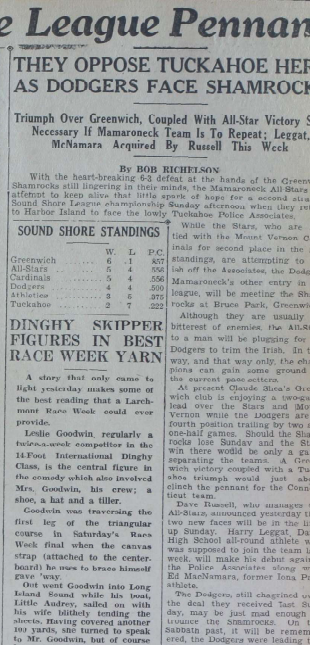

1. Their countries seek no territorial gains.

3. The right of all peoples to choose the form of government under which they live.

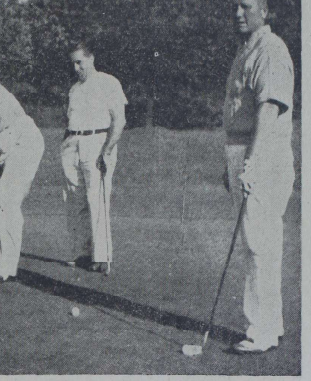

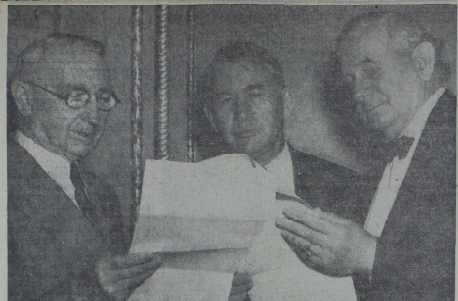
