Haslemeyen Grab 6th Victory; Petrie, Kluger Pace Scorers

Blessed Sacrament's Cardinals proved a soft touch for the blazing baskets of Belongs, High and had their wings clipped, 67-48 last night before a good sized weekday crowd at the snug East End Bandbox. To see the statistics over with rapidly, the Panthers have now copied six of seven in the midst of a three-game triumph. They rank with the cream of the county's cage crop.

The visitors didn't get to lift an eyebrow last night before they were far behind and Coach Mack Hasley was merciful in the second half or it might have been even more so. A \$100,000 salary is nothing new to Williams. Last season, according to reliable sources, he drew down \$90,000 base pay and \$10,000 more in an alternate year. Williams' 1949 total of 1,596,650 was a new club record.
